

My Dear Friends in Christ,

There has been, for the longest time, what could be called "end-time phobia". It is the panicked approach by some that "The End Is Near" (as I saw on a placard in downtown Brockton recently). This "visionary" approach is usually paired with some "doomsday scenario" taken either from the Book of Revelation or the mind of movie director James Cameron - take your pick! Well, here it is – the year 2015; it is fifteen years past the predictions of "Y2K" and what would follow and we're still here.

My point in bringing up all of these end-of-the-world scenarios is not to dismiss the fact that the world will end. Regardless of the "when", the "if" of the matter hardly up for debate; by all accounts, spiritual and secular, the world will end. In today's gospel, Jesus prepares His followers for the fact that the world, as we know it, will cease at some point. What Jesus does not reveal is the "when" of the event. for it is only in the mind and heart of God the Father and, as my mother would say, "God only knows, and He ain't tellin'!" This should not worry us, but it should serve as a reminder to us that each day is a gift, and that we should indeed work as if each day was our last. In that way, we fulfill the prayerful mandate of the "Our Father" that we make "thy Kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven". The "Lord's Prayer" reminds us, in this stanza, that the day/date/time of the "parousia" (the "end time") should not concern us. What should concern us is that we are building up God's Kingdom here on earth as best we can, by being God's good and faithful service, reaching out to those in need, lifting the downtrodden and assisting those who are in need of God's mercy and love to find it in us, God's faithful servants.

Today's readings speak of the "end times" – what they will look and feel like, how they will come about for all, believers and non-believers alike. We would do well to heed these words, to put our faith not in human beings but in God, and work so that when the end comes (as it surely will) we are found ready to be welcomed into God's Kingdom. Jesus promises us that His Word will be with us until the end of time. May we trust in that word of hope, peace and love. May we come to know that our God will not leave us abandoned and may we be prepared to be welcomed into God's Kingdom by being, and remaining, God's good and faithful servants.

# **MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY**

I am in the "home stretch" of my Candidacy, the period of preparation before one offers their "Profession", or life-long commitment, to the Secular Franciscan Order (OFS). Unlike the "end times" alluded to in today's Gospel (Mark 13:24-32), this Profession isn't an ending but a beginning. If one thinks of it like graduation, that's the sense one would get with Profession. Graduation is often referred to a "Commencement", and rightfully so. It may be the end of something (e.g., high school, college, or graduate school) but it is also the beginning of something (i.e., a new "chapter in one's life).

This "beginning" is what Profession in the OFS is all about. Once a candidate in formation in the Secular Franciscan Order is "Professed", they have full rights, privileges, and responsibilities in the OFS. They are able to hold office, vote on matters pertaining to the Order (especially on the level of the local fraternity to which they belong), and participate fully in the life of the (Local) Fraternity and the Order (as a body). It also comes with it responsibilities, duties which only professed members can undertake and accomplish. This does not mean the candidate stands idly by, waiting for profession. A candidate can participate in the life of the Order by taking what they learn in formation and applying it to both life in the OFS and life in their home, work, and family.

So, to sum up...Candidates work towards Profession, and this Profession leads to a fully active life in the OFS. Professed member have full rights, and responsibilities in the OFS. All members, both candidates and professed members, seek to incorporate Franciscan charisms into their everyday life, as well as life in the OFS. Ultimately, the goal is to live the "motto" of the OFS, namely "Bringing Gospel to Life and Life to Gospel".

## The Deacon's Column Reverencing the Altar

As a young child, my parents took me into Faneuil Hall several times a year—in the summer and always around Christmas—never did I stop to think

why there were red bricks along some of the city sidewalks. Yet, there is something about walking the freedom trail and stopping at some of the major places that shaped the future and identity of our nation. It is important to visit these places as they remind us of the sacrifice's others made for the freedoms we enjoy. When we visit historical places, it is not uncommon for us to pause and remember with a brief but profound moment of silence.

