The figure of John the Baptist is quite an imposing one. Yes, he was a prophet but he was unlike any that had been seen before. With a tunic made of camel's hair fastened by a leather belt, and



dining on a diet of locusts and wild honey, John was unique. On top of all of this John resided in the desert, his life taking on a hermetic or monastic tone. It's no wonder that people stood up and took notice of this unusual man.

We would do well to notice John the Baptist as well. John is a seminal figure in the Advent journey, as he serves as a herald for Jesus' coming into the world. In the gospel passage we have before us this weekend, John is spoken of (by the prophet Isaiah) in his role as herald. He then comes into the spotlight, but one which he will not have for long. In speaking of the coming of the adult Jesus, the One who is already in the world and ready to begin His public ministry, John immediately sets the record straight, placing himself as messenger...not the message. He proclaims himself unworthy of that title, recognizing that he is "not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his (i.e. Jesus') sandals" (Mk 1:7). This gospel passage is a clear indicator of the roles that each is to play. John is the messenger, Jesus is the message.

This is where we come in. In our Advent journey, we are preparing our minds, hearts and lives for the coming of the Christ. In this preparation, there is a two-fold waiting: the waiting for the Christ Child, yes, but also the waiting for Christ as the King of Glory. It is this second "waiting" that is highlighted for us in the encounter we have with John the Baptist. It is by virtue of our baptism that we are called, like John, to be "heralds" of Christ. We are called to let people know that Jesus is coming, but we are also called to let people know that Jesus is already here. We let people know of Jesus' presence among us by how we conduct ourselves, how we live our lives. In proclaiming Jesus' presence, and by living our lives in union with Christ, we show in word and deed the place Jesus has in our lives.

May we continue on this Advent journey to prepare our minds, our hearts, our very lives for the coming of the Lord. May we also recognize Jesus' presence already among us and may we be unafraid to proclaim (and claim) Jesus in word and deed to all whom we meet.

#### **MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY**

As we move through our Advent journey, coming now to the Second Sunday of

Advent, our gospel introduces us to John the Baptist. John was an interesting figure, to say the least. His iconoclastic ways set him apart from what people usually thought of when they thought of a prophet. His living arrangement (i.e., choosing to

seclude himself in the desert), his clothes (camel's hair and a leather belt) and diet (locusts and wild honey) all caused him to stand out from the norm, even for prophets.

St. Francis was cut much from the same cloth. He claimed to have visions in which God spoke to him ("rebuild my church, which is falling down"). After his conversion, he eschewed worldly ways by choosing to live in simple, humble surroundings and wear simple clothing (almost ragged to the eye). He spoke with a force and power that had rarely been seen (much like John the Baptist). He lived a mendicant lifestyle, subsisting by begging for food and money to undertake his mission (given to him by God, who told him to "rebuild my church" (a call to restore not the physical nature of the church, but its spiritual base).

Both John the Baptist and St. Francis of Assisi had a deep love for the Lord. John the Baptist was Jesus' herald, proclaiming him as the "Lamb of God" to those who would have ears to hear. St. Francis proclaimed Jesus' love for the "poor in spirit" by seeing Christ in them and being Christ for them. In both John and Francis, we see how we are to proclaim our relationship with Jesus in both word and deed. May this Advent Season, this journey towards Christmas, be a time of discovery for us. May we discover who Jesus is for us, not only as the one who calls us into relationship with Him here and now, but who also leads us to the Father and to God's Eternal Kingdom of Peace and Love.

The World Is Pregnant

There is a character, Rose of Sharon, in John Steinbeck's Grapes of Wrath who is pregnant with her first child. As her impoverished family migrates from their native Oklahoma to California, Rose of Sharon's all-consuming preoccupation is her unborn child. Everything she eats, every drink she lets pass her lips, every action she takes — none of it is done without thought for the child that is still so small as to make his mother's expectancy barely discernible to the naked eye. "For Rose of Sharon was pregnant," wrote Steinbeck. "And the world was pregnant to her."

It is the same for us Christians in the Advent season. We can feel a change coming, and the hope of this change consumes us. It shapes our actions and our plans, we feel it in our hearts and in our souls and in our limbs. From the food we eat to the clothing we wear to the words we use, the unseen Child lives and breathes and works in every small part of this blessed season.

Even the commercial clamor that is the secular "Christmas holiday" cannot fully distract us from the holy sense of anticipation we have. We are baptized, and so it is inside of us, this voice that cries out in the desert. When we hear it, we cannot help but listen.

The Virgin is pregnant, and the world is pregnant to us.
