My Dear Friends in Christ,

A (continued) blessed Easter to you! I know that for most of the world Easter has come and gone, but for those of us who gather on this day the Easter celebration continues! In today's



gospel, we have the passage from Luke which tells of Jesus' encounter with the disciples in the "upper room"; it is most likely the same space that they gathered with Jesus for the Last Supper. As we enter into the scene, the apostles are hearing about the two disciples' encounter with Jesus on the road to Emmaus. It is in the "breaking of the bread" (Lk 24:35) that these two come to recognize Jesus, whereupon He vanishes from their sight.

As the apostles are hearing about this post-Resurrection event they have one themselves. As with the other gospel accounts, Jesus' first gesture is to offer them peace. It is a peace that only He can give, for it is a peace that is rooted not in this world, but in the Eternal Kingdom of God's Eternal Peace. He further assists them by allaying their fears, for they think they are encountering a ghost. In showing them His flesh and bones, as well as asking for something to eat, Jesus shows them (and us) His humanity, and the fact that there was, indeed, a bodily death and resurrection. He emphasizes this point further by speaking of the prophetic words that were written and spoken about Him.

Easter is a time of new hope, new peace, and new life. The apostles, gathered in the upper room, are sharers and bearers of that new life. They are about to embark on a new way of living and Jesus takes the time to give them some "marching" orders". As witnesses to Jesus' death and resurrection, they are now being called to share these truths with others, with the whole world really. This is why "repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem" (Lk 24:47-49). This is the new "job" for the apostles, "ones who are sent" (which is what the word "apostle" means) into the world for the spread of the gospel and the salvation of souls. May we who share in Christ's baptism also share in His death and resurrection. May this sharing bring forth a boldness in word and deed. May we come to know and understand this truth, and share it with all whom we meet.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

The Church celebrates Easter for the next fifty days. One day just isn't enough to take it all in: something too great, too wondrous has happened here! Death has been conquered; life will never be the same

In a world that is slowly passing way, Jesus has given us access to eternity through His passion, death, and resurrection.

Our destiny was a tomb; but now, that tomb is empty.

Did the disciples understand the cosmic implications of the Paschal Mystery on that first Easter morning? Clearly no. But perhaps this is why Jesus kept appearing to them after His resurrection. If you read the resurrection accounts in Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, you'll find that every appearance of Jesus is new and unexpected. It's as if Jesus is urging His disciples: Keep looking at me. If you stop looking—if you think you completely understand Who I am and what's happening here—you will walk away with an incomplete picture. But I am no image frozen in time. I am a Person, alive and with you always. I am your Way out of the tomb. Keep looking—and come, follow Me.

In this glorious Easter season, let us set aside time to really *look* at Jesus. Where is the Risen Lord appearing to me? What is He saying? Have I entombed Him in a domesticated, pastel-tinted version of the Easter story—and if so, do I have the courage to follow Him out of this tomb to a new way of living?

May Jesus our Risen Lord lead each of us, together with the entire Church, to a deeper grasp of the meaning of Easter and rekindle in us the need to share this Good News with the world.



EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENT

How to Fail Your Way to Heaven

You know what are some of my favorite moments in Scripture? The little "Easter eggs" of Jesus' humanity, things like Jesus falling asleep, Jesus drawing in the sand, Jesus playing with kids. And how about Jesus rising from the dead, appearing to his disciples and saying, "So, have you got anything to eat?"

It's right for us to always keep in mind that Jesus is God. But we also have to remember that he was man. He got hungry. He cried when he felt sad and laughed when he felt happy. He got tired. He got bored.

Because he was God, none of those feelings ever led him into sin, like they do us. He never spent a car ride trying to pass the hours by seeing how annoyed he could make his older sister. He never smacked Peter over the head for saying something really stupid. But he did unleash some Biblically righteous anger on those traders in the temple, didn't he? And he wasn't shy about calling Peter "a Satan" when his friend tempted him to take the easy way out.

It's the tightrope walk we all try to balance every day, honoring our human emotions while still answering God's call to be better. Being perfect isn't the domain of the Christian — that's the domain of Christ only. Trying and failing, then trying again (and failing again) and again and again? That's the domain of the Christian.

Why Use Incense?

Question:

Why do we use incense at Mass?

Answer:

The use of incense in religious ceremonies and worship is a practice that predates Christianity, and which is also found in many other religious traditions today.

Incense, which is made from resin infused with aromatic spices and oils, is one of those fundamentally human symbols that incorporates more than one of our senses, helping us to reflect on realities that transcend the every-day details of our lives.

The use of incense in the Church's liturgy — in the Mass, as well as in devotions to the Eucharist and the Liturgy of the Hours — is inspired by the use of incense in the Jewish tradition. In the writings of the Old Testament, we hear about incense being used in the worship of the temple, and Psalm 141 asks, "Let my prayer be incense before you; my uplifted hands an evening offering" (vs. 2). The image here is that, as the incense gently rises to heaven, our prayers also rise to God as something sweet and pleasant.

Another ancient use of incense that has also become part of our Catholic tradition is the idea that when we incense something, it's because it is something special or sacred. This is why the Book of the Gospel is incensed during the Liturgy of the Word and the bread, wine, priest celebrant, and congregation are incensed at the presentation of the gifts. To this, we can also add the incensing of the Blessed Sacrament during eucharistic adoration and benediction, and the body of the deceased at the end of the Mass of the Resurrection (the Funeral Mass).



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
