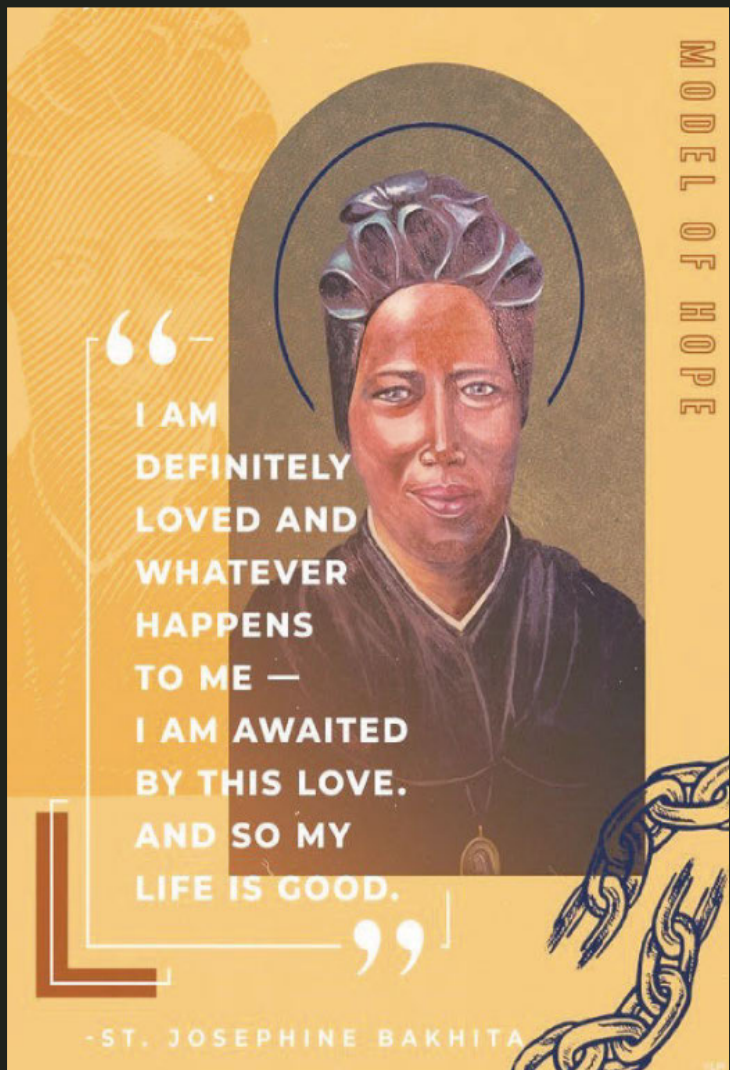
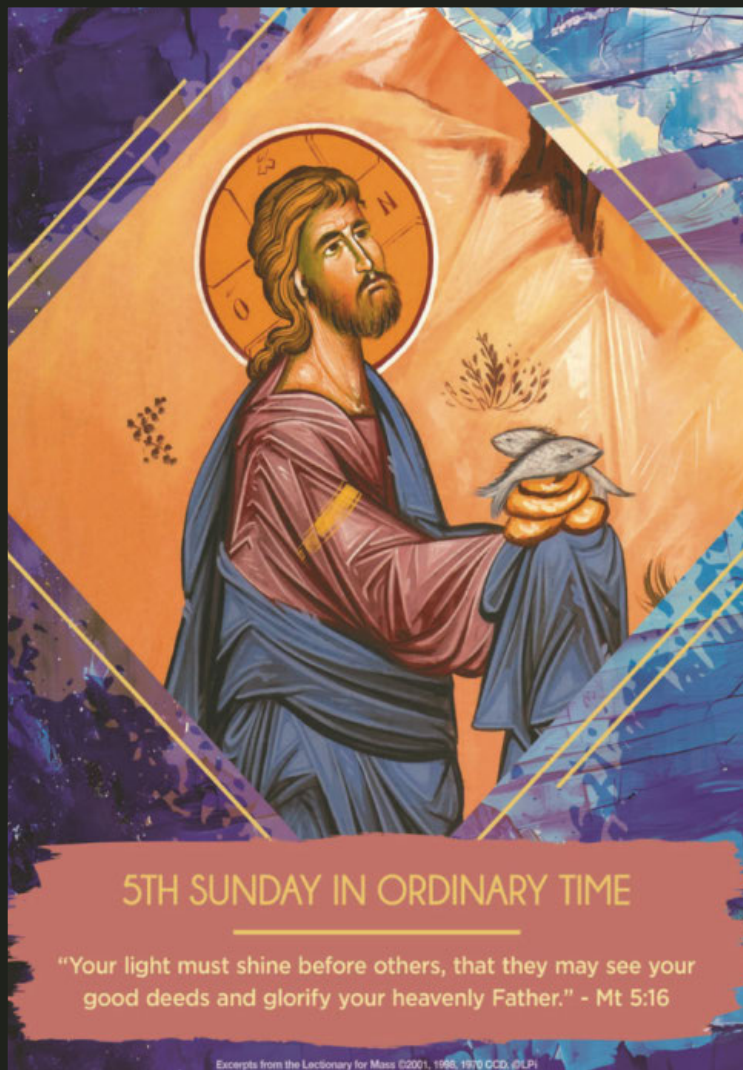

