Recently, we have had a bit of a black cloud over the Rectory at St. John's.



My Dear Friends in Christ,

I have no luck with horticulture. If you ever want a plant to die a quick, painless death, put it in my hands. Since my youngest days, I have not had the ability to grow anything. Remember those elementary school projects when you were given charge of a seed with some dirt in a Styrofoam cup? It didn't grow an inch in my care. In fact, I went to check on it (by poking it, of course) and I believe that's when I did it in. I had a friend in college ask me to tend their plants. As much as I begged and pleaded to the contrary, they insisted I could do it. How wrong they were! Needless to say, they never asked me again to watch their plants.

I bring these stories/images up in light of our readings today. In the first reading, responsorial psalm and gospel, the image of a vineyard is used prominently. In the first reading, Isaiah speaks of Israel as a vineyard and how God, try as He might, cannot yield anything but "wild grapes" (an image of the uncooperative nature of the Israelite people). Because of this, God allows the vineyard to be trampled underfoot (read: the kingdom of Israel to be disbursed and left to fend for themselves). They will come around, but not without a lot of "pruning"!

In the responsorial psalm, this image of the vineyard (Israel) is carried forward by the psalmist. In this psalm, the history of the Israelites is laid out, from their captivity in, and exile from, Egypt to their disobedience to their restoration. In this image, God (the vinedresser) never truly abandons Israel (the vineyard), but allows it to "lay fallow" for a time. God will, indeed, restore Israel, in His own time.

In the gospel passage, Jesus uses the image of the vineyard to mirror the people of God. The chief priests and the elders (the caretakers of the vineyard) have not produced the results which God has wanted, for they are only concerned with their own well-being and not that of the people. Because of the inability to tend the "vineyard" to God's liking, the vineyard will be given to someone (read: disciples/ apostles of Jesus) who will care for it.

My friends, we have been given care of the vineyard. We have the opportunity to grow great things, in the form of our parish and our faith. May we have the strength, given by God, to tend the vineyard (the Church), to carefully tend its crop (the people of God) and yield great fruit (souls for the Kingdom).

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

As you are probably aware, the Church (in general) and the Franciscan community (in particular) celebrated the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi on 4 October. This is the seminal feast for

Franciscans, as it honors the founder of the Franciscan Order. It also calls to mind the commitment that we as (Lay, Religious, or Ordained) Franciscans made to the Franciscan Order. As a Secular Franciscan, along with people such as Nancy and Kevin Smith (with whom I professed 16 months ago), I belong to a Community that finds its "home" in the world. Unlike those of the" First Order" and "Second Order", who house themselves in religious communities of like-minded men and women, we as "Third Order" Franciscans situate ourselves in the world. Unlike the First and Second Order, who have physical habits that they wear, we wear the Tau Cross (the cross you've probably seen hanging around my neck) as our "habit". It is these differences that primarily separate the Orders of Franciscans.

As I mentioned, Secular (or Third Order) Franciscans have as their community the world. This can be both a blessing and a challenge. It can be a blessing because wherever we are in the world, we are "at home" with our Franciscan life. It can be a challenge because we must actively seek out other Franciscans, since we don't live in a "community" of them. First and Second Order Franciscans often find themselves in rectories, monasteries, convents, and houses of prayer full of Franciscans. Third Order Franciscans make their community among other Franciscans in meeting rooms/halls, churches, or wherever we can find a gathering space adequate to our needs.

In the time that I have been a professed Secular Franciscan, I have belonged to two different "Fraternities" (or groups of Lay Secular Franciscans). No life is perfect, and the Franciscan life is no different. In my time as a Secular Franciscan, I have (sadly) come to experience some "un-Franciscan" behavior and attitudes. Luckily this has been the exception, but it serves to remind me that for me to be a Franciscan, I cannot take a "day off" from that life. Like my priesthood, being a Secular Franciscan isn't simply "what I do"...it is "who I am". My day -to-day life is infused with Franciscanism, a way of living as St. Francis would want me to do. It means bringing Christ to all, seeing Christ in all, and living my Christian witness with a "Franciscan style" of seeing Christ in everyone – from the "Sultans" in my life to the "lepers" in my life (both in reference to encounters which St. Francis himself had).

I pray that my journey as a Secular Franciscan, just beginning in many ways, is one which will sustain me my whole life long. I pray that I grow in my love of Christ, a love which St. Francis exemplified by his own life and death. I pray that my fellow Secular Franciscans and I continue to bring Francis to all and all to Francis...or, as we Secular Franciscans like to say, "going from Gospel to Life, and Life to the Gospel".


