



My Dear Friends in Christ,

Today's gospel offers us three parables. Parables were story-telling "tools" that the speaker used to convey a greater point. While Jesus was not alone in using parables, He certainly is known for using them, relating these images to greater realities such as salvation and the Kingdom of God. In today's gospel, Jesus is speaking of the "sin and repentance" aspect of our faith by speaking of "The Lost Sheep", "The Lost Coin" and "The Prodigal Son". The first two parables "set up" the third, which brings the point home.

The story of the "Prodigal Son" can be looked at in many different ways. While we tend to look at the "wayward" son as the center of the story, we can also take the tale from the perspective of the father or even of the second ("faithful") son. Depending where we are on our journey of faith, we may be able to relate to any one of these three characters. Some may focus on the "prodigal son", insofar as his journey from sin to forgiveness. The prodigal son gives us a vivid picture not only of the perils of sin, but also the power of forgiving love. The prodigal son, coming to his senses and realizing the error of his ways, goes to the father not expecting anything more than to be treated like a hired hand. The treatment he receives "mirrors" the treatment we receive from God when, with contrite hearts, we approach God seeking – and receiving! – forgiveness. It is a riveting image of the power of God's forgiving love.

We can also look at this story from the perspective of the father. Perhaps in our life there is someone who has "wronged" us, and they approach seeking forgiveness. The father in today's story is a model for us, a way of approaching that encounter. We can hold back that forgiveness, "lording over" the offending party the transgression committed; this is not, however, how God wishes us to act. The father in today's gospel shows us that "to err is human, to forgive, divine". When we forgive, we bring God's grace into the moment, raising it up so that God may bless BOTH parties, healing the wounds of sin and division.

Finally, we can look at the story from the viewpoint of the son. Perhaps we have been faithful to God's teaching, yet we don't feel that we have been given our "due" (i.e. the "young goat" that the "faithful" son feels that he deserves). We might become resentful when we see others who have transgressed getting "rewarded" (i.e., the Prodigal Son), forgetting that God sees all and will deal with them accordingly (probably affording them far more mercy than we would!). We should come to realize that God will deal with us - in His own time and His own way - for "we all must appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each one may receive recompense, according to what he did in the body, whether good or evil" (2 Cor 5:10). It has been said that "whoever brings a sinner back from the error of his way will save his soul from death and cover a multitude of sins" (Jas 5:20). May we have the courage to seek out the "lost" and bring them back into God's good grace by inviting them back into relationship with God. May we know the grace God has waiting for us and may we share that grace with all whom we meet.


To hear from Matt in his own words:

THE DEACON'S COLUMN



Praying with the Senses

The Liturgy we celebrate together is full of tastes, touches, smells, sounds, and sights that move our spirits to wonder in awe of the good things God does for us in the sacraments. This short reflection will turn our attention to how the liturgy appeals to our senses so that we can be moved to full, active, and conscious participation in the Eucharist.

SIGHT—The liturgy is full of many things that are meant to capture our attention through the sense of sight. We notice the beautiful ornamentation of our churches. Consider the stained-glass windows that adorn our churches; from the outside the glass looks dark and dull—but from the inside, the sun illuminates the windows revealing their magnificent beauty. Through these windows the lives of the saints inspire us to holiness and sanctity. There are so many things that catch our attention through sight: the ministers, colors, flowers, vestments, and even the people gathered with us week in and week out. Through these things we are invited to see the beauty of God and the life he invites us to share with him.

HEARING—There are so many things to listen to during the liturgy. We listen to scripture through the first and second readings. Our ears are filled with the sounds of bells ringing during the consecration. Liturgical music fills the space inviting those who sing well to pray twice! Even amidst the various sounds of the liturgy there are moments that are silent inviting us to contemplate the things that we have seen and heard.

SMELL—Easter flowers fill the Church on Easter Sunday and with their fragrant smells of spring, we are filled with hope in new birth. The fragrant aroma of frankincense often fills the air as we use sacred incense during solemn feast days of the Church: funerals, Christmas, Holy Thursday, and Easter Sunday reminding us of the sweetness of heaven and the promise of eternal life.