My Dear Friends in Christ,

When one does a “Google search” on the phrase “salt and light”, one comes up with over nine million entries. Listings abound, with everything from church ministries to small faith communities to t-shirts emblazoned with a salt shaker and a light bulb! All of them have one thing in common — they trace their origin back to today’s gospel passage in which Jesus uses the images of salt and light to describe how we, as Christians, are to be and act in the world.

Jesus, throughout His earthly ministry, used “earthly” images. This is understandable, given that people of His day were so connected to the earth and its environs. Jesus, in using images such as this, as well as speaking in parables (stories which point to a greater truth), wanted people to strive for a higher reality, one which reaches beyond this world. One may wonder how effective these images and stories are today, since we have become somewhat “disconnected” with our environment, often seeing it merely as a place to “hang our hat” while we go through life. I think it would be a mistake for us to fall into this trap; the earth isn’t just a “stopping point” for us until we get to heaven. Our earthly journey is meant as a learning experience for us so that when we do (God willing) make it to heaven we can know that we helped “build the Kingdom” in our time here. This is why we pray, in the “Our Father”, “thy Kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.” It is no accident that we are here on earth, which is why we are called to be “salt and light” to the world.

Salt and light are connected by their dispensation. When one uses too little salt in a meal, it can be bland and tasteless; when one uses too little light, one can stumble and fall. Conversely, when one uses too much salt, the dish being prepared can be “overwhelmed” by the spice; when one uses too much light, one can be blinded and thus rendered unable to move freely. In using both salt and light, a balance must be achieved; in the same way, in our lives of faith balance must be struck so that the message of Holy Scripture and Tradition as found in our Church can be heard, acted upon and lived. If one lives their life of faith sparingly, the message of faith might go unheard; if one is too “heavy-handed”, then people are turned off and the message is similarly lost.

May we have the courage to be “salt and light” to our brothers and sisters. May we be a “light to the nations” and may we “spice up” the world when able and necessary. May we effectively preach the gospel in word and deed by sensing the needs of our brothers and sisters, responding to those needs and thus bringing forth the greater glory of God.

I Believe in One Lord Jesus Christ: If It Is Not Assumed It Is Not Healed

As we come to the final reflection on the section of the Nicene Creed that centers on our belief in Jesus Christ, I wish to call to your attention the basic structure of the creed as we have it in English. In total there is one sentence that describes the Father, five for the Son, one for the Holy Spirit, and one for the Church. The structure of the second section reveals what the Church believes to be true concerning Jesus Christ—He is True God and True Man. Of the five sentences dedicated to the Son, the first two sentences deal with Jesus as being consubstantial with the Father before all ages and teaches that for us the eternal Son is incarnate and becomes man. The next two sentences reveal what Jesus does for us as man: he suffered death on a cross and rose from the dead and ascended into heaven. Then, in the last sentence, the creed turns our attention to the Christian's hope that Jesus will come again at the end of time to usher in his eternal kingdom of which there is no end.

