




A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Somebody once asked Charles Darwin, the proponent of the theory of evolution, the question "Is there anything that is true only of man?" Darwin answered: "Man is the only animal that blushes". What does it mean to blush? Well, basically it is an acknowledgement of being embarrassed over something. When we do something wrong, whether wittingly or unwittingly, we tend to get embarrassed; only the most callous of people would not do so. When we do purposely do something wrong which hurts or harms ourselves, another and/or God, we call that "sin". In the \Catholic tradition, this purposeful engagement of wrongful behavior results in a damaging of (in the case of

venial sin) or break in the relationship (i.e. mortal sin)

which we have with others and God.

Thank God we have the Sacrament of Reconciliation to "right the ship", as it were, restoring that relationship back to where it should be. We also have the Ten Commandments, which are offered to us as a way of living. The Ten Commandments are a "blueprint" for living a life rooted in God's love. More than that, however, the Commandments are mandates (otherwise, they might have been given as the "Ten Suggestions", as I saw alluded to on a bumper sticker a while back!) from God on how we are to treat ourselves, others and God, and how we are to look critically at our lives. When we hear the word "mandate", we shouldn't be fearful; on the contrary, we are given this mandate from God (in the form of the Commandments) so as to live in freedom, a true and lasting freedom which the world cannot give.

Jesus, in speaking of the law and the prophets, tells His audience that He has come to fulfill, not abolish, them. The fulfillment of these comes through Jesus' own life, death and resurrection. When Jesus comes "on the scene", the Scribes and the Pharisees are controlling how the people view and live these realities (of the law and the prophets). The only problem is, they themselves aren't always living them; they are "talking the talk" but not always "walking the walk". This is the difference with Jesus. In fulfilling the law and the prophets, Jesus helps us to live both in the "letter" and in the "spirit" of the law, found in the Commandments and the prophets, found in Him. In doing this, Jesus brings about a radically new way of both perceiving and living life in God.

The Commandments are important both for the revelation of God's presence in the world and for His need to bring order out of chaos. They are also important in that they help us to live in full relationship with Him. May we have the courage to live both in the letter and spirit of the Law. May this Law bring about a freedom to live more fully alive in God, and help us to work toward the building up of the Kingdom here on earth, the betterment of ourselves and our brothers and sisters and for the greater glory of God!

I Believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord the Giver of Life

Last week, I made reference to the Council of Constantinople in the year AD 381. Having settled the question of Jesus' true and full humanity, the Council turned its attention to define what she believed about the Holy Spirit. Half a century earlier at Nicaea, the Bishops of the Church were focused on defending the true humanity and divinity of Jesus that it did not feel the need to define the Holy Spirit in its Creed. The creed of Nicaea simply read, "I believe in the Holy Spirit" after outlining what it believed about the Lord Jesus Christ. But by the year AD 381, there were a group of people led by Macedonius, the Bishop of Constantinople from AD 342-360. This group of people denied the divinity of the Holy Spirit—hence they were commonly known as the Spirit Fighters from the greek word, *Pneumatomachi* (pneuma=spirit; machi=battle or combat). The Spirit Fighters taught that, like the Son, the Holy Spirit was a creature who worked on behalf of the Father and the Son. This way of thinking was condemned by Pope Damascus I in AD 374 and at the Council of Constantinople, the following words were added to the Nicene Creed, "And in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the Giver of Life, Who proceeds from the Father, Who with the Father and the Son is equally worshipped and glorified, Who spoke through the prophets."

