My Dear Friends in Christ,

Today's gospel reminds me of the scripture studies of the New Testament while in the seminary. In reading today's gospel, I am reminded that we used to say that a passage like this was not the "warm and fuzzy Jesus" to which most of us are used, and of whom most of us think when we think of Jesus. This is a challenging gospel, one which makes us set (or, perhaps, reset) our priorities. Jesus calls us to establish our relationships in "proper" rank in order to put God first in our lives.

In today's gospel, we are told that "whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me, and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me" (Mt 10:37). As if this were not challenging enough, Jesus takes it further by telling us "whoever does not take up his cross and follow after me is not worthy of me" (Mt 10:38). This first passage isn't telling us to abandon our familial relationships; it is simply, yet powerfully, calling us to put Jesus first – before mother or father, son or daughter. It is the relationship we have with Jesus that guides all other relationships. In the second passage noted, one is to take up one's cross and follow Jesus. If you're like me, you don't have to look too far or too hard to find the crosses in your life. Once we find them, what do we do with them? Do we leave them for someone else to carry? That would be unfortunate and unfair, especially to the one "stuck" carrying the cross. Do we carry them, but complain all the while? That would be unfortunate and unfair as well, especially to the ones forced to listen to these complaints. We are called to carry our crosses, uniting our sufferings to that of Christ, who first showed us how to carry one's cross with dignity and love. St. Paul speaks of this union with Christ in a powerful way in our second reading. In the reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans, Paul reminds us that "we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death" (Rom 6:3). This statement calls to mind TWO baptisms: the first is what we traditionally think of when we hear of baptism, that is the Sacrament of Baptism. The second "baptism" (the one "into his death" (ibid) is our entrance into Eternal Life when our earthly life ends. It is in these two baptisms that we have "newness of life" (Rom 6:4). When we are brought to the baptismal font (whether as infants, children, or adults) we experience a "death" of sorts, namely a "dying to self" so that Christ might live in us. When our earthly life ends, we die (physically) but are "reborn" into that "new life" which awaits us in the Kingdom.

May we have the courage to "take up our cross" daily, so that we can journey with the Lord. May we have the courage to put our own needs second, to "die to self" so that Christ might live in us. May this new life, won for us by the sacrifice of Christ, be one in which we share everything with Christ, so that He may share His very life with us.

Registration for Faith Formation 2023-2024 is now open!

I am happy to announce that registration for faith formation for the fall is now open! Classes will begin on Sunday 9/24 and run through the first week of May. The schedule remains roughly the same, but there are some adjustments based on your feedback and the current Mass schedule. The 2023-2024 schedule is as follows:

A Note about Future Changes to the Mass Schedule

As we journey together in the life of our collaborative, sometimes it takes a bit of trial and error to get things right so that we can best serve the people of both our parishes. That said, we have come to the conclusion that flipping the Mass Schedule every 6 months as we originally planned is impractical and an obstacle to the strengthening of our community as first outlined in our collaborative Pastoral Plan, prior to Covid and reaffirmed in the suggestions made at last year's brainstorming sessions. Therefore, we have made the decision that we will only flip the schedule once a year, which will take place on Memorial Day Weekend starting next year. This means that with the exception of the 6:15 Mass, the current schedule will remain in place until May 25/26, 2024. The 6:15 Mass will return to St. Ann on October 1st and remain there permanently so it can be used as our Teen Mass for our middle and high school students.

We realize some of you will be upset that this means that "your" Mass will not be returning to "your" church with the start of Advent as you expected; but as a collaborative community of two churches, we are called to join together to celebrate the Eucharist which is at the heart of our faith. Our rationale for making this decision is not about Mass locations, but about how we engage with you and all our parishioners outside of Mass and invite you to participate in the life of our community. We will be continuing the monthly Family Masses we started last year during the upcoming school year, and that is only possible if the 9:30 Mass and Sunday morning faith formation class are at the same location. We also plan on expanding the opportunities for us to gather after Mass for refreshments to cover each of the Masses and increasing adult formation activities beyond our current Wednesday night Bible Study. And the fall will also mark the return of altar servers (though we do appreciate the willingness of our lectors and eucharistic ministers for bearing this responsibility!).

Please feel welcome to reach out to either of us if you have any questions about why we have made this decision. We are happy to explain it and hear your comments or questions.

MY FRANSICAN JOURNEY

When I hear Jesus speak of the Cross, which He does in today's Gospel, as a Franciscan I can't help but think of the stigmata. The stigmata are the bodily wounds which Jesus suffered on His

hands, feet, and sides while on the Cross. They are also known as "The Five Wounds" of Christ and throughout the centuries there have been Saints in our Church, holy men and women who have suffered with these wounds in imitation of, and in union with, Christ. Among these men and women are St. Catherine of Sienna, St. Rita of Cascia, St. Pio of Pietrelcina ("Padre Pio"), and St. Francis of Assisi.

Traditionally Catholics believe that St. Francis of Assisi was the first stigmatist. St. Francis of Assisi (1182-1226) received the wounds of Christ crucified on Sept. 17, 1224, and that he *did* receive them is attested to by everyone from his contemporaries to G.K. Chesterton's wonderful biography, to all those stunning paintings (from Giotto to Van Eyck) that recount this most mysterious and obvious sign of living one's life according to Christ. When St. Francis was wounded in the hands, feet and side, it began, if not a pattern, then at least a verified beginning of many others who, too, would wear the wounds of Christ.

St. Francis received these wounds while in prayer on the remote mountaintop of Mt. Alverna (also known as La Verna), some two years prior to his death. Francis had gone there with two other friars, Brother Leo being one. While deep in prayer on a day near the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross, a seraph (angel) appeared. The seraph was seemingly crucified on a cross. Thomas of Celano, writing within a few years of Francis' death (ca. 1229), described what happened as Francis contemplated the possible meaning of the vision:

"...the marks of nails began to appear in his hands and feet, just as he had seen them slightly earlier in the crucified man above him. His wrists and feet seemed to be pierced by nails, with the heads of the nails appearing on his wrists and on the upper sides of his feet, the points appearing on the other side. The marks were round on the palm of each hand but elongated on the other side, and small pieces of flesh jutting out from the rest took on the appearance of the nail-ends, bent and driven back. In the same way the marks of nails were impressed on his feet and projected beyond the rest of the flesh. Moreover, his right side had a large wound as if it had been pierced with a spear, and it often bled so that his tunic and trousers were soaked with his sacred blood."

St. Bonaventure later wrote: "The sight of it amazed Francis and his soul experienced joy mingled with pain. He was delighted with the sight of Christ appearing to him so graciously and intimately and yet the awe-inspiring vision of Christ nailed to the cross aroused in his soul a joy of compassionate love."

As we move through our journey of faith, let us be unafraid to take up our cross and follow Jesus as St. Francis did. Let us give our whole selves to Christ, wounds and all, so that He may transform us in creations of His own love.

We will be hosting 4 movie nights over the course of the summer, 2 at each parish. There will be free popcorn and other snacks available for purchase.


