

DEACON BRENDAN'S CORNER

The Rite of Baptism continues. After the celebrant anoints each child with the Oil of Sacred Chrism, he gives the parents a white garment which is put on the child. He says, "See in this white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity. Bring that dignity unstained into everlasting life of heaven." Upon receiving a light from the Easter candle, he addresses the parents and godparents with these words, "this light is entrusted to you to be kept burning brightly. This child of yours has been enlightened by Christ. He (she) is to walk always as a child of the light. May he (she) keep the flame of faith alive in his (her) heart...."

Before the final blessing and dismissal, the celebrant turns to the mothers of the newly baptized and prays, "May God the Father bless the mothers of these children as they thank God for the gift of their child. May she be one with her child in thanking God for ever in heaven, in Christ our Lord." He then turns to the fathers of the children. "May He bless the fathers of these children. They and their wives will be the first teachers of their child in the ways of faith. May they be also the best of teachers, bearing witness to the faith by what they **say and do**, in Christ Jesus our Lord. He then blesses the congregation and all are dismissed.

May we acknowledge to the parents our joy that their child has joined or faith community. It is our duty to be examples of faithful Christians by what we say and do. My Dear Friends in Christ,

C.S. Lewis, one of my favorite authors, was once quoted as saying that "miracles are a retelling in small letters of the very same story which is written across the whole world in



letters too large for some of us to see". What Lewis meant, I believe, is that when something miraculous occurs it points us to a larger truth. The "miracle event", in essence, isn't the "be all to end all", but a "means to an end". We can look at a miracle and try and "unpack" it, explain it (or explain it away) or try and figure it out; that would be a mistake. Miracles aren't to be explained, but something into which we must enter. In doing this, we come to see the larger reality at work. This is important because miracles, at face value, are hard to decipher. We need to ponder them, pray about them and let God reveal Himself in them.

Today's readings deal with miracles on different levels. The first reading has us encounter Elisha, feeding the one hundred gathered with but twenty loaves of bread (which I don't consider a lot since I've been known to eat an entire basket of rolls at one sitting at Bertucci's!). In our gospel today, Jesus feeds the multitude with five loaves of bread and two fish. In both cases, the feeding isn't just physical, it's spiritual. The crowd's souls are "fed" by the generosity of God through the actions of Elisha and Jesus. The difference between the two readings is that in Jesus' case, he is "foreshadowing" the Eucharist; notice how He takes the bread, gives thanks (i.e. blesses) and distributes it. In doing this, Jesus is showing to the crowd and His disciples what He will do at the Last Supper. We know this because of our knowledge of the Holy Thursday/Passover event.

In our second reading, a miracle of sorts happens as well. In the ministry of St. Paul, the idea of the crowd at Ephesus living and acting with "humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another through love, striving to preserve the unity of the spirit through the bond of peace: one body and one Spirit" (Eph 4:2-4). To do this, to maintain this and to sustain this is nothing less than a miracle! This was a pagan territory, challenging to Paul and his companions in so many ways. He perseveres through his faith in God; it is not through his own doing that this is being accomplished, but it is God working in and through him.

Where are we with miracles? Do we see them? Do we acknowledge them and call them what they are? Do we "brush them off", explaining them away? Let us trust that God is working miracles in our lives. Let us see the miraculous for what it truly is: an opportunity to grow in faith, hope and love!

Last Saturday evening, Jeana and I returned from Israel, the Holy Land. When we take groups to Israel, we always offer to pray for others in the Garden of Gethsemane.

So, on Tuesday morning, July 10, in rapid fire before the Lord, we called out the personal needs of a few hundred people who sent requests. When we finished this hour in the Garden of Gethsemane, I told Jeana I was absolutely exhausted. Even though it was not even mid-morning, the process of prayer exhausted me. Why? Prayer is hard work, especially when you carry the burdens of so many. Jeana said I was exhausted because I preached my praying that day, calling out to God with such great intensity.

Going through this list reminded me of the dire need to pray for others.

When We Pray for Others, the Walls Begin to Fall Down

Attending and speaking at the 2018 Epicenter Prayer Summit in Jerusalem on July 11 and 12 also reminded me of the powerful need for and the experience of praying for others.

As I listened to and prayed with and for leaders who are Palestinian Christians and Messianic Jews, I heard and witnessed powerful stories of how prayer has torn the walls down between their people and their desire to make a difference in Israel, the Middle East, and beyond. When we pray for the needs of others, including the needs of their churches, the walls of division come down.

Consecration to Jesus through Mary

"It is through the most Blessed Virgin Mary that Jesus Christ came into the world, and it is also through her that he will reign in the world."

That's St. Louis de Montfort teaching about the relationship between devotion to the Queen of Apostles and devotion to her son Jesus Christ: the more one is consecrated to Mary, he argues, the more one is consecrated to Jesus.

"Our entire perfection," he writes, "consists in being conformed, united and consecrated to Jesus Christ. Hence the most perfect of all devotions is undoubtedly that which conforms, unites and consecrates us most perfectly to Jesus Christ. Now, since Mary is of all creatures the one most conformed to Jesus Christ, it follows that among all devotions that which most consecrates and conforms a soul to our Lord is devotion to Mary, his Holy Mother, and that the more a soul is consecrated to her the more will it be consecrated to Jesus Christ."


Like Mary, de Montfort experienced challenges in his efforts to follow Jesus. Opposed at times in his preaching as well as in his other ministries, he knew that "neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God, who causes the growth" (1 Corinthians 3:7). He understood clearly that any attempt to succeed by worldly standards runs the risk of betraying the Good News of Jesus, and that challenges are an integral part of the journey, whether to Calvary, the resurrection, or the Kingdom of God.

Mary is "the first and most perfect disciple," as Sulpician Raymond Brown described her. And as such, she is most clearly and truly the Mother of Apostles. The end of de Montfort's Marian devotion is "being conformed, united and consecrated to Jesus."

It is really helpful if people purchase tickets early, so that the proper amount of food can be purchased.


