

Ex. If you attend the 8:30 at Saint Ann and do not specify that you want your offertory to go to Saint John by using an envelope for your cash, it will be counted as offertory for Saint Ann.



My Dear Friends in Christ,

Today we find ourselves in the "home stretch" of Advent. Christmas is in just a couple of days, and we take these "final days" (presuming the "street-corner prophets" are wrong about the "final days"!) to reflect on this four week journey that we have undertaken. Our readings beautifully link the themes on which we have been contemplating and praying during our Advent Season, namely "promise", "joy", "repentance" and "transformation".

In our first reading, the prophet Micah gives assurance to the Jews that God is faithful to His promises and that God will bring to prominence the "unimportant" village of Bethlehem. In doing this, God (through the prophet Micah) shows to us that no one, and nothing that one does, is insignificant. In the second reading, St. Paul reminds us that Jesus, in doing the will of the Father, shows us that through sacrifice and obedience we draw ourselves closer into the mystery of God. In our gospel, we have the encounter of two *seemingly* "insignificant" women highlighting the fact that nothing that we do in the name of God is ever insignificant. Mary and Elizabeth are powerful models of faith and faithfulness to us all, and their individual "fiats" (saying "yes" to God's plan) are a reflection of the "yes" that we are called to give to God.

Advent has been, I hope and pray, a time when we prepare our minds, hearts and lives for the coming of Christ. Over the last four weeks this time of preparation has been, please God, not an insignificant journey in which we have been transformed by God's grace and love. As we stand on the threshold of Christmas (both the Day and the Season), may we use these final days not just to "make a list and check it twice", but also to continue to reflect on the goodness of God. As we approach the Christmas miracle of the Virgin Birth, may we come to see that Christ is already a part of our lives, even as we prepare to welcome Him once again. May this upcoming Christmas Day (and Season) be a time of prosperity, hope and joy. May we come to see the Christ Child as the One who comes into the world to set us free, so that when He comes in glory, He may find us watching, waiting and knowing that He is Emmanuel...."God With Us"!

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

In today's gospel, Mary has a beautiful encounter with her kinswoman Elizabeth. When Mary arrives at Elizabeth's home, the child within the womb of Elizabeth (who we know to be John the Baptist) leaps at the sound of Mary's voice. To me, this speaks

volumes about both John (who recognizes the voice of the Mother of God) and Mary (who is carrying the Messiah). Elizabeth then joins in by acknowledging Mary as the "Theotokos", the "God Bearer". It is a powerful testament of faith for all. It also brings into the forefront the role of Mary in salvation history. For the Franciscan community, it also brings into bearing the place that Mary has in the Franciscan ethos.

According to a pious legend, one day St. Francis of Assisi had a vision in which he saw his friars trying to reach Christ by a ladder that was red and very steep. After climbing a few rungs, they would suddenly fall back. Our Lord then showed St. Francis another ladder, white and much less steep, at whose summit appeared the Blessed Virgin, and He said to Francis: "Advise your sons to go by the ladder of My Mother." Among those devotions rich in Franciscan tradition is the devotion to the Virgin Mother of God. St. Francis of Assisi was among the greatest Marian devotees in the history of the Church and, according to the Second Vita of Thomas of Celano, had a love for her that was beyond words. "Inexpressible," he writes of Francis' love for the Blessed Virgin, "for it was she who made the Lord of majesty our brother." St. Francis chose her as the patroness and Queen of the Friars Minor and exhorted his friars to always possess a true and living devotion to the Mother of God. This loving devotion is imbued in his famous Salutation to the Blessed Virgin Mary:

HAIL, O LADY,

MARY, HOLY MOTHER OF GOD: YOU ARE THE VIRGIN MADE CHURCH AND THE ONE CHOSEN BY THE MOST HOLY FATHER IN HEAVEN WHOM HE CONSECRATED WITH HIS MOST HOLY BELOVED SON AND WITH THE HOLY SPIRIT THE PARACLETE. IN WHOM THERE WAS AND IS THE FULLNESS OF GRACE AND EVERY GOOD HAIL HIS PALACE! HAIL HIS TABERNACLE! HAIL HIS HOME! HAIL HIS ROBE! HAIL HIS SERVANT! HAIL HIS MOTHER! AND (HAIL) ALL YOU HOLY VIRTUES WHICH THROUGH THE GRACE AND LIGHT OF THE HOLY SPIRIT ARE POURED INTO THE HEARTS OF THE FAITHFUL SO THAT FROM THEIR FAITH-LESS STATE YOU MAY MAKE THEM FAITHFUL TO GOD. AMEN

As we approach Christmas Day (and the Season of Christmas) let us turn to Our Mother to draw us ever closer to her Son and His gospel message of love.


THE DEACON'S COLUMN

Glory to God in the Highest

In George Shultz's, Charlie Brown's Christmas, Charlie Brown and Linus are preparing for their Christmas play when Charlie asks Linus the following question: "Isn't there anyone who knows what Christmas is all about? To which, Linus replies, "Sure, Charlie Brown, I can tell you what Christmas all is about." Then Linus takes center stage, and quotes from Luke's Gospel, "And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were so afraid. And the angel said unto them, 'Fear not: for behold, I bring unto you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the City of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God, and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." He concludes, "That's what Christmas is all about, Charlie Brown."

I am struck that the Gospel is proclaimed every year by the fifth evangelist--Linus! There are many things going on in the hymn but essentially is an acclamation of joy for the good things God is doing for us in Jesus Christ. In the gospel passage Linus quotes the shepherds are in the fields at night. The shepherds are counted among the public sinners and outcasts because they are not able to go to the Temple and make the required sacrifices. And yet, it is to the sinner, to the outcast, and to all those who feel overwhelmed by the many forms of darkness that puts fear into our hearts. "For unto you is born this day a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." Though the angel addresses the shepherds, the angel's message breaks through time and space and speaks to all of us!!!! Fear is replaced with Joy and after announcing the Good News, the angels sing a hymn of praise and joy. As Christians set free from sin and death, we are invited to give praise in the angelic song of joy when we gather to celebrate Eucharist.

The Roman Missal indicates that the Gloria is sung or recited on Sundays except during Lent and Advent. Lent and Advent are two seasons that have a penitential character to them. By omitting the Gloria during these two seasons the liturgy invites us to reflect on our need for a savior and our need to be reconciled to God through the death and resurrection of His Son. But during Christmas and Easter, we rejoice because God has broken through the darkness and has given us a savior who frees us from all our sins. During Ordinary Time we are invited to see how the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus sanctifies all time – and in joy we sing, "Glory to God in the Highest."





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
