# A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

My Dear Friends in Christ,

I've read different surveys which speak of the attitudes of Catholics regarding Church



teaching, beliefs, doctrines regarding Church teaching, beliefs, doctrines and dogmas. One of the "settled questions" of our Catholic Faith, however, is that of the Eucharist; the belief in the Church that the Eucharist is the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ has been "settled" for some time now (most assuredly by the Council of Trent in 1551). The belief in the "Real Presence" in the Eucharist is one of those "non-negotiables" in our faith; it is essential to "being" a Roman Catholic, that one believe in this Real Presence. This is why I am so shocked to read statistics that put as high as 60% the number of Catholics who either "don't believe" or "aren't sure" that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist. Note that this is different than not knowing HOW Jesus is present – that is, and remains, a great mystery.

This is why it is okay that one cannot fully understand this truth. There are many objective truths that are beyond our full comprehension (such as the Trinity, of which we spoke last week). This does not make them any less true, nor does it lessen our obligation to believe them to be true. This is where the element of "mystery" comes into play for us. When I was younger, and I heard "well, it's a mystery", I took it to mean that the adult who was imparting said knowledge didn't really know (or even believe) what they were saying to be true. It had been "handed down" to them, and they were "handing it down" to me, like a well-worn sweater or a cherished piece of jewelry. I came to see that while "treasures" of our faith are, indeed, handed down from generation to generation often times without full knowledge, (as I say) that doesn't make them any less true. The Church's belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist is one of these truths.

Today, we as a Church celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, more commonly known to us as "Corpus Christi". This is one of my favorite Holy Days, one that is powerful both in its complexity and simplicity; complex due to its "mysterious" nature and simple due to it being present here and now. I love this solemnity not only because of its centrality to our faith (which gives said faith credence and strength), but because it brings, to the forefront, our belief that Jesus is still with us today. Jesus promised His disciples (and us) that He would not leave us abandoned. The Eucharist is proof of that promise. When we gather as a Eucharistic People around God's altar at Mass, at the heart of that liturgical and sacramental moment is the "transubstantiative" moment when the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ, and Jesus is truly present in that moment. The Body and Blood of Christ are food for our journey of faith, and give us strength to face the challenges that life might present. I know I wouldn't be able to have the level of strength I do in facing the challenges of life without Jesus being "at the heart of it all". Jesus suffered in this life and so do we; Jesus overcame suffering (and even death) and so can we - because He is with us! May we know Jesus' Presence in Eucharist, may we believe in that Presence and may we share that Presence with all whom we meet!

## **Adult Bible Study Continues**


Our new Adult Bible Study continues to meet every Wednesday at 7 pm at St. John.

# **MY FRANSICAN JOURNEY**

"In his love, God gives himself into our hands; we touch him and receive him daily into our mouths."

— "Letter to All Clerics"

Francis takes a noticeably softer tone in this letter to clerics, but the heartbeat of his message is no less serious: When we receive the Eucharist — either by hand or by mouth — we are taking in essential food for the journey. The Eucharist, to Francis, offered the promise of everlasting life and guided him into a realm of greater compassion for his fellow man. How do you feel when you receive the Eucharist? Has the experience become mundane — or even infrequent? Recall a time when receiving Communion felt especially meaningful for you.

"We should visit churches often and show great reverence for the clergy, not just for them personally, for they may be sinners, but because of their high office, for it is they who administer the most holy Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ."

— "Letter to All the Faithful"

It might be difficult for 21st-century Catholics to mirror so pure a temperament toward the clergy as Francis did in his day. But look closer. He is acknowledging the importance of their station while recognizing clergy as sinners — just as we are. Francis saw all of life as threads in God's vast tapestry, truly one unified body of Christ. And we cannot receive the Eucharist without dedicated clergy who serve as conduits for such a moment of grace. How would you describe your relationship with the clergy in your parish? What can you do to get to know them and support them?

The life of Francis was plagued by trial, illness and great physical pain. One adjective seldom associated with the saint is joyful — but joy was a hallmark of his life and his life's work. (Read his Canticle of the Creatures for further proof.) What makes his message so remarkable is, first, his mastery of poetic language. But it is the joy and vigor behind his words that really leave a mark. When we partake in the Eucharist, it is a solemn moment but also one of celebration. In what experiences do you find joy each day? Why do these moments stand out to you? What events in life call for both solemnity and celebration? Why?

May we recognize Christ not only in the Breaking of the Bread, but also in the everyday moments of our life. May we bring Jesus into our daily lives, and boldly share this Real Presence with all whom we meet.

## We Bear the Name of the Lord

The name of the Lord is a curiously powerful thing. Say it deliberately, even in a group of people who are not particularly religious, and you'll know what I mean. There is a shift in the mood, a change in the atmosphere. When we utter the name of the Lord, He turns His head.

Once, in confession, I admitted to the sin of using the Lord's name in vain. "When you do that, tell God that you love him," advised the priest, who was wise enough to know that I would repeat this sin at some point. "You've said His name, after all. You have His attention."

We hear the name of the Lord, and we think of what it represents — John 3:16, salvation history summed up in a neat little sentence, the why and the how and the who of it all laid out before us. The Lord, so slow to anger that He offers us a million chances. The Lord, so rich in kindness and fidelity that He literally gave Himself to us that we might be saved.

But the name of the Lord is more than that. It is not just a symbol, it is an invitation. I think of Moses clutching the commandments, beseeching the Lord: "Come with us. Forgive us. Receive us as your own." The Lord accompanies us down the mountain. We bear the name of the Lord into the world with us wherever we go.

I have to ask myself: do I do that name justice?



Almighty God, Lord of life, we thank and praise You for the freedom we enjoy in our country and pray that our laws and liberties will continue to be protected.


Heal the conflicts which damage our unity and ease our political differences from one another. May our citizens respect religious freedom, the importance of family and the values of human life.
