My Dear Friends in Christ,

I enjoy going to wedding receptions; I think being Irish, I enjoy a good party! I have a standard rule, however, when it comes to these invites – I ask to never be sat at the head table. I've had occasions when either I've been left alone and thus put "on display", or I've been seated next to the flower girl and been asked (by her) to cut her meat! Obviously, in both cases it is not as "ideal" a seat as one might imagine!

The parable which Jesus tells illustrates the point that we must be humble in our dealings with one another. We can never presume (as in the case of taking a place of honor) a place of honor, or assume (as in the case of holding a lunch or dinner) that we will be repaid. In either case, as host or guest, we must be free of expectations. The same is true of the Christian life. Anything we receive in life, we receive as a "gift" (yes, even the challenges of life can be seen as a "gift") – a gift freely given by God. God gives us all that we need to grow in faith, hope and love.

Sirach emphasizes this point in today's first reading, which also deals with humility. In this missive, the author reminds the reader that in everything that is done in God's name is to be done with humility and an appreciation of and attentiveness to who God is calling us to be. We are to use those God-given talents and abilities to serve our brothers and sisters in love. When we do this, we are indeed serving God.

May we have the courage to look within our hearts to see who it is God is calling us to be. May we know that when we use those gifts, talents and abilities we are serving not only one another, but God. May we live humbly, approach God confidently and serve faithfully. May we strive to build up our community of faith, assist our brothers and sisters in their faith and always strive for the greater glory of God.



THE DEACON'S COLUMN Pondering These Things In Our Heart—Silence in the Liturgy (Part II)

In Luke's Gospel we are presented with two contrasting stories involving the Archangel Gabriel who announces two

unlikely and impossible conceptions. The first involves the older and barren couple of Zechariah and Elizabeth and the second involves a virgin named Mary. Why does God punish Zechariah and praise Mary when their responses seem the same?

The difference lies in a small detail in the narrative. Before Mary responds to the angel's message, we are told that although she was troubled by what she heard, she "wondered what kind of greeting this might be." When presented with the reality that his wife was going to conceive a child, Zechariah questions the message without "wondering." On the other hand, Mary's response, "How can this be?" came from a place of true contemplation, discernment, and silent consideration upon the words she received.

Throughout Mary's life she was asked to consider the great things God was doing in her life. At the Annunciation she considered in her heart the message she received. When the shepherds came to her in Bethlehem and heard about the angel's message to them, she "pondered these things in her heart." After Jesus was found in the Temple precincts after being lost for three days, she "held these things in her heart." In similar ways, we are called to do the same in the celebration of the Eucharist. We too are invited to remember what we hear and ponder them in our heart.

Before Mass begins, we are invited to enter the Church and pray in silence. During this silence we separate ourselves from the secular world recognizing that we have been "called out" of the world as his disciples into his Church (which literally means "to be called out of"). In this silence we place ourselves in God's presence and ask for the grace of the Holy Spirit to unite our offering to Jesus.

During the penitential rite, the priest invites us to take a moment and call to mind our sin. The silence that follows gives us a moment to bring to the altar the things that have prevented us from living fully as Jesus' disciples knowing that when we offer our penitent hearts, he gives us the gift of his mercy.

After each reading, and especially after the Homily, the Church instructs us to ponder the things we have heard and consider how those words might speak to our hearts. If we rush these moments and do not give the space in silence, we might miss what God wants to say to us in the moment he speaks and in which we listen. During the prayers of the faithful we are often invited to pray for our deceased loved ones and friends. If there is not enough silence at this moment, we may not be able to call to mind our needs or the people we wish to pray for in the liturgy.

After communion we are invited to sit in silence and allow our communion to penetrate our bodies, minds, and spirits. If rushed, we may miss out on the graces God wishes to share with us in this sacred moment.

The liturgy, though full of sights, sounds, feelings, and smells, is also a time for us to pay attention to the senses and then ponder these experiences in our hearts remembering what they signify and reveal. There are many moments for us to ponder the mysteries of God in our heart during the liturgy. Next time you celebrate the liturgy take the time in silence and ponder the good things God is doing for you in your heart.



MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

As I write this, I am just finishing a week of "Love In Action", the motto of Camp Fatima EC (Exceptional Citizens) Week. It is a week-long camp where traditional activities found at any camp (boating, swimming, arts and crafts, campfires) are offered to campers with special needs, either physical or emotional. It has been going for over 50 years, and this is my 23rd year of attending.

It is a magical place of which St. Francis would wholeheartedly approve! I say that for a couple of reasons. Firstly, it is held in the bucolic setting of Gilmanton Iron Works, NH, full of trees, lakes, fresh air, and sunshine. It is definitely a place where St. Francis could most certainly be drawn to, as God's creation is found in abundance there. Secondly, I think Francis would approve of EC Week because while we are there, over one hundred young men and women are seen as the gifts of God that they are (that we all are), and are not seen as "less than" or "lacking" anything. At EC Week, these very special children of God are treated as "normal" (whatever that may mean!) for at least this week. Thirdly, the camp is dedicated to Our Lady of Fatima, something which St. Francis would most certainly approve of and endorse. Each night, as we offer "Goodnights" (messages of love and encouragement between all in the camp), we conclude these offerings with "a very special Goodnight to Our Lady of Fatima". Mary most certainly is watching over us as we conduct this week of Camp.

Sign Before the Gospel

I have been going to Mass for years and have always wondered: why do we make the three signs of the cross before the Gospel?

Certainly, many people go to Mass or other devotions, doing and saying things out of habit or reverence and not really understanding the reasons behind some of these things. But everything we do has a meaning or purpose that helps us to worship better, proclaim our beliefs, or focus the attention of the people on something that has a greater importance or significance. A review of the meaning of various gestures and practices can help us have a deeper appreciation for what we do.

There is a little prayer that goes with the three crosses before the Gospel: "May the words of the Holy Gospel be on my mind, on my lips and in my heart." In standing to hear the Gospel, we acknowledge that Jesus is present, and the words of the Gospel are addressed to us. All of the gestures and special postures we adopt before the Gospel are intended to help us prepare for hearing the Word as well as act on it. The incense, the Alleluia, the deacon or priest, and the special dialogue and announcement that introduces the Gospel help us focus our attention on the Good News we are about to hear. The three signs of the cross show our desire and good intention to hear and live the Gospel.

- 3. To reduce early pregnancies /Marriages. Normally when these youths are not in schools, we end up with early marriages at 15!