The sheer number of words dedicated to the Son, reveals that there were significant confusions and debates about who Jesus is and what he does for us. Some believed that Jesus was truly God and only appeared to be a human being. Others argued that Jesus was not truly divine but was adopted as God's Son at his Baptism. Though he enjoyed a special relationship with the Father, he was a creature—not the creator. There were still others who wrestled with the question, “how can Jesus be God and man?”

Apollinaris of Laodicea (died AD 382) was a bishop in Syria who taught that Jesus, a divine person, had a human body but did not have a human soul. The soul is where the powers of intellect and will reside. Apollinaris did not believe Jesus had a human intellect and will—instead, the divine intellect and will of the eternal Son replaced the human soul. Yet, scripture suggests the opposite. In the Gospel of St. Luke we are told that after Jesus is found in the Temple at age 12, he “grew in wisdom and understanding (2:52).” The faith of the Church teaches that Jesus is like us in all things but sin.

St. Gregory of Nazianzus, one of the three Cappadocian Fathers of the Church, writes against Apollinarianism in a letter to Cledonius, “For that which He has not assumed He has not healed; but that which is united to His Godhead is also saved. If only half Adam fell, then that which Christ assumes and saves may be half also; but if the whole of his nature fell, it must be united to the whole nature of Him that was begotten, and so be saved as a whole.” This teaching from St. Gregory affirms that humans are a unity of body AND soul. Our bodies rely on the soul to give it direction and purpose. A human act is an act that is motivated and directed by the soul's power of intellect and will. The body does not sin without the intellect and will. By becoming a true human being, our human nature, body and soul, is touched by the person of Jesus Christ and healed. The Apollinarianism heresy was condemned at the Council of Constantinople in AD 381.

This teaching can be a great source of consolation. As scripture reveals, Jesus is truly Emmanuel—that is, God with Us! God knows what it is like to live a full human life. He knows what it is like to be hungry and thirsty. He knows what it is like to be adventurous and curious. He knows what it is like to love and be loved, to be held and to hold. He knows what it is like to wonder and learn. In Jesus, God knows what it is like to laugh and to cry, to celebrate and to mourn. Because Jesus suffers and dies, God knows what it is like to suffer the same. By assuming a true human nature—God is with us in all of these ways so that the grace of his eternal presence might touch our wounded nature, heal it, and elevate it to participate in his own life.



MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

In today's gospel, Jesus challenges His followers to be salt and light. We are called to be “salt” by bringing some “spice” into the world and by bringing our own unique “flavor” to whatever relationships in which we find ourselves. We are called to be “light” by illuminating the darkness of the world and by letting Christ's light shine forth from us as we strive to “be Christ” for others and “see Christ” in others. Francis did this in many significant ways.

Francis was “salt” because he was not afraid to shake things up a bit and walk a unique path. He saw things differently than others, sometimes even his own brothers, and was unafraid to preach a word that would, as humorist Finley Peter Dunne would say, “comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable”. He stripped naked in the town square to disavow material possessions. He visited the Sultan and brought the Gospel to regions that had not been exposed to the Word of God. He met with cardinals and popes to bring forth his Rule and make sure it lasted beyond himself. In all of this, his “saltiness” was what was needed, whether those around him realized or not!

Francis was “light” because he realized that the world in general, and the Church specifically, was in disarray. He was called by God to “rebuild the Church” and he did this, in large part, by illuminating the need for Christ's light in a darkened world. He did this by acknowledging that “All the darkness in the world cannot extinguish the light of a single candle”. He may have only been one candle, but he lit others' candles by bringing his own into the world.

Jesus calls us to be “salt and light”. May we, through the intercession of St. Francis of Assisi, do that by spicing up the world (or, at least, our little corner of it) with our “salt”, and illuminating the dark corners of the Church and world which have been darkened by sin and suffering with our “light”.
