MASSES FOR THE WEEK



My Dear Friends in Christ,

In today's gospel, Jesus goes about enacting healings of all sorts – physical, emotional, and spiritual. It shows the reader of the gospel that Jesus cares for us in all ways – body, mind, and spirit. After these healings, Jesus does something interesting of which we should take notice. Mark tells us that "He left and went off to a deserted place, where He prayed." (Mark 1:35). It's a wonderful reminder to us that along with all the work we are called to do, it is crucial for us to find time for ourselves in out-of-the-way places and (re)connect with God. As my mother would say, "if it's good enough for Jesus, it's good enough for me".

As some of you might know, I have become involved in the various activities at the Holy Cross Retreat House in Easton. I volunteer my time on Mondays and help clean up from the weekend retreats that are hosted there, help serve meals at these aforementioned retreats, and also take part in the various spiritual endeavors held at the Retreat House. We even recently took our Confirmation students there for a day's retreat, which was a wonderfully prayerful afternoon!

One of the long-time activities that is hosted at the Retreat House is Cursillo. Cursillo, for those who are not aware, is "A Short Course in Christianity" ("cursillo" is Spanish for "short course", in this case in Christianity). When I "lived" my Cursillo, about seven years ago, I had heard about it but wasn't well-versed in the experience. It is an intensely powerful, Spirit-led weekend which had a profound effect on my spiritual life and my priesthood. It gave me that "lived" experience which has allowed me to encourage others to "live" (which is the word used in Cursillo when one goes through the weekend) Cursillo.

Next weekend (2/10-11), we will be having an "Information Weekend" regarding Cursillo, with folks who have lived Cursillo speak on their experience at Mass and who will be available to answer any questions you might have about this experience. We will also be having an "Ultreya Mass" at 6:00 on Tuesday evening, 2/13, at St. John's (East Bridgewater), which will be an opportunity for both those who have lived Cursillo, and those who want to know more about it, to come together in prayer and worship. I hope that you will "come and see" what all the "buzz" about Cursillo is all about! De Colores (if you know, you know; if you don't, come on the weekend of the 10th/11th and Mass on the 13th and find out!).

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

In the first reading this weekend, we hear Job lament about life being a "drudgery" (Job 7:1), whose "days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle; they come to an end without hope" (Job 7:6). How awful that must have been for Job, and how awful it must have been for anyone whose life seems that way. No doubt, St. Francis went through periods, both before and after his conversion, where this was true. Many people think that when one goes through a conversion experience, especially one such as the dramatic one St. Francis went through, life is all "sunshine, roses, and lollipops"...but it is not. Life has its imperfections, and will be imperfect until we reach the Kingdom. Until then, we can have times when we struggle with life's vagaries.

St. Francis had his challenges before his conversion, mainly trying to figure out a path in life. Once he heard the Lord speak to him in the little Church of San Damiano, he had a deep and abiding trust in the Lord. This did not mean, however, that his life (post-conversion) was without struggle and disappointment. St. Francis was plagued by difficulties later in his life, including two failed pilgrimages to the Holy Land and the loss of his eyesight, but he did not lose his positive outlook. He continued to find joy and peace in prayer and God's creation.

Ultimately, Job finds his way back to the Lord. If we "stay the course" with Job, we see that while he had his struggles, he never lost hope that the good God who created him was with him (even when (seemingly) hidden). May we have the same trust and hope that Job did, that Francis did. May we come to believe that God will never leave us abandoned, even when He seems "hidden".

"The trade in human beings, a modern form of slavery, ... violates the God-given dignity of so many of our brothers and sisters and constitutes a true crime against humanity." —Pope Francis

You may not see the problem, but it's there. The US State Department estimates there are 24.9 million human trafficking victims worldwide. This is not something that occurs only in dark alleys in the far corners of the Earth, though. It's happening around the world every day.

<u>Human trafficking is considered modern-day slavery</u>, and there are more slaves today than at any time in history.

"They are hidden from view. You don't recognize them in the back kitchens, shops, gas stations and in hospitality. They are also tucked away in fields. They don't come out and ask for help. It's a different kind of slavery than long ago," says Dr. Lucy Steinitz, Catholic Relief Services senior technical advisor for protection. "They are not in shackles or on farms. People are coerced into harsh employment under horrible conditions, and then have no freedom to leave. They are beaten, violated and told they are worthless—that no one else wants them anymore."

There are 3 ways you can help stop human trafficking:

1. Purchase a Gift for Trafficking Survivors

After escape or rescue, trafficking survivors remain at great risk until they can re-establish their lives. CRS' kits provide a month's supply of food, medicine, bedding, clothing and hygiene items.

2. Prevent Human Trafficking

The best response to human trafficking is to prevent people from being trafficked in the first place. CRS' work in agriculture and livelihoods, education, shelter, inclusive value chains, emergency response and recovery and other programming aims to help people prosper at home. Prosperity at home greatly reduces the false enticements of the trafficking trade.

3. Take Action

If you witness suspected human trafficking or other forms of exploitation, speak up. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has been a national leader in advocacy and education efforts related to sex and labor trafficking. <u>These resources</u> can help you take action if you believe there are human trafficking victims in your community. Human trafficking may be a crime against humanity, but as a human you can be the light. Crs.org
