My Dear Friends in Christ,



It appears, in today's gospel, that we have the beginnings of a "mutual admiration society" with John the Baptist and Jesus. John the Baptist has been imprisoned, and he had heard word of Jesus' works - preaching, teaching, and healing (even raising one from the dead!). The "wheels start turning" for John, and he inquires of his disciples if this might be...the One (the Messiah). John's disciples, in turn, are told by Jesus that John should look at all that is happening within Jesus' ministry. John, no doubt, ponders all of this and becomes more convinced that the work that he began (in proclaiming the Messiah's coming) has come to fruition. Jesus, for His part, extols the work of John, even going so far as to call him the greatest person born of woman (a rather bold statement, in light of Jesus' birth by Mary!).

Jesus and John are intrinsically linked, one to the other. We cannot speak of John without mentioning the purpose and goal of his preaching – to announce the coming of the Messiah and to get people to follow Him. In the same vein, we cannot speak of Jesus without "giving a nod" as to how His public started, namely His baptism in the Jordan by John the Baptist. In this way, and so many more (let's not forget their kinship, as evidenced by the relationship between Mary and Elizabeth), today's gospel "sets the stage" for the final weeks of Advent and our preparations being made to welcome the Christ Child into our midst.

Our role is not unlike John the Baptist. We are called, by virtue of our baptism, to proclaim Christ. We are called not only to proclaim His coming, but the fact that the Kingdom of God (at the heart of which we find Jesus) is not only to come but is ALREADY AMONG US. Like John the Baptist, we are called to be heralds of God's Word (in Holy Scripture) and Sacrament (of Holy Eucharist). We may not be imprisoned for this proclamation, but we are nonetheless called to "die to self" so that Christ might live in us. This "white martyrdom" is something that places us squarely in the company of Christ. We are called, as Christ was, to not only announce the Kingdom of God but to be Kingdom-centered people. How do we do this? It's quite simple, really – we are to keep our focus on Jesus. When we focus on Jesus, we don't shut out the world; when we focus on Jesus, quite the contrary is true – we enter into the world with Jesus within us.

May we have the courage, like John the Baptist before us, to be heralds of God's Word. May we receive the Sacraments (especially Eucharist and Reconciliation) so as to be open, pure, and ready vessels of God's grace. May we share God's grace with all whom we meet, so that they may come to know what we have come to know – that Jesus Christ has broken the chains of sin and death and won for us newness of life.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

As we move through our Advent journey, we once again encounter John the Baptist. John was one who was so powerful, so unusual, that many thought him to be the Christ, the Messiah. In today's gospel, Jesus, Himself, extols the virtues of John even going so far as to say that "among those born of women, there has been none greater than John the Baptist" (Matthew 11:11). Part of John's appeal was the radical nature of his message. John's prophetic voice was one that had not been heard before, even though there had been hundreds of prophets (both God -sent and self-appointed). His message was one which would pave the way for the coming of THE Messiah, THE Christ...Jesus, Himself.

Francis, of course, in coming well after Jesus, was not thought of as the "second coming". Even though Francis' message was one of "evangelical poverty", and was associated closely with the message and mission of Jesus, Francis himself was not ever put in the same category as Jesus. He could, however, some might argue, be put in the same category as John the Baptist. In many ways, Francis (like John the Baptist) could (and should) be considered a prophetic voice, a "voice proclaims in the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord" (Isaiah 40:3). Often times, Francis stood alone in his pronouncements, sometimes in opposition to his brothers but never in opposition to the Church. He was a staunch churchman, one who was a loval son of Rome/son of God. When he strove to move the order forward into being, he often had to struggle mightily. He faced ridicule in embracing "Lady Poverty", as well as seeking to establish the Franciscan Order. He later faced the challenges of two failed pilgrimages, the Holy Land and the loss of his eyesight. Throughout his ministry, Francis fought at every turn to establish, and keep going, the Order.

