



MASSES FOR THE WEEK

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Robert Frost once wrote that "home is the place, that when you go there, they have to



take you in". A rather wry statement, it should "ring true" for most (if not all) of us. I know that at the end of my day, when I come home I have at least one who is happy to see me – my dog, Nellie. Nellie and I are, for all intents and purposes, family. When I had my picture taken a couple of years back for the parish website, more than one person asked if Nellie was going to be in the photo; I said, "Of course – she's family!" This may be stretching what one thinks of as family, but when I think of the qualities which Nellie has – unconditional love, loyalty, a sense of belonging – it fits what I think of when I reflect on family life.

This day, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Holy Family (of Jesus, Mary and Joseph), a celebration of what, and who, God calls us to be. The Holy Family is for us the most perfect image we have here on earth of what it means to be a family. When one thinks of the sacrifices they made to maintain the "family unit", it boggles the mind! They endured long journeys, unsettled accommodations and (for Mary and Joseph) the loss of an only child. I look at the families of our parish and see the struggles they endure in this day and age – an unsettled economy which threatens the livelihood of one (or both) of the adults, the assault of conflicting, often vulgar, media images on our children and the stress of balancing family life with the many commitments the world puts upon them (parents and children alike). I often wonder how the Holy Family would have handled it, and I keep coming back to one answer – trust in God. It is only through trust, born of faith that kept the Holy Family intact. The same is true for us; the main thing which will keep the "family unit" whole and undivided is faith - faith in God, faith in one another. This is certainly not an easy thing to achieve or maintain. It takes hard work, day in and day out. It takes a level of commitment that the world neither understands nor appreciates. We have "glimpses" of the family unit being honored and celebrated, but by and large the family is often held up to ridicule. Just look at how the media portrays most families – fathers are all too often portrayed as overbearing tyrants or lame simpletons, mothers are often seen as either lazy or manipulative, and children are seen as either greedy or entitled. This may happen at times but it is not (thank God) the norm, nor should it be celebrated as such.

The Feast of the Holy Family gives us a better perspective of how family life should be. It is not without challenges, as we see in the lives of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. It is not without work, as we reflect upon our second reading regarding how we are to conduct our lives. And it is not without God, as we see throughout the scriptures. If we are to model ourselves after the Holy Family, let us put on our hearts all the things of which St. Paul speaks – "compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience" (Col 3:12). Let us not waste a moment to ponder, as did the Holy Family, all the good things the Lord has done for us!

January Teen Mass


Our next Teen Mass is January 28th at the 6:15 Mass. There will be contemporary music and Fr. Paul will make his homily relevant to the life of our young people.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY



Today the Church celebrates the Feast of the Holy Family. We are called to look to Mary, Joseph, and (the Child) Jesus as the model and

exemplar for family life. When one looks at the life of St. Francis of Assisi, it is a "mixed bag" of both holy and secular living. Francis was born on September 26, 1181 in Assisi to Pietro di Bernardone dei Moriconi, a very wealthy cloth merchant, and his wife Giovanna also known as Pica Bourlemont, about whom little is known except she is said to have belonged to a noble family of Provence, France. He was one of seven children.

Pietro was in France on business when Francis was born, and Pica had him baptized as Giovanni di Bernardone to honor San Giovanni Battista (Saint John the Baptist), in the hope he would grow to be a great religious leader. She even staged the birth of her son in a stable built for the occasion on the ground floor of their home to honor the birth of Jesus. Later the stable will be known as "stalletta" or "Chapel of baby Saint Francis" and it is located in the main square of Assisi. When Pietro returned to Assisi, he decided to add Francesco (Francis) to his son's first name. This name was the medieval equivalent of francese, i.e. "French" and was chosen to honor France, his favored business destination and to honor the child's maternal heritage.

Pietro's worldly success and the imperial privileges granted by the city governor Duke Corrado di Lützen had secured for the young Francis a care-free life of material comfort. He received his education at the catholic school of San Giorgio, spoke fluent Latin and Provençal and was considered by his father the natural heir of his family business. Francis was short and skinny, and had dark hair. He was a popular youth, often the center of attention that could be found engaged in sport, frequenting the piazze of the city and leisurely spending his father's money. His nickname was "rex iuvenum" (king of banquets).

After the death of the German Emperor Enrico IV (1165-1197) and the election of a new pope, Cardinal Lotario di Segni, later known as Innocenzo III (1198-1216), the political landscape changed and the pope took under his control additional territories which also included Spoleto and Assisi. The people of these towns revolted against the nobles who took refuge in the nearby town of Perugia. Francis who had dreams of being a knight took part in this war and when the Assisians were defeated in Ponte San Giovanni, he became a prisoner of Perugia and spent one year in prison. His family was able to get him out after paying a substantial ransom but his health had already been compromised.

This started a spiritual crisis where he abandoned his former life to embrace meditation, nursing lepers and begging for the poor. His father Pietro attempted to bring him to his senses, first with threats and then with corporal punishment. After a final interview in the presence of the bishop Guido II, Francis renounced his father and his wealth, laying aside even the garments he had received from him while the bishop covered him with his mantle. He lived as a beggar around Assisi. Returning to the town, he restored several ruined churches, among them San Damiano, San Pietro alla Spira, and the Porziuncola in Santa Maria degli Angeli, just outside the town, which later became his favorite refuge.

On this feast of the Holy Family, let us strive to live like Francis, not seeing the world as a place to conquer, but as a place to offer God's love to all peoples. Let us go into this new year with a heart like Francis, striving to see Jesus in all and be Jesus for all.
