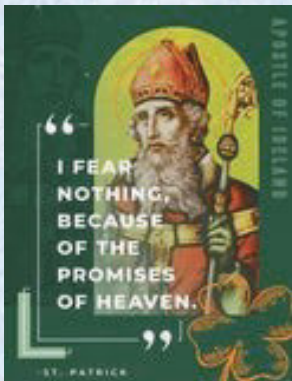

My Dear Friends in Christ,



Have you ever been so caught up in your daily routine that you fail to see Jesus in it? Of course you have – we all have. I think this to be less of a condition of faith than a case of humility. What do I mean by that? Well, I believe that sometimes we forget the humanity of Jesus to such a point that we don't think that He ever would "lower" Himself to be with us. We want Jesus to be divine – and He is! We also want Him to understand those things we are going through in our daily lives – and He does.

Today's gospel is a perfect "case in point" of that phenomenon. When Jesus approach Jacob's well, He is thirsty; it is noon (so it is most likely hot), and Jesus is tired from His journey. Who wouldn't be? What happens next is something which distinguishes this event from any ordinary encounter one might have at such a place. First off, there is the idea of a Jew asking for something from a Samaritan. Next, there is the cultural barrier of a man approaching a woman not his wife for any reason. Finally, there is the level of conversation in which Jesus engages the Samaritan woman. Any of these three things would make this event "stand out", but for all three to happen in the same encounter is truly amazing! Then again, Jesus is anything but conventional in His thinking, acting or living.

Jesus' desire for water is just the "jumping off point" for a further exploration into the Samaritan woman's life, the worship practices of Jews and Gentiles and the mission of Jesus. When Jesus reveals details about this woman, it is clear that He "knows" her (by "knowing", I speak here of her soul (note the conversation about her husbands)), even though they have never met. In speaking of "living water" (Jn. 4:10), Jesus is speaking about Himself being the "spring of water welling up to eternal life" (Jn. 4:14). In speaking of worshipping "neither on this mountain (Mt. Gerizim) nor in Jerusalem (where Jesus will complete His earthly mission)" (Jn. 4:21), Jesus expands the vision of His mission to include all places, all times, all peoples.

This is where we "come into the picture." Jesus sees into our souls (just as He did with the Samaritan woman), helping us to confront evil and sin which may be blocking us from fully experiencing God's goodness. Jesus gives us that "living water" (Jn. 4:10) when we approach Him in humility, He "quenches our thirst" for mercy and love (in our lives and in the world). When Jesus expands His mission, we are brought "into the fold", and Jesus becomes an integral part of our journey of faith.

Let us have the courage to invite Jesus into our lives, letting His "living water" (ibid.) satisfy our thirst for righteousness. Let us allow Jesus to heal us of that which is preventing us from loving fully God and neighbor. Let us use this Lenten journey as a time for deepening our relationship with the One who comes to bring life in abundance.

EASTER THIS YEAR IS ON APRIL 9TH

The three common practices during Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

Prayers:

“God, may Your light guide my day, and your spirit bring me peace.....

“God may my sacrifice of today of (state your Lenten sacrifice) remind me of my dependence on You for all the blessing I enjoy....

“May I stand in solidarity today with all my brothers and sisters around the world who are suffering.”

What are the rules for fast and abstinence in Lent?

Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence (as well as Good Friday). .

The law of abstinence binds those who are 14 years old or older.

Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

According to the Church's official rules:

The law of abstinence forbids the use of meat, but not of eggs, the products of milk or condiments made of animal fat [*Paenitemini*, Norms III:1].

Do you have to give up something for Lent? If you do, can you have it on Sundays?

The traditional custom of giving up something for Lent is voluntary. Consequently, if you give something up, you set the parameters. If you choose to allow yourself to have it on Sundays as to promote joy on this holy day, that is up to you.

Almsgiving:

The foundational call of Christians to charity is a frequent theme of Gospels. During Lent, we are asked to focus more intently on “almsgiving,” which means donating money or goods to the poor and performing other acts of charity



MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

St. Francis was ordained as a Deacon, never a priest. And he LIVED his Diaconate in every sense of the work - *Diakonos*...**service**. Francis lived a life of radical hospitality. He welcomed all, stranger, Muslim, Christian, woman, child, etc., as Christ. Ever since his encounter with the poor beggar man, wherein Francis gave him his cloak, Francis lived a life for others. He lived his life as an *alter Christus* (another Christ).

Francis had a great love for the Church, he had a great love for the people of God, a great love for the Liturgy in all its splendor, and he had a great love for beauty. Francis lived the radical hospitality, which the Gospel demands with such fervor that he saw God's presence in the beauty of each part of Creation. Whether it be Sister Moon, Brother Wolf, Sister Breeze, Brother Leo, Sister Clare, or even Sister Death...*from whom no mortal can escape*. Francis saw the presence of God, the *incarnation* of Christ in every living being. He lived the mystery of the Incarnation, because he honored Christ's presence, wherever and whenever he found it.

Francis was joyful. There's no doubting that. Read any commentary you ever could on him, watch Bishop Robert Barron's *The Pivotal Players* episode on him (I HIGHLY RECOMMEND DOING SO) and you will see a man, faced with trials, with sin, with struggles, yet as he walked he sang. As he received he gave. As he lived, so he loved.

Francis abandoned the pleasures of the flesh, the pleasures of the world, because he had seen that only Christ, could provide what he needed. He had fallen deeply and madly in love with the Bridegroom of the Church, and sought to offer his own life with Christ to the glory of God the Father. Francis embraced his trials. He received the Stigmata. He founded religious communities. He created the first “living” Nativity Scene. He rebuilt physical church buildings. He prayed often. He went away to quiet places for retreats. He stirred up the ardor of faith in men of no faith. He loved without being loved in return. Why? Because he embraced the “radical hospitality” of the Gospel; he embraced a life of joy. He embraced Christ, present in all of humanity and creation, with all of its flaws, because he saw the beauty of the Creator within.

St. Francis lived a life of radical surrender to the workings of the Spirit. He lived a life of radical hospitality and love. He lived a life of joy as he embraced the cross. May we have the strength and courage to do the same. May we be made worthy to share the light of Christ in Heaven with you.
