A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

My Dear Friends in Christ,

I have a confession to make: I haven't always had a close relationship with Mary. One might wonder why since, as



one parishioner put it, "all priests are close to Mary, aren't they?" It's not that I don't understand Mary's sacrifice, or appreciate all that she has done for us. It's due to the fact that for most of my life, I've had my *own* mother with me. This changed in 2001 with her passing. It was at that time that my relationship with the Blessed Mother changed, and changed for the better. It was at that time that I came to appreciate Mary as *mother* – Mother of the Church, Mother of us All.

Today the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God. This feast has had many "incarnations". It has been celebrated at different times of the year and has been displaced a few times by other feasts, but it has found its current place mainly due to the Council of Ephesus. It was at the Council of Ephesus, in 431, that Mary was called "Theotokos", or "God-Bearer". If she is the mother of Jesus then, by association, she is rightly the mother of God – thus the naming of the feast as the Solemnity of Mary, the most holy Mother of God.


Mothers hold a very special place in familial archetypes. Not to take anything away from fathers (being a "father" myself!), but mothers are unique in that it is they who bring the life (conceived by God with the "co-authorship" of mother and father) of a child into the world. It is in this maternal bond, "forged" in the first months of a child's conception and "solidified" at the first months of their birth, which makes the mother/child union a unique one. This is why Mary holds a special place not only in the life of Christ but in the life of the Church, Herself. This is why this solemnity is a celebration for the whole Church gathered throughout the world.

In this Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God, our Church comes to understand its place in the world. We are called to foster, with a mother's love, the unique gift that God has in our lives. Just as Mary brought Jesus into the world through birth, so too do we bring Jesus into the world by "bringing to life" the reality of God's love in our lives. We who know God, and who love God, are called to "birth" into reality the manifestation of that love by loving our brothers and sisters, especially those who the world has cast aside – the pre-born, the mentally/physically challenged, the elderly, the terminally ill. In all of these people, we are to see Christ, and we are to help the world see Christ in them.

May we have the courage, on this feast, to welcome Mary into our homes, hearts and lives. May we know that Mary, who leads us to her Son, has something to teach us. As disciple and exemplar of faith, Mary shows to the world what it means to love unconditionally. May we share that unconditional love, a love which the world does not know, with all whom we meet.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

St. Francis of Assisi certainly had a way with words. Speaking of Mary as 'Virgin made Church' is one of those inspired phrases found in The Salutation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Third Order Regular Rule of

St. Francis which Franciscan Sisters of Christian Charity live also gives honor to our Blessed Mother using this title. What does it mean? I invite you to read the following passages and ponder them as the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God.

"Let the brothers and sisters keep the example of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God and of our Lord Jesus Christ, ever before their eyes. Let them do this according to the exhortation of St. Francis who held Holy Mary, Lady and Queen, in highest veneration since she is the virgin made church. Let them also remember that the immaculate Virgin Mary, whose example they are to follow, called herself the handmaid of the Lord". Third Order Regular Rule, Chapter IV, #17

The Salutation of the Virgin Mary

Hail, O Lady, Mary, holy Mother of God: you are the Virgin made Church and the one chosen by the most holy Father in heaven whom He consecrated with His most holy beloved Son and with the Holy Spirit the Paraclete, in whom there was and is the fullness of grace and every good Hail His Palace! Hail His Tabernacle! Hail His Home! Hail His Robe! Hail His Servant! Hail His Mother! And (hail) all you holy virtues which through the arace and light of the Holy Spirit are poured into the hearts of the faithful so that from their faithless state you may make them faithful to God. AMEN

What do the words "Virgin made Church" mean to me? Well, for starters, the capital letters are central to my understanding. These words speak to me of THE Virgin rather than just any virgin. That is the Virgin Mary! Also the word Church with its capital letter status speaks of the Body of Christ, the "people" church rather than the structure. Mary is the Virgin made Church of course because of her part in bringing forth the body of Christ in a physical way. More importantly though, she brought forth the Body of Christ the Church. How? By her faith in her Son and God's from the very moment of his conception, by her faith on display at the wedding of Cana where we hear her voice commanding, "Do whatever He tells you" and by her nurturing the fledgling Church in the upper room in the waiting time for the coming of the Spirit. Our existence as Church from the past and on into eternity is truly accompanied by and given life by THE Virgin.



I Believe in One Lord Jesus Christ: True God and True Man

Today, the Church concludes the Octave of Christmas with the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God. The title, Mother of God, translates from the Greek word "*Theotokos*" often used for Mary, coming from *Theos* (God) and *tokos* (offspring). The phrase is best translated as "she whose offspring is God" or "she who gave birth to one who was God"; in other words, Mother of God.

The idea that God can have a mother can seem strange and even impossible. God, the eternal one, has no beginning or end. God was not brought *into* being; instead, God is *pure* Being and the source of *all* being. One of the major theological questions that Christians struggled with at the time was how to reconcile their belief that God's eternal and immortal Logos (Word) was made man and died. In a related way, some early theologians were uncomfortable saying that Mary was the mother of God and instead emphasized that Mary was the mother of Christ. In the early Church, there was a form of gnosticism (discussed in an earlier article) called Docetism that believed that the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity only "appeared" to be a man. Therefore, Mary could not have given birth to God and Jesus only "appeared" to suffer and die.

Docetists denied that Jesus was truly man. There were others who stuggled with Jesus' identity as God and Man. A theologian who struggled with these questions was Nestorius, the Patriarch of Constantinople, who died approximately in the year AD 451. Nestorius believed and taught that within Christ, there was a union between a human person (Jesus) and the divine person (the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity). At best, the union between humanity and divine was a moral union. The human will of Jesus adopted the divine will of the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity. Hence, Mary was the Mother of the human person but not the eternal and immortal *Logos* (Word).

At the Councils of Nicea (AD 325) and Chalcedon (AD 451), the Bishops of the Church attempted to resolve these issues concerning Jesus' identity. They taught that the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, who is True God, assumed a human nature and was born of the Virgin Mary becoming True Man. This is one of the great mysteries of our faith that is hard, if not impossible, to fully understand. Yet, this inspired teaching of the Holy Spirit puts into words what the first Christians believed in the Gospels—that Jesus is True God and True Man. Therefore, we can say that Jesus Christ is ONE person with two natures. He, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, is the Son of God and Son of Mary.

We can take comfort knowing that Jesus is Truly God. Through Jesus, God shares our life with us. He knows what it is like to live a human life with all of its joys and sorrows, happiness and sadness, friendship and betrayal, along with life and death. In all these things, he lives up to the name given to him by the angels, *Emmanuel*, which means "God is with us". By being Truly Man, he reveals how a human life is truly created to live. Jesus shows us that it is possible for a human being to live a life without sin. He shows us that it is possible to live human lives in freedom, virtue, and holiness. Not only does he show us how a true human life is lived, he gives us the means by his grace to live as he lives in communion with God and with each other.
