My Dear Friends in Christ,

Back when I was in seminary, I would help out with retreats run by the Office for Young Adults. During these retreats, we would engage in what were called “trust walks”. We would pair up those on retreat and blindfold one of them; the one who was not blindfolded would then walk the other through a makeshift obstacle course. The “trust” element came into play at this point, with the blindfolded person having to trust that the non-blindfolded person would not lead them astray, causing them to stumble and fall. The point of the exercise was to illustrate that we are called to trust God, who we cannot “see”, to lead us on a path that would not cause us to stumble and fall.

Jesus, in today’s gospel speaks, in a way, about the blind leading the blind. In interacting with our brothers and sisters, if one is to “lead” the other they must have the “vision” to do so. One cannot *both* be blind, or else they would both stumble and fall. The same is true for the other analogies which Jesus uses in today’s gospel. Jesus ventures a bit into hyperbole with the image of the splinter and the wooden beam (Lk 6:41-42), but His point is still valid: one cannot help another to see if their own vision is so compromised as to the point of blindness themselves. Finally, Jesus moves into the realm of good and evil. Jesus’ image of the good and bad trees and the fruit they produce speak to the fact that if one’s spiritual “roots” are poisoned (by sin), one cannot produce anything but bad fruit. The image of good and evil is furthered by what lay in one’s own heart. In the gospel passage’s conclusion, Jesus tells us that it is “from the fullness of the heart the mouth-speaks” (Lk 6:45). Jesus tells us that if one’s heart is evil, one speaks evil and if one’s heart is good, it will speak only of good things.

This gospel passage (much like last week’s gospel, which precedes this passage) is less of a condemnation as it is a “cautionary tale”. Today’s gospel serves as a warning to us as to how to live our lives. We must first look within our own heart to examine motives and motivations, and rid ourselves of any malice, evil, or wrong thinking, none of which is how the Lord wants us to live our lives. May we have the courage to look deep within ourselves and “root out” anything that is not of God. May we know that God wishes to only speak that which is beneficial, good, and fruitful. May we have the courage to live in accord with God’s ways and help others to do the same – not lording it over them, but doing so in humility and love.

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- For the Catholic Church, there is a "line in the sand," which can never be crossed, and that is to not allow anyone who harms or would harm a child to exercise public ministry, said Cardinal Sean P. O'Malley of Boston.

In fact, removing someone from public ministry for abuse should be seen not so much as a punitive act as much as it is an urgent pastoral and "prudential" measure to keep young people safe, added Archbishop Charles Scicluna of Malta.

The cardinal and archbishop spoke with reporters Feb. 22 at a news conference during the second day of a Vatican summit on child protection in the church.

They were responding to questions as to why there seemed to be resistance or reluctance to adopting "zero tolerance" policies and why, in some cases, leaders are hesitant to even use the term.

One reporter noted that, to the dismay of survivors gathered in Rome, "zero tolerance" was not mentioned on a list of 21 points Pope Francis distributed Feb. 21 for reflection -- points that had been compiled from ideas bishops had provided beforehand.

Cardinal O'Malley, who is a papal adviser on the Council of Cardinals and president of the Pontifical Commission for the Protection of Minors, said, "I know there is a lot of resistance to using that terminology," perhaps it sounds too "secular, I don't know." But he said zero tolerance reflects a principle that was "so clearly articulated" by St. John Paul II in 2002 when he said that there is no place in the priesthood or religious life for those who would harm the young.

That principle, Cardinal O'Malley said, "has to be a line in the sand."

Responding to a related question, he said he would advocate the removal of a person from ministry for all cases of abuse against minors everywhere and clarified that additional penalties -- such as dismissal from the clerical state or a life of prayer and penance -- would vary, following the principle of proportionality of punishment.

Archbishop Scicluna said another way to look at the situation would be to see removal from ministry as an action that "has nothing to do with punishment, but (is) a prudential and urgent" measure that is taken to guarantee the safety of minors.

LEADER: We adore you, O Christ, and we praise You,

True power only comes from God and all power rests in God. We can easily fall into a trap, believing worldly powers have tied our hands. But the reality is that no one has power over us unless we grant them that power. The only one we should be surrendering power to is God.





I was traveling recently and watched as a wife led her blind husband onto the plane by her arm. She lovingly helped him into his seat and made sure he was comfortable. She placed their bags above in the bin and then sat next to him. They were ready for the flight. As I sat in my seat just a few rows away, I wondered what he would do if she ever left his side.

Sometimes those we love in our life can be blind, and we need to be their eyes. They aren't physically blind, but they are unable to see the truth about their life, situation, or needs. We need to lend them our sight and insight, or they will remain in their world of darkness.

Jesus asked his disciples, "Can a blind person guide a blind person?" If we aren't actively working to be sure that we can see clearly, what will we be able to offer someone we care about when they come to us with their blindness? Can you lead someone to Christ if you aren't living a life with him yourself? Can you share with another truth if you aren't concerned with knowing the truth yourself?

Life is not always easy. Without faith, hope, and love, the road can be too hard to travel. We are not created to be alone. Instead, we are created to be traveling companions. However, the blind cannot lead the blind. May the Light of Christ dispel your darkness and give you sight so that when the call comes, you might lend an arm to lead the blind.