The Council affirmed what most Christians believed about the Holy Spirit, that the Holy Spirit is his own person active not only in creation, but in our redemption and sanctification. The Holy Spirit was active in creation. Genesis speaks about a mighty wind calming the waters of chaos ahead of God's first command. "Let there be light." The Holy Spirit was breathed into Adam and Eve giving them life from his life. In the form of a mighty wind and fire, the Holy Spirit led the Israelites through the wilderness into the promised land. The Holy Spirit anointed judges, kings, and prophets. The Spirit overshadowed Mary and conceived Jesus in her womb. The Spirit descended upon Jesus at his baptism. The Holy Spirit drove Jesus into the desert to be tempted by Satan. Simeon, received a message from the Holy Spirit that he would not die until he saw the messiah. In Nazareth, Jesus announces to all in the synagogue that the Spirit of the Lord is upon him to bring glad tidings to the poor. The Holy Spirit is promised by Jesus to the disciples to be their advocate and guide. This promise is fulfilled when the Holy Spirit descends upon the disciples after the resurrection. This same Spirit gives the disciples the courage to move out of hiding to proclaim the Gospel to the ends of the earth.

In the life of the Church the same Spirit is given to us and is with us as our advocate and guide. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that the Spirit is "in the Scriptures, in the Tradition, in the Church's Magisterium, in the sacramental liturgy, in prayer, in the charisms and ministries of the Church, in the signs of apostolic and missionary life, and in the witness of the saints.

The same Spirit that was in the Old Testament, in the life of Jesus, and in the ministry of the Church, is given to each one of us at our Baptism. The Spirit configures us to Christ. The Spirit gives us the theological virtues of faith, hope, and love. The Spirit strengthens our souls with the gifts of wisdom, understanding, courage, counsel, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord. The Holy Spirit fills us so that we may bear fruit in the forms of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control. The Holy Spirit is the work horse of the Blessed Trinity and we are proud to confess that we believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the Giver of Life!

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY



Today's readings focus in on the (Ten) Commandments. Many see the Commandments in terms of "do's and don'ts", "rules and regulations". As a faithful servant of Christ and His Church, I believe that St. Francis would see

beyond the "letter of the law", peering deeply into the "spirit of the law" and how it can be applied in society. Francis was always one to be fully "in the world" while still maintaining his focus/vision towards the Kingdom. When we look at all of our fellow human beings and other creatures in light of the Gospel, we will understand why the Church raises certain concerns in its teachings on Social Justice. Too often we fail to recognize what is unjust according to God's way of thinking. because in our experience things have always been that way. Therefore, we tend to accept them as they are, thinking that things are supposed to be that way. We have tended to separate our theological beliefs from our understanding of and our analysis of society. So, we need some training and guidance in applying our theological beliefs to society (our social organization, economy, politics, laws, etc.) which we tend to evaluate according to merely secular values. True social justice is neither liberal nor conservative, neither Democratic nor Republican. It may call for viewing things in a different way than we are used to; it may challenge our familiar attitudes. For that reason, a just vision of society may make us uncomfortable, but Jesus' teachings were never about being comfortable. Following Christ calls us to ongoing conversion. At times, therefore, we need to be made uncomfortable in our thinking in order to move closer to Christ's Gospel message. For those of us who are Franciscan or associated with a Franciscan vision, a socially just vision of reality begins with our Franciscan understanding of Christ. In Franciscan theology, in God's plan of creation. God planned from the beginning that God would become human, so that a human, God's creature, could give perfect love to God.

God as human was not a result of sin, but of God's eternal selfgiving plan of creation. God in human flesh was the model after which all else would be created. This is St. Paul's "first born of all Creation." After Adam's sin, the God-Human would have to live in a world infected by sin, and, therefore, endure suffering and death. Nevertheless, Jesus remains as the first of all creatures, the model from whom all other creatures receive their worth. Every human person and every creature, from the lowly blade of grass to the magnificent planets of the heavens, shares in the divine life and worth. That divine worth makes all creatures sacred and stands as the basis for their rights. This worth is conferred by God in creating them and is not based on the behavior of the person or creature. Nor is its value measured by its contribution to either the economy or to the scheme of the universe. The justice due to him, her, or it comes from this sacred existence given by God. The rights of any creature are conferred by God in creating it and not from any human law or other human decision. May we, as our Gospel reminds us, let our "'yes' mean 'yes' and our 'no' mean 'no' ". May we live fully in Christ by seeing Christ for others and being Christ for others.






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
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
