



My Dear Friends in Christ,

Hal Borland, the American author, was once quoted as saying that "knowing trees, I understand the meaning of patience; knowing grass, I can appreciate persistence". What he speaks of regarding trees and grass can be said about prayer. The elements of both patience and persistence are found in a good, rich prayer life. One may not see one's prayers answered in the time frame or fashion that they would like, but that doesn't mean that those prayers go unanswered. I once heard a priest say that "God answers all prayers – sometimes that answer is 'no'". God knows what we need to grow in faith, hope and love. God also knows those things that we need (as opposed to praying for or expecting only those things we want).

In today's gospel, Jesus recounts the parable of the persistent woman and the dishonest judge. The woman is persistent in her prayer and the judge fears that her persistence will be transformed into anger or, worse yet, violence. It is by this persistence that the woman has her "day in court" (literally and figuratively). She is heard not because of any fear the judge has for God or people, but out of fear that the judge has in potentially losing his life. At the center of this "change of heart" is the persistence of the woman; she is relentless in her pursuit of a just verdict. Her persistence wins her the day.

Jesus tells us to take a lesson from this parable, namely to be persistent in prayer. Jesus' challenge to the hearer of this parable comes from both His desire for people to develop a relationship with God and His fear that people will lose faith if they don't remain diligent in their prayer. Jesus wonders aloud that when He comes back "will he find faith on earth?" (Lk 18:8). Jesus knows how easily people's faith can be shaken. Jesus has seen this doubt and fear in others and He will see it in His own disciples (at the end of His earthly days). Jesus knows the only way that people can be ready for trials and tribulations is by developing and maintaining a solid prayer life. This requires both persistence and patience.

This persistence and patience can overcome spiritual fatigue. In the first reading, as Joshua leads the Israelites into battle, with Moses leading the "spiritual warfare". As long as Moses was persistent, and didn't let weariness overcome him (with a little "assist" from Aaron and Hur), the Israelites had the better of the fight. The same can be true of us, as there are sometimes when we need support for our prayers. Thank God we have a community of believers, a family of faith to whom we can turn for such support (or whom we can support). In this way, we all grow closer to God in prayer and life. May we have the courage to be persistent in prayer, diligent in life. May we know that God is with us, hearing our prayers and giving us what we need to grow in faith, hope and love.

NEWS FROM THE PARISHES

LAST WEEK'S SECOND COLLECTION WAS SCHEDULED FOR THE PURCHASE OF NEW MISSALS FOR THE UP-COMING LIGURGICAL YEAR. WE DID NOT MAKE THE AMOUNT WE NEEDED SO THIS WEEK'S SECOND COLLECTION WILL BE FOR MISSALS AS WELL.

THE SECOND COLLECTION IS TO PAY THE PAST-DUE BILL TO OCP FOR LAST YEAR'S MISSALS (BREAKING BREAD) FOR BOTH PARISHES WHICH IS \$1483.

WE CANNOT ORDER NEW MISSALS FOR THE UP-COMING NEW LITURGICAL YEAR UNTIL AND UNLESS WE PAY THIS BILL. THEY WILL NOT SHIP ANYTHING ELSE TO US UNTIL OUR ACCOUNT IS CAUGHT UP.

WE THEN WILL ALSO HAVE TO PAY FOR THE NEW MISSALS WHICH WILL COST ABOUT THE SAME AS LAST YEAR.

SO WE NEED APPROXIMATELY \$3000. TO BE ABLE TO ORDER NEW MISSALS FOR BOTH PARISHES.


All forms must are due in office by October 30th.

Sparking Holiness

As the seasons change, a lot of us like to clean out our homes and unload some of the junk we've acquired over the summer. One trendy approach to decluttering is the Marie Kondo method, named after the author who popularized it. Overly simplified, it's a process that compels you to go through your closets, your garage, your basement — all the places you collect the dreaded "stuff." As you do so, you hold up the items and ask yourself: "Does it spark joy?"

It's a question that is bold in its simplicity. In answering, you're supposed to go with your gut. If it's a quick "Yes, it sparks joy," the item should be kept. If the answer is no, it gets tossed.

There are people in life who will support our efforts to do God's will. There are those who will, as Paul says, "convince, reprimand, (and) encourage," unafraid of the reaction we give them. There are those who will shore up our defenses when the battle goes longer than we thought.



MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

In today's gospel, Jesus speaks to his disciples about the necessity for them to pray without ceasing. For St. Francis, prayer was not important until his conversion, being immersed as he was in his earlier life in things of the world - pursuits such as fame and fortune to be found in the life of a knight. Only in prayer were his knightly ambitions turned in a new direction; only in prayer did he find the strength to lead the people who wanted to follow him—but on their own terms. Prayer enabled him to discover the link between the Church that Jesus established and the Church that needed much more conversion to Jesus' ways.

We often think of prayer as an activity that is guaranteed to leave us more serene than when we began it. It does ultimately lead to serenity, but only after it has led us into deeper honesty about God, other people, and ourselves. As long as certain parts of a person's life are "off limits" as the subject of prayer, that person's possibilities for conversion will be stunted.

Prayer is not for the weak at heart, and Francis of Assisi knew that. Prayer is not simply rearranging a person's thoughts; it leads to discarding some "spiritual deadwood" that is no longer compatible with God's ways and acquiring other attitudes as necessary in order to live honestly before God, with other people, and with ourselves.

May we have the courage of St. Francis to face the truths of our life and, through unceasing prayer, come to conversion of mind, heart, and life.
