

My Dear Friends in Christ,

When I was a boy, I can remember spending every Easter Sunday evening glued to the television, watching "The Ten Command-



ments". It was one of the few times my mother let me stay up past my bedtime on a school night...quite a treat! I can remember the "Technicolor" that was employed (an amazing cinematic feature, long before CGI!), and how it brought the story of the Bible to life! One of the stunning moments was the scene of the "burning bush", the moment in salvation history when Moses was on Mount Horeb and he came upon the bush that was burning, but not consumed. Today's first reading recalls the account of Moses and the Burning Bush.

In our first reading, Moses is tending the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law. The "burning bush" (which, as I say, was burning but not consumed by the flames) catches the attention of Moses. Little wonder it does, between the sight of the bush and the presence of the angel of the Lord; it is a sight which would catch the attention of anyone looking on the scene! In the encounter, Moses hears the voice of God, telling him who He is and what He wants Moses to do. Moses is to lead the Israelites to freedom, freedom from the oppression of Pharaoh. When Moses asks who it is he should say has sent him, God replies "I am who I am" (Exodus 3:14). This is a key moment, for it reveals God as one of the "present moment" (signified by the fact that God uses the present tense). It is the same God who created the world. It is the same God who created us. It is the same God who is with us, here and now.

When we hear of this "God of the present moment", we should take courage and have hope. Our God is one who is with us here and now. We do not have a God who set the world in motion and left us abandoned. We have a God who walks with us in this day and age, in this moment in time, in this Lenten Season (and in ALL Seasons).

May we take comfort in the fact that our God is one who is with us in all time, and for all time, until such time as He calls us home to Himself. May we know that when we call upon God, He does not need to be summoned for He is with us now. May we walk through this Lenten Season knowing that God walks with us now and into the Paschal Mystery of the life, death and resurrection of His Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ.

MY FRANSISCAN JOURNEY

I was having a conversation about my journey with the Secular Franciscans, and this person asked me "Does this mean that you are no longer a diocesan priest?" It is one of the more common questions I get asked, and it is born out of both a desire to know more about the Secular Franciscans and an unknowing about what Third Orders are about in the world of the Church. Most religious orders (Dominicans, Jesuits, Franciscans) have some sort of "Third Order", with the first two "orders" dealing with the ordained or vowed members of that particular religious order. The "Third Order" traditionally deals with the laity or diocesan clergy. In fact, the link between the Third Order and Diocesan clergy has a lot to do with that word... Secular.

Along with being referred to as "diocesan clergy", another way of addressing the work that I do is by referring to us as "secular clergy". Simply put, this means that we make "promises" rather than take vows, and we are linked with a particular diocese, rather than a larger religious order (which spans many dioceses throughout the country and world). This does NOT mean that we are not affiliated more with the world than the church! In joining the Secular Franciscan Order, I am on the road to joining the ranks of men and women who have decided that our focus and attention in our prayer and our living out our Baptismal Call has been, and is, influenced by the person, writings, and charism of St. Francis of Assisi.


Years ago, I was standing outside of church after Mass one Sunday, and someone noticed my "monastic alb" (the white garment worn under the chasuble (the outer robe worn at Mass), which has a hood on it; they also noticed my sandals (which I would wear year-round if weather permitted it!). In spying my garb, they inquired of me "Father, are you Dominican (because of my alb) or Franciscan (because of my sandals)?" At the time I joked that "I'm not smart enough to be a Dominican, and not nice enough to be a Franciscan!" Little did I know what God had in store for me! In all seriousness, I believe I've always had Franciscan "leanings". I used to say that while my choice of diocesan priesthood was largely influenced by the diocesan clergy in the parishes in which I grew up, if I ever chose to join a religious order that it would be the Franciscans. So, perhaps God knew that I was going to take this path all along.

As I ready myself for the next steps in my Secular Franciscan journey, I invite you to pray over where God might be calling you to serve His Church. Look at the things that attract you about the Faith, and move in that direction, trusting that it is God's Holy Spirit leading the way, helping you to walk the path that He is calling you to walk.

THE DEACON'S COLUMN



"Through the words of the Gospel may our sins be wiped away." These are the words that the deacon, or in his absence, a concelebrating priest, or priest presider says quietly to himself after proclaims the Gospel and reverences it with a kiss. This gesture reveals the power of the Gospel and its proclamation. Hearing and responding to the Good News of Jesus Christ has the power to save souls. During the Mass there are two liturgies that are intrinsically bound to one another, the Liturgy of the Word, and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. These two "liturgies" form one act of worship.

In his love and mercy, God has chosen to nourish our mind, body, and soul through Christ who is made present in the proclamation of the Gospel and especially in the bread and wine we offer at the beginning of the Liturgy of the Word. As these reflections begin to "break open" the elements of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, I wish to share the description the Church gives in the Roman Missal concerning the Liturgy of the Eucharist

At the Last Supper Christ instituted the Paschal Sacrifice and banquet, by which the Sacrifice of the Cross is continuously made present in the Church whenever the Priest, representing Christ the Lord, carries out what the Lord himself did and handed over to his disciples to be done in his memory. For Christ took the bread and the chalice, gave thanks, broke the bread, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat and drink: this is my Body; this is the chalice of my Blood. Do this in memory of me. Hence, the Church has arranged the entire celebration of the Liturgy of the Eucharist in parts corresponding to precisely these words and actions of Christ, namely:

- a) At the Preparation of the Gifts, bread and wine with water are brought to the altar, the same elements, which is to say, which Christ took into his hands.
- b) In the Eucharistic Prayer, thanks is given to God for the whole work of salvation, and the offerings become the Body and Blood of Christ.
- c) Through the fraction and through Communion, the faithful, though many, receive from the one bread the Lord's Body and from the one chalice the Lord's Blood in the same way that the Apostles received them from the hands of Christ himself. (GIRM (3rd Edition), #72)

It is my hope that by breaking out these elements of the Liturgy of the Eucharist we will be able to unite ourselves move closely to the eternal offering of Jesus Christ for the salvation of souls. Through an increased awareness of our participation in these sacred ministries may the body and blood of Jesus nourish us as we strive to share with others the one we have received around the altar of Christ's sacrifice.

Stoking the Lenten Fire

I think we all can acknowledge that there's a certain fatigue that comes over us all as we near the end of the Lenten season. Next week is Laetare Sunday, and I find that as soon as those pink vestments start coming out of storage, our collective motivation begins to wane.

I get that. Maybe you're fatigued — I am, too. Maybe you're doing well in your resolutions and devotions but you're in danger of coasting. Or maybe, like many of us this year or in past years, you don't feel that you have even really begun your Lenten journey.

Either way, chances are that the fire that was in your belly on Ash Wednesday is burning a bit low. All fires eventually do, once they consume whatever fuels them. So here we would do well to remember what fuels our Lenten fire.

Sometimes we make resolutions that have the appearance of being spiritual, but also have an earthly motive. We give up chocolate hoping to lose weight. We stop gossiping so our friends may like us more. There is nothing wrong with these sacrifices — just with their motivations.

As Moses removes his sandals to approach the burning bush, he sees that the fire burns brightly, strongly — but does not consume. It is propelled by something inexhaustible, something which is not of this world.

Is your Lenten fire fueled by God? Are you daily surrendering yourself to the same voice that boomed from the bush in Genesis — the voice that commanded the Israelites to do what seemed like the impossible?

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
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
