





My Dear Friends in Christ,

I enjoy going to wedding receptions (I am, after all, Irish and what Irishman doesn't like a good party!). If I'm ever invited to a reception, however, I have one rule: please don't seat me at the head table. Usually what happens is that I either end up alone (since the bridesmaids and groomsmen are off with friends and the bride and groom are going from table to table) or, as happened in one case, I end up cutting the flower girl's meal (yes, that really did happen!)! All things being equal, though, I do enjoy my time at these affairs.

In today's gospel, Jesus finds Himself at a wedding reception. It is late in the reception, as is evidenced by the fact that they are running low on wine. This is a major faux pas (as you can imagine) and Mary comes to Jesus and informs Him of this dilemma. At first, Jesus seems unconcerned with this challenge to the bride and groom (and their families). Mary then informs the servers to "do whatever He tells you" (Jn 2:5). Mary, knowing her Son, seems to know that Jesus won't leave them "high and dry" (figuratively and literally!), that Jesus will rectify the situation. Jesus not only produces (through a miracle) plenty of wine, but it is the best vintage of the day.

I don't believe that it is a coincidence that Jesus performs this miracle (the first of His many public miracles) in this time, place, or manner. Let's think about what transpires. They are at a wedding banquet/ feast, something that scripture writers will use as an image of the Kingdom. He produces wine, an essential element of the Last Supper (a Passover meal). The wine that is produced is not only new wine, but it is also the best vintage; for us as Christians, Jesus is that "new wine" (unlike anyone who has come before Him) and is the "best vintage" (the Son of God).

Jesus never does anything accidentally. Every word He speaks, every action He undertakes, everything He does, is done with intentionality. This first miracle of Jesus, one that no one else but Jesus saw coming (except, perhaps, for Mary, who knows her Son). May we follow in the path of Jesus. May our actions, like Jesus', be intentional and may that move us ever closer to Him. May we come to know Jesus for who He is: a miracle worker, the greatest prophetic voice ever to speak, the Son of God.

#### MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

We find ourselves venturing away from the New Year's celebrations (and even the Christmas Season) and back into the Season of Ordinary Time, a time that will last for approximately a month. We will see the Season of Lent soon enough (Ash Wednesday is March 2nd), so now may be a good time to give you an update on my progress in the Secular Franciscans.

As of this writing (and reading), I am two chapters away from completing the book that we use (as well as the "class time") in the "stages" of formation, namely "Orientation", "Inquiry", and "Candidacy". It is in this final stage, that of Candidacy, that one begins to prepare for "Profession", or permanent commitment to the fraternity life of the Secular Franciscans. After one formally professes a life-long commitment (not unlike the commitment I made at my Ordination), one joins the rest of the fraternity in which one has been meeting in the process of "ongoing formation".

The Rite of Profession is a beautiful and powerfully moving ceremony in which the Candidate makes this commitment to the life of a Secular Franciscan. It is important to realize that when one makes this commitment, they are "professing" themselves to the worldwide Secular Franciscan Order. Again, it is not unlike the commitment I made at my Ordination. When I was ordained, I pledged myself to the Roman Catholic Church, not just one diocese, parish, or pastoral commitment. In this same way, when I profess to the Secular Franciscan Order, I will be doing so to the WHOLE Order and not just to the Fraternity to which I belong.

This Rite of Profession (which can be found here: https:// secularfranciscansusa.org/wp-content/uploads/Rite-of-Profession-within-the-Mass.pdf) is usually done within a Mass, but is always done with the intention of being a "witness"....a witness to the workings of the Secular Franciscan Order, a witness to the Fraternity Life that one engages themselves in the Order, a witness to the life of St. Francis himself! In making this Profession, one is making a statement, a pledge, to walk in the footsteps of Francis, who strove to walk in the footsteps of Christ. So, in essence, in making this commitment to the Secular Franciscan Order, one is deepening their commitment to Christ, Himself.

I humbly ask your prayer for myself, as well as Nancy and Kevin Smith (who are seeking Profession themselves in the same manner as I). I ask you to pray for a successful conclusion to this Initial Formation process and that our lifelong commitment through Profession bear fruit for ourselves, for those whom we love and who are in our care, and for the Church itself. May God Bless us, and may God Bless the Secular Franciscan Order.

#### THE DEACON'S COLUMN

#### The Unity of Sacred Scripture

What is your favorite Bible passage or story? Maybe it is the story of Jesus' birth in Luke's gospel or the story of the Prodigal Son? Perhaps, it is the story of Moses or David and Goliath. We all have our favorite stories from the Bible. Did you know that in the Bible there are 46 books in the Old Testament and 27 books in the New Testament for a total of 73 books in our Catholic Bible. These books collect the sacred stories of the Israelites that stretch back thousands of years. Even before invention of writing, sacred stories were handed down by word of mouth so that the truths they contained and communicated could be made known generation after generation. But of all the stories the Bible tells, there is only one word that is used to unite and describe all the stories in the Old and New Testament: Covenant.

A Covenant is a sacred agreement that binds people together in relationship. The Bible reveals to us truth that God desires to be in a relationship with all us. But what kind of relationship? In the creation stories of Genesis, we learn that God is a Good God who creates freely and deliberately. He creates us in his image and likeness and animates us with his own Spirit so that we could have a share in his dominion. From Abraham's descendants, God promises to fashion a holy people—a people through whom all nations find blessing (see Genesis 12). In Moses' time, God heard his people's cry and came to their assistance in Egypt freeing them from Pharoah. On Mt. Sinai, God gave the Israelites the commandments so that they cold live in the world as God's people. God promises David a Son who would be God's own Son and the dynasty that this Son establishes will endure through the ages. When the people are in exile God renews his promise through the prophets. Through them, he promises a savior and messiah who will not only rescue God's people but unite all the nations of the earth. Through all of these sacred stories, God has been preparing us for what he is going to do in Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ is the New Covenant and through our relationship with Jesus Christ we have eternal life.

St. Augustine writes about this mystery with these words: "The New Testament lies hidden in the Old and the Old Testament is unveiled in the New." It is for these reason that the Church deliberately links the Old Testament reading and the Gospel reading at Mass. Through the selection of readings, we are invited to see the link between the promises made in the Old Testament to their fulfillment in the Gospel. Though it is fruitful to read the Old Testament stories by their own merit, they take on new power when we read them considering the Gospel.

But there is another story that Jesus wants to be a part of that is not written in the Bible. That story is your story. How will the sacred story of Jesus Christ influence and direct your lives as his beloved children and our lives as his holy people? 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
