

My Dear Friends in Christ,

When I have the opportunity to get to the movies I like to get there early enough to see the "Coming Attractions", those features that will be arriving in the theatre in the next few weeks and months. Today's gospel is a "preview" of sorts, for it places in our minds and hearts the end result of Jesus' earthly mission. In



the Transfiguration, Jesus shows Himself to Peter, James and John as He will be, after the Resurrection. This moment prepares us, as well, for the glory of the Lord, not only at the end of time but at Easter as well. In this way we recognize that Jesus, in His glorified form, will transform us by His presence in our lives. Again, this personal transformation needs to happen here and now, not at the "end time". The transfiguration of Jesus goes "hand in hand" with our "metamorphosis of the spirit. As Jesus is changed, so are our hearts, minds and lives.

The Transfiguration also shows to us another very important aspect of our lives of faith. Appearing with Jesus are Elijah and Moses. In their joining with Jesus on the mountain, we see that Jesus, true to His word, is the fulfillment and embodiment of both the Law (represented by Moses) and the Prophets (represented by Elijah). We, for our part, are called to follow the Law (of God) both in letter and in spirit. We do this by taking that law and living it out in the everyday. We fulfill and emulate the role of Elijah in this scene by speaking with a prophetic voice, speaking a word that must be uttered to a world yearning to hear truth (whether they know it or not!). This is not easy; it is done oftentimes when we "bear (our) share of hardship for the gospel with the strength that comes from God" (2 Tim 1:8b). In doing this, however, we fulfill our baptismal call to serve our brothers and sisters, our community, our God.

As we move through our Lenten journey, may we continue to seek out the Lord by our works of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Let all who come across our path "find a blessing" (Gn. 12:3) in us, as they did with Abram (who, himself, will go through a "transformation" in going from Abram to Abraham, the "father of many nations"). Let us experience the Transfiguration time and time again by exploring and discovering who God is for us. May we, when we discover God at work in our lives, be willing to let God work in and through us. May this "sneak preview" God affords us on this day awaken in us the hope and promise of the Almighty One. May we be "transfigured", changed not in body but in spirit, a Spirit of hope, joy and love.



EASTER THIS YEAR IS ON APRIL 9TH

The three common practices during Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

Prayers:

"God, may Your light guide my day, and your spirit bring me peace.....

"God may my sacrifice of today of (state your Lenten sacrifice) remind me of my dependence on You for all the blessing I enjoy....

"May I stand in solidarity today with all my brothers and sisters around the world who are suffering."

What are the rules for fast and abstinence in Lent?

Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence (as well as Good Friday).

The law of abstinence binds those who are 14 years old or older.

Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

According to the Church's official rules:

The law of abstinence forbids the use of meat, but not of eggs, the products of milk or condiments made of animal fat [*Paenitemini*, Norms III:1].

Do you have to give up something for Lent? If you do, can you have it on Sundays?

The traditional custom of giving up something for Lent is voluntary. Consequently, if you give something up, you set the parameters. If you choose to allow yourself to have it on Sundays as to promote joy on this holy day, that is up to you.

Almsgiving:

The foundational call of Christians to charity is a frequent theme of Gospels. During Lent, we are asked to focus more intently on "almsgiving," which means donating money or goods to the poor and performing other acts of charity



MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

On Ash Wednesday, the liturgical season of Lent officially began – the 40-day penitential period in preparation for Easter. However, in centuries past, saints like Francis of Assisi observed

multiple "Lenten" periods throughout the year. In the 13th century, St. Francis of Assisi devoted himself to prayer and fasting for 40-day periods four or five times a year. In addition to the traditional Lenten period preceding Easter, Francis would pray from the Feast of Sts. Peter and Paul (June 29) to the Assumption of Mary (August 15), from the Assumption to Michaelmas (September 29), and for the four weeks preceding Christmas (Advent). During these periods, he would suspend his apostolic ministries and withdraw to the hermitages. The hermitages were simple, austere places up in the hills and mountains, away from the towns and cities. Thomas of Celano, St. Francis' first biographer, wrote: "In the clefts of the rock he would build his nest and in the hollow places of the wall his dwelling."

The most well-known Franciscan hermitage near Assisi is known as the Carceri. Founded by St. Francis, Franciscan friars remain there to this day. Throughout his life, St. Francis founded some 20 other hermitages in central Italy. The hermitages were so important to St. Francis that he wrote a Rule for the Hermitages, describing how the friars should pray and conduct themselves while living as hermits. He said that some friars should dedicate themselves exclusively to prayer, while other friars should look after the needs of the community. Then they should switch roles.

St. Francis' early biographers show us what happened to him during these periods of prayer during his Lents. Thomas of Celano wrote: "His whole soul thirsted after Christ, and he dedicated not only his whole heart, but his whole body as well, to him." He also wrote about Francis and prayer: "For his safest haven was prayer; not prayer of a single moment, or idle or presumptuous prayer, but prayer of long duration; full of devotion, serene in humility. If he began late, he would scarcely finish before morning. Walking, sitting, eating, or drinking, he was always intent upon prayer. He would go alone to pray at night in churches abandoned and located in deserted places, where, under the protection of divine grace, he overcame many fears and many disturbances of mind.' It becomes apparent that through prayer, Francis became more and more a channel of God's grace and love. These deep, intense periods of prayer transformed St. Francis. Thomas of Celano said of Francis: "Thus he would direct all his attention and affection toward the one thing he asked of the Lord, not so much praying as becoming totally prayer." He said that after praying, Francis was changed almost into another man another Christ. At the end of the 40 days, Francis would leave his hermitage and go back down to the valley, but not without being transformed and becoming more Christ-like. Then he would dedicate himself to serving God's people: the lepers, the community, the Church. Few among us can dedicate ourselves exclusively to prayer for 40 days. However, as we begin our Lent, may St. Francis' example guide and inspire us on our own journey.