TOUCH—We may not think about touch as an important means to encounter the sacred mysteries but in many ways, we rely on this sense in the liturgy. We place our finger in Holy Water and trace the sign of the cross on our bodies recalling our baptism. We strike our breast during the Confiteor as we recognize our sin and need for grace. We greet each other at the sign of peace with a handshake, kiss, or hug. We open our hands or stretch out our tongues to receive the Body of Christ.

TASTE—Through the sense of taste, we savor the most sublime but sweetest taste a human can ever experience—that of Jesus Body and Blood in the Eucharist. Through this sense we are invited to "taste and see the goodness of the Lord."

God is so good that he comes to us in many ways to reveal how much he loves us. He is visible in the beauty of the stars at night or in the brilliant palette of sunset. God can be heard in the crashing of waves and in the sounds of a playground. He can be experienced in the sweet tastes of delectable foods and in the sweet and refreshing smells that make us think of home. God is often encountered in the gentle and compassionate touch when we need it the most. Next time you are at Mass allow God to speak to you through all your senses.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY



Today's gospel highlights three parables of Jesus, one of which is "The Prodigal Son". One can look at St. Francis of Assisi as a bit of a "prodigal son". In using his family's wealth, Francis lived much like the Prodigal Son, using up his father's money on wasteful things. When this wealth was not as forthcoming, Francis (like the Prodigal Son) returned

home. In doing so, the Prodigal Son realized the error of his ways; Francis' conversion was not as immediate, but it was just as powerful as (if not more powerful than) the Prodigal Son's change of heart. It was definitely a long-going process which spanned a period of about 3 or 4 years. It was the final outcome of a long process of meditation, of inner torment and repentance, but also of mysterious heavenly visitations, indicating the presence of the hand of God in the whole process.

Conversions are usually the outcome of particular experiences that force a person to do some hard soulsearching, and this is the case with Francis, too. At a certain point in his life Francis began to feel increasingly unsatisfied. He had everything going for him - wealth, health, friends, and girls even, yet he was not happy. God was beginning to make His voice heard, and Francis began searching for something else. This process seems to have started in 1202, when Francis was 20 years old. In that year, a war broke out between Assisi and the nearby city of Perugia. This was a common event between neighboring cities in medieval Italy. Francis, having a natural disposition for chivalry, was one of the first to enlist in the army, and encouraged his friends to do the same. But Assisi lost the war and Francis was taken prisoner and locked away in the grim dungeons of Perugia for a whole year. In those days prisons were often damp, inhospitable places, and prisoners were often treated with brutality. Francis, who was used to a life of comfort and luxury, must surely have been shocked by this experience. But God is able to draw good out of evil, and the interminable days spent in the darkness of the prison must have lit a light in his soul. He had plenty of time to reflect on his past life and his human condition. The harsh existence in the prison had taken a toll on his health, and Francis fell ill. When he was finally able to return home, this illness kept him away from his former lifestyle. Locked up in his own home, often bedridden, he began to see himself and his life with entirely new eyes. Under God's guidance, his meditations became almost continuous, not disturbed by his former work commitments or by his friends. But this was only the beginning of his conversion.

Initially, it appears that he was afraid of following God's call. He was aware that the new life that God was calling him to undertake was neither an easy nor a pleasant one, and he just didn't feel ready for it. But the war, his confinement in prison and his illness had gradually wafted him away from the dream-like existence he had led thus far, and had introduced him to the harsh realities of life. He discovered that the world was filled with darkness and suffering; with poor, hungry, ill and marginalized people. Yet these people often had more interesting stories to tell than his easy going, shallow friends of his former days, whose sole purpose in life was enjoyment. It was at this point that Francis' real conversion "took root" and began his new life! May we be open to a conversion of mind and heart, placing ourselves at the foot of the Cross...just as Francis did.

- To reduce early pregnancies /Marriages. Normally when these youths are not in schools, we end up with early marriages at 15!
