



My Dear Friends in Christ,

A few years back, there was a country song put out, popularized by Kenny Chesney, called "Everybody Wants To Go To Heaven" which says that "everybody wants to go to heaven...but nobody want to go now". It speaks to the fact that many folks want to enter into the Kingdom, but few (if anyone) want to go before they've lived all the life they feel that have coming. There's only one thing wrong with that kind of thinking – it's not up to us!

Peter speaks up in today's gospel, voicing this kind of thinking. When he pulls Jesus aside and cautions against the kind of talk Jesus is uttering, he is thinking in human terms and loses sight of the mission of Jesus – the Kingdom. Jesus rebukes Peter (rightfully so), as the mission of Jesus is to end in His death. Jesus knows this and is not afraid to face the reality of this. Jesus realizes that He must die so that we might have life – Eternal Life. This is the "end goal" of Jesus' mission here on earth, that we might see the Kingdom. This is the mission of each one of us as Catholic-Christians as well, that of the Kingdom.

The reality of the Christian life is that we must die to self so that Christ might live in us. This is a hard reality for many, for it goes "against the grain" of the thinking in modern society. We live in a world that seeks to preserve and prolong life, which is not a bad thing, necessarily. Another issue of recent years has been the push for assisted suicide (euphemistically called "physician-assisted death"). The problem with these ways of thinking come when it gets in the way of God's plan for us and for the world. God's desire is for us to have life, life eternal in the Kingdom. This isn't possible if we strive to live forever in this present reality. We are not meant to live forever in this reality; one day, we are meant to enter into the Kingdom. As it is with Jesus, the "timeline" for this is not up to us; it is for our Heavenly Father to decide. It is God who knows "the day and the hour" of our going home to the Kingdom.

May we have the courage to give ourselves over to God's plan. May we come to know that plan in our lives and may we strive to live that plan as best as we can. May we have the strength to unite our will over to God, not relinquishing the free will God gives us but aligning it with the plan which God has for us – life eternal in the Kingdom.

How we need our Mother today!

Hmm. This year, I sometimes find myself wishing I could *escape* to heaven, at least in my imagination. It's on a lot of people's minds. Some of them wonder why "heaven" doesn't *do* something about what's been happening on earth this year. And between the Marian feasts of the Assumption (August 15) and the Queenship of Mary (August 22), the "vision" of heaven, though beautiful, seems remote from the struggles breaking our lives and hearts apart as the summer winds to a close.

The lyrics to my favorite hymn for the Feast of the Assumption paint a lovely picture of Mary in the blessed joy and glory of heaven: *Who is she ascends so far / next the heavenly King? / Round about whom angels fly / and her praises sing.*

The loving, living, giving, and suffering of her earthly life over, Mary now reigns in heaven as Queen of heaven and earth. It could almost seem a kind of well-earned eternal retirement, or a victory march, when she took her place in her coronation at the right hand of her Son. As though she lives now in some inaccessible heavenly "castle" where only royalty live!

Mary, however, as every one of her liturgical feasts reminds us, is a Mother. Still a Mother. Always a Mother. Our Mother. My Mother.

Mothers, by the beauty and grace of their sublime vocation, have an almost-superhuman willingness to sacrifice for the wellbeing of their children. Motherhood is the root and foundation of every other accomplishment and expertise a mother may bring to her role.

And how we need a Mother today! A woman who has been where we are. An exile. An immigrant. A widow. She who stood powerless but with faith beneath the cross as she watched her Son die. The woman who was the first disciple, listening to Jesus, lending her ear and then her heart to his bidding, translating it into action of love and obedient trust. We need this mother, teacher, and queen of the bewildered apostles who watched Jesus return to his Father and who, under his Mother's guidance, began to find their way into the world as his ambassadors and witnesses.

This year, let's focus on Mary who is standing next to us, each of us, the Mother we so long for. I don't know about you, but I feel my mother next to me, even though she can no longer be physically near. It's been said you never really get over the death of your mother, that you still need to feel her near.

This year we need our Mother more than ever. She does not remain in heaven, but comes into the lives of every one of us. Each of us has our own unique connection to her that grows through the years, shifting and changing, deepening and transforming.

If we feel confused, if we feel angry, if we feel lost, if our hearts are anxious, broken, or numb, she holds us in spirit as only she can, as only a Mother knows how to do.

We need our Mother this year, because so many around us need a mother.

A mother's ear.

A mother's embrace that says everything will be alright.

As people begin to come back to Mass and those of us who have been attending become more relaxed after having attended Mass for a few weeks, it is important that we continue to follow the guidelines set up to ensure our safety.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ATTENDING MASS — YOU MUST REGISTER FOR MASS. USE OUR WEBSITE TO DO SO.

* In order to limit social gathering and allow time to seat registered parishioners, those attending Mass should arrive no earlier than 30 minutes and no later than 15 minutes before the start of Mass. (Seats will then be offered to those parishioners on 'standby' who arrived without pre-registration.)

* One entrance: Entry into church will be front right and left side doors (no entry through middle doors) at St. John's, front door at St. Ann's. PLEASE NOTE THAT IN SEATING PEOPLE (ASIDE FROM THOSE WITH PHYSICAL CHALLENGES), DUE TO SAFETY PROTOCOLS IN PLACE, WE CANNOT GUARANTEE YOU A PARTICULAR SEAT IN THE CHURCH.

* All parishioners must wear masks. There are several exceptions, such as: children under the age of two, and people with underlying health conditions. The wearing of masks for children between the ages of 2-5 is based on the parents' discretion.

* Parishioners should bring their own hand sanitizer if possible. The church will have limited supply.

* Parishioners must maintain 6 feet of social distance between each other at all times. This does not apply to families that live in the same household.

- * Appropriate social distancing spaces will be designated on the floor/in the aisles. Ushers will provide guidance.
- * Everyone will enter church using front doors and leave church using side doors. Those closest to the front doors will leave first

* There will be no sign of peace, offertory collection or singing during Mass. Baskets for financial contributions will be available as you leave church.

* Special instructions on receiving Holy Communion will be presented during each Mass. (Please be patient; wait for instructions by the ushers — everyone will be served.)

* To prevent close contact, the clergy will employ minimal entrancing in or recessing out of the church. (Please wait for the Ushers to exit after the Priest and Deacon have exited.)

* Public gatherings before or after Mass are not permitted outside church.

AN IMPORTANT NOTE:

If you are uneasy about attending such an event, please remember that the Dispensation from Reception of Communion is still in effect. If you are in the "vulnerable/at risk" category, please remember that you need not (nor would I want you to) risk your health and well-being. It is for this reason that I will still be taping Sunday Mass (broadcast on EB-CAM and posted on Facebook/parish websites) and live-streaming Daily Mass on Facebook.