Yet, in all of this, he remained faithful to the call which Christ placed on his heart. Like John the Baptist, he remained faithful to his calling to the Lord with regards to his mission for the Church. May we be like John the Baptist and St. Francis of Assisi. May we, despite roadblocks and detours, remain steady on our Advent journey and our journey to the Kingdom.

I Believe in one Lord Jesus Christ: Common Titles and Names

In my work as deacon, I have buried people in a multitude of cemeteries that have many different rules and regulations; yet, despite the many limitations cemeteries place on personal memorials, families are able to express, in a few words, symbols, or images, the love they have for their loved ones and their hope in the promises of Jesus Christ. Our ancient Christian forbears did the same when memorializing their deceased loved ones and friends. Many of these memorials can be see in the underground cemeteries (catacombs) in Rome. Of the many symbols memorialized in the catacombs, fish was prominent and widely used. One might ask, why was the outline of a fish used to mark the graves of Christians. The Greek word for "fish" is IXTHUS and was used by ancient Christians to express their faith in Jesus. The word is an acronym formed by taking the first letters of the Greek words for Jesus (Iesus), Christ (Xristos), God's (Theos), Son (Huios), Savior (Soter). If you combine the bolder letters you get the Greek word for fish: IXTHUS. By looking at each term more closely we can appreciate the faith our ancient forebears held and passed onto us.

Jesus—In the Gospel of Luke, Mary is told that when the time comes for her to give birth, she is to name the child Jesus. The name Jesus is a Greek form of the Hebrew name Joshua which literally means: God Saves. Jesus' name reveals what God is doing in and through him. By his life, death, and resurrection, God saves humanity from their sin and restores humanity back to eternal life.

Christ—Christ, is not a name but a title. It was used in the Old Testament to speak about the Messiah, the Chosen One of God who would bring liberation and salvation to God's people. Literally, Christ means "anointed one." In the ancient world, priests, prophets, and kings were chosen and marked for service by an anointing of sacred oil. Jesus is the Chosen One who, at his baptism, is anointed by the Holy Spirit to be for us, and the whole world, priest, prophet, and king. At our baptism, we too are anointed with Sacred Chrism and become "another Christ" in the world called to share with Jesus Christ his ministry as priest, prophet, and king.

Son of God—The title Son of God has a rich history among ancient Jewish, Christian, and Greco-Roman worlds. In the Old Testament the title was used to refer to the anointed king of Israel. But in other places it is used to describe the People of God and in other places the angels that make up the heavenly hosts. In the Second Book of Samuel (chapter 7), God promises a son to David that will be God's own Son. This Son, God promised, will establish a royal dynasty who will sit on the throne of Israel forever. At Jesus' baptism, God declares Jesus as his only and beloved Son with whom, he is well pleased. Through our baptism we become adopted sons and daughters of God and are taught by Jesus to address him as "Our Father" when we pray.

Savior—The title "Savior" is a unique term used in the New Testament for Jesus. Many are surprised to learn that of the synoptic gospel (Matthew, Mark, and Luke), Luke is the only one who calls Jesus by this title—and he does so only twice. Upon visiting her cousin Elizabeth, she sings her song of praise to God her Savior. A few verses later, the angels announce to the shepherds that "today, in the city of David a child is born who is both Savior and Lord." Indeed, Jesus is the one through whom we are saved from sin and death so we can enjoy the bliss, joy, and happiness of eternal life.

Christians used the symbol of a fish to reveal what they believed about Jesus Christ. He is our God who saves. He is the one anointed and chosen by God to bring salvation to the world. He is God's own son who shares with God his divinity and invites us to share in the divine life by becoming the Father's sons and daughters at baptism. Finally, Jesus is the savior of the world. He is sent by the father to not only break the chains of sin and death but to lead us to eternal life. Next time you see the Jesus fish do not be afraid to confess your faith in Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior.


