My Dear Friends in Christ,

Back in high school, I was asked by my pastor if I had ever considered a vocation to the priesthood. I can remember dis-



tinctly the reaction I had to that inquiry: I laughed in his face! There was no disrespected intended, for I was sure that he was joking; when he said that he wasn't, I was, to say the least, contrite if not downright remorseful. This encounter was then followed by two other (seemingly, at the moment) unrelated conversations. When the third conversation occurred surrounding this same topic I was, indeed, intrigued. Was God actually calling me to the priesthood? Did I dare say yes? When I did, eventually, say yes, my whole world changed. I realized that God was, indeed, calling me to be- come a "fisher of men" (Mk <u>1:17</u>).

In today's gospel, the response of the first followers of Jesus was far more immediate and sure. They left everything they had and followed Jesus, which must have taken extraordinary faith and courage. To leave everything you know, everything that holds you secure is an amazing "leap of faith". This is what God is calling us to do, to respond to our baptismal call by following Him. Yes, it does take an incredible amount of faith to do this, but when we do the results can be life-changing. We may not be called to leave everything we know, but that's not really the point of today's gospel. In its wider context, the gospel passage today is calling us to look within our own circles of friends, our own families, to see who needs to be "reeled in". There are many of our own who are "adrift" who are looking for "safe harbor", and we can be the one who brings them "safely to shore".

We can't be sure of what was going through the minds of those first disciples, but we know that there was something alluring about Jesus' call to them. It made them give up everything they knew, everything that held them secure, to follow Him. Is God calling us to something, something beyond ourselves? Is God calling us, by virtue of our baptismal call, to be disciples, to be (in paraphrasing the gospel) "fishers of people"? It could very well be that God is calling us and, for whatever reason – it could be apathy, fear or doubt – we are not responding as fully as we could/ should be.

Let us have the same trust the first disciples did. Let us attune our hearts to hear the call of Jesus so that others may come to know what we have come to know: that Jesus has come into the world to follow Him, now and into the Kingdom.

STRENGTH FOR THE WEEK

Hello, our friends!

In these days of turmoil in our country, I've been drawn increasingly to think of Saint John Paul II, someone who played a dramatic role on the world's stage and firmly believed that we need to **take seriously the very tensions found in governments**, **political ideologies**, and radical secularism as an *opportunity* for *proclaiming* the Gospel.

I still remember the power of the new Pontiff's voice as he proclaimed to the world: "To [Jesus'] saving power open the boundaries of states, economic and political systems, the vast fields of cultures, civilization and development. **Do not be afraid. Christ**

This past Sunday we celebrated the feast of the Baptism of the Lord and listened as God proclaimed the same message: "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him."

Unfortunately, we Christians, along with everyone else, have fallen for the illusion that political strategies are what ultimately drive history and re-build civilizations. Saint John Paul II, however, the saint who experienced both totalitarian regimes — Nazism and Communism — reminds us that we need more now than ever, to **take hold of the words of the Risen Christ: "Be Not Afraid."** He said in *Crossing the Threshold of Hope,* "Man who, even after the fall of Communism, has not stopped being afraid and who truly has many reasons for feeling this way, needs to hear these words. …People and nations of the entire world need to hear these words. **Their conscience needs to grow in the certainty that Someone exists who holds in His hands the destiny of this passing world; Someone who holds the keys to death and the netherworld (cf. Revelation 1:18).... He alone can give**

No matter what "team" you are on, whether red or blue, John Paul II would have us remember that it is ultimately not political strategies but Jesus Christ to whom we must listen. The new evangelization John Paul II proposed to the Church is rooted in the power of grace for the transformation of culture and the building up of the civilization of love. John Paul II would invite us to a dialogue with this culture, not condemnation or retreat. **The key to this dialogue is to appreciate and center on the dignity of the human person.**

Jared Staudt, of the Augustine Institute, points the way when he encourages us that the renewal of culture will come only from a renewal of holiness—think your holiness and mine, lay people, priests and religious, renewed parishes, dioceses, and religious communities.

It is what holy people do that attracts others to a way of life that will ultimately transform the world with the power of love.

This is the power that the saints wield in the world. **"Love is like a great force hidden within cultures in order to urge them to overcome their incurable finiteness** by opening themselves to him who is their Source and End, and to give them, when they do open themselves to his grace, enriching fullness" (Pope John Paul II in his Letter Establishing the Pontifical Council for Culture, May 20, 1982).

Communion Wafer

Question: Do Catholics always need to receive communion in wafer form, or can it be different kinds of bread?

In the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, the most common form for the eucharistic bread is the small white communion "wafer" that is a ubiquitous part of the Catholic Mass. The instructions of the Church have been very specific regarding the make-up of the bread used in the Mass: "The bread used in the celebration of the Most Holy Eucharistic Sacrifice must be unleavened, purely of wheat, and recently made ... it follows therefore that bread made from another substance, even if it is grain, or if it is mixed with another substance different from wheat to such an extent that it would not commonly be considered wheat bread, does not constitute valid matter for confecting the Sacrifice and the Eucharistic Sacrament" (see Redemptionis Sacramentum by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, no. 48).

The Church's tradition of using a wheat-based bread is based on the bread that Jesus would have used at the Last Supper and is considered to be an essential part of the "matter" of the Sacrament of the Eucharist.

As we consider the question of whether a "wafer" — which is properly called a "host" — should be used, we also must keep in mind that in the Eastern Rites of the Catholic Church, leavened (i.e. "raised") bread is more often used. And so, while the thin, white "wafer" is most commonly used in the Roman Rite of the Church, the full expression of the Catholic tradition does allow for a more substantial form of bread to be used, but the tradition of using a simple wheat bread with no other additions or additives is considered essential.