The cross is the place where Christ meets us in our most profound human need—in sin and death. Each one of us cannot escape the reality of our own sin. We try; but we cannot escape it. Even as we run away from God in guilt and shame, our God comes to us in Jesus Christ. At the cross Jesus meets every human being who dies. He does so to not only stand in solidarity with us in death, but to take away the consequences of sin which is eternal separation from God and our loved ones who die in faith. By taking on the cross, Jesus meets us as we try to carry our own and share the burden of each other's crosses.

The altar we gather around is a profound symbol in our Catholic faith. Fundamentally, the altar is a symbol of the Cross. When the priest and deacon come to the altar and reverence it with a kiss, they gather with them the respect that each Christian hold in their heart for the good things Jesus does for us by taking up the Cross for our salvation. Each one of us makes a procession from our individual homes to our common home in Church. We do so because we know and believe that Jesus has met us in our need and offers to us the grace of a new beginning in him.

There is a difference between visiting historical sites where important events happened in the past and what Catholics do every time we come before he altar. A person visiting the spot of the Boston Massacre "remembers" that historical event, but when a Catholic comes to the altar, the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross is not only "remembered" but it is made present for those who gather around it. As a symbol of the cross, the altar IS the place where Jesus works the greatest sacrifice on our behalf. The altar IS the place where humanity and God are reconciled. The altar IS the place where we see the great love our God has for each one of us. The altar IS the place where God meets us and where, by our procession to Church, we meet Him as he takes away our sin and restores us to friendship with God.

Every time I kiss the altar, I am mindful of my own need for grace. I come to the altar recognizing that Christ meets me, meets us, in our own sinfulness, woundedness, and brokenness. By standing with us in death, he offers us the hope of the resurrection and the newness of life his rebirth brings for all those who believe. Considering this mystery, how do we not bow down and reverence the altar with a kiss?

#### Sin on the Soul

Why do some sacraments leave a character or mark on the soul? Don't all sacraments affect the soul?

All sacraments mediate grace and connect us to Christ and to the Church. Some sustain us in our faith journey, while others help us heal from the effects of sin. Each one offers a share in God's life, giving us what we need to be faithful followers of Jesus. But some sacraments change us in ways that are irreversible. The three sacraments that leave a character are Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Orders. We are literally different people because of the effect of the grace of those sacraments. We are changed at the core of our being in such a fundamental way that we can not go back to what we once were.

In Baptism, we are freed from original sin, initiated into the Body of Christ as adopted sons and daughters. In Confirmation, we are given the fullness of God's Spirit, sealed in his grace and gifted with what we need to live a Christian life. In Holy Orders, a priest is marked as an 'alter Christus,' another Christ, and is once and forever a priest who offers sacrifice, forgives sin, and acts in the person of Christ. In these three sacraments, we are conformed more closely to Christ, reflecting his love and truth.

# St Ann's Parish Center Renovation Fund and Religious Education Update

I would like to update all of you on the Renovation Project and the opening of the Religious Ed Program. I have both good news and bad news to share.

I will give you the bad news first. We have completed our negotiations with the contractors and unfortunately at this time we are not able to start the renovations. The original contractor that we hired had agreed to give us payment terms of net 6 months. Therefore, we were going to be able to do the renovation and pay for it within 6 months' time. However, the new contractor was not able to offer us the same terms. We would have needed to pay, net 30 days, which is not possible for us to do. Therefore, we will now need to raise the money prior to starting the work. We will be doing many fundraising activities over the next few months to pay for the renovations. We thank you in advance for your support of our fundraising activities.

Next, the good news. We will be able to have our Religious Ed Classes for Grades 1-8 at St John's, starting the first weekend of December. When we were initially analyzing our facilities, there were some concerns regarding St John's Hall, which prohibited us from being able to open the hall. I am happy to say that these issues have been resolved so we are now focusing our efforts into being able to open the hall by the first weekend of December to be able to have Religious Ed classes in the hall. We will be purchasing the air filtration systems for St John's hall and for both of the churches.

We will spend the next few weeks working on St. John's hall to be able to open it on time for class. There are many volunteer opportunities regarding getting the hall ready. We need people to help us paint and we need people to help us move furniture. If you are able to help with either one of these, we would greatly appreciate the help! 
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
