My Dear Friends in Christ,

My brother, a former Marine, used to tell me to "always remember the 'Five P's' – **pr**ior **p**reparation **p**revents **p**oor **p**erformance". It was a good way to remember



that the groundwork laid before a task is just as important as the task itself, and that when one has foresight, patience, and perseverance, one can accomplish most anything.

Jesus, in today's gospel, reminds His disciples that one's focus should always be on the Kingdom. It doesn't do anyone any good to store up for themselves treasures in this life, treasure that could be stolen or become moth-eaten. The true and lasting treasures are the ones which we store for ourselves which are rooted in heaven. We are the servants of whom Jesus is speaking. We have been placed in charge of a great treasure, the "deposit of faith" passed down from generation to generation. In being caretakers of this treasure, which is always growing and evolving, we would do well to be mindful of the master's return. This return, which will happen at the end of the earthly age, is not known. This is why we must be vigilant, for we know neither the day nor the hour. Perhaps it is a good thing that we don't know this; I think if we knew, we might become complacent. This "unknowing" gives us the benefit of having to be mindful that every day is a gift. This gift, freely given by God, is meant to be returned in the service which we offer to God as disciples.

We have been made known of this gift. In the two-thousand year history of the Church, countless teachings have been handed down to us. More importantly, this faith has been "imprinted" on our hearts by the Holy Spirit. It is this divine inspiration which has led the Church forward for two millennia. You might remember when I first came to the parish, I mentioned that "I wasn't in charge". I'm sure this frightened many (if not most) of you! What I came to explain, however, is that "the Holy Spirit is in charge". This was not to let me "off the hook" as your shepherd; it was to help us all understand that we are all called by God to assume some level of leadership in our Church. This doesn't have to be done in a grand way. Often times, it is leadership by example that is the most powerful. In this way, it is more who we are and how we live, rather than what we say, that provides the Spirit a vehicle to be seen and felt in the world.

May we be vigilant in our watching. May we come to know the Lord intimately so that when He comes, we may be ready. May we seek out opportunities to live and share fully this "deposit of faith" which has been entrusted to us. May the Spirit find in us a welcome home, a secure dwelling and a loving reception so that it may grow and flourish in our hearts, our homes and our world.

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Pope Francis has asked families to set aside time to pray both individually and together as a family.

His prayer intention for the month of August invites people to pray that "families, through their life of prayer and love, become ever more clearly schools of true human development."

At the start of each month, the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network releases a short video of the pope offering his specific prayer intention at www.thepopevideo.org.

Focusing on the church's mission of evangelization, the pope asked in the short video, "What kind of world do we want to leave for the future?"

The answer is a "world with families," he said, because families are "true schools for the future, spaces of freedom, and centers of humanity."

"Let us care for our families" he said, because of this important role they play.

"And let us reserve a special place in our families for individual and communal prayer."

"The Pope Video" was first launched in 2016 to encourage people to join an estimated 50 million Catholics who already had a more formal relationship with the prayer network -- better known by its former title, the Apostleship of Prayer.





Patience is a virtue. At least that's what they say. You might think Geoffrey Chaucer in "The Canterbury Tales" first used the saying. There he wrote, "Patience is a great virtue of perfection." However, William Langland first used the saying in 1370 in his poem, "The Vision of Piers." The poem was in Middle English, so the saying reads, "Suffraunce is a soverayn virtue." But you get the picture and you have something to store away for your next trivia contest.

Jesus hadn't read Chaucer or Langland when he was talking to his disciples in Luke 12 about the servant who begins to act improperly towards his charges because he believes there has been a delay in the master's return. But Jesus was talking about the values of patience and commitment. He was urging them to stay ready and keep working to spread the good news. It is easy for a person to get complacent and let down one's guard. It is easy for a person to get tired of waiting and then turn to other sources of satisfaction.

The stewardship way of life is just that: a way of life. It is 24/7. We sometimes want to reduce it to a series of activities or take a break from giving of ourselves so much. We are not only talking about the second coming of Jesus Christ, but the ways that Jesus comes to us daily in the form of people in need. If we are not vigilant, we run the risk of being found asleep or even worse when the Master comes to call.

A virtue is a trait or quality that we see as morally good or a necessary component for a moral life. Patience is important because staying the course and carrying the cross of Jesus is not easy. But Jesus, and Chaucer and Langland, are sure the reward at the end of the road is well worth it.


