A man went out fishing one day and, much to his dismay, caught nothing!

Realizing that he couldn't face his wife without at least one fish, he went to the fish market and approached the counter. He picked out a beautiful fish, and proceeded to ask the "fish monger" to throw him the fish over the counter. When asked why the man would want this, the fisherman replied, "this way, I can honestly tell my wife that I caught a fish"!

The disciples who Jesus approaches are fishermen, by trade. In fishing "the Lake of Gennesaret" (Lk 5:1), which is the Greek name for Galilee, they were plying their trade in a fish-rich area. The body of water in question is thirteen miles long and seven-and-a-half miles wide and, in Jesus' day, had ten prosperous towns along the coastline. Needless to say, it was a great place to fish and it must have been both frustrating and nerve-wracking for Simon Peter and his mates not to have caught anything. As Jesus approaches, He asks them to put out to sea once more; at first, Peter is skeptical but then gives in to Jesus' request. In doing so, Peter shows his trust in Jesus – a faith that will serve him well in future years. Of course, there is such an abundance of fish that it didn't take Peter long to "get the point": if one trusts in Jesus, there will be an abundance of "riches" - not necessarily material ones, but ones that will serve us well as we work as disciples of the Lord.

The "abundance" miracle that is seen here is repeated many times over in scripture. In Exodus 16, we have the manna in the wilderness; in 1 Kings 17:8-16, we have the widow's never-empty oil jug; just a few weeks ago, we had the wine supplied by Jesus at the wedding at Cana (Jn 2:1-11). In all of these, we see two things at work: 1) God provides for the "human" needs of His people, and 2) they show forth the immense power of God. This particular miracle also shows a few other things. In providing, in a miraculous fashion, for the needs of the disciples, there is recognition by the disciples of Jesus' power. There is then a response by those disciples of a confession of the unworthiness of these same disciples. Finally, there is an assurance of success when we follow God's word.

May we have the courage to recognize God's call for us. May we have the openness to respond to that call for us with our whole hearts. May we be assured that when we do this, we will have an abundance of "riches" – not in the eyes of the world, but in God's eyes.

MY FRANSCIAN JOURNEY



Recently I got word that my request for Profession to the Secular Franciscan Order was voted on and accepted. What this basically means is that, pending an interview, I (along with Nancy and Kevin Smith) will be among the latest group of men and women to become Secular Franciscans. I have to say that the news was both a relief (that it's "official") and a confirmation (that I'm on the right path in following the call to the OFS).

You may wonder why I say it's a "relief". I say that in light of my vocational journey to priesthood. When I was in seminary, we have a process of getting "voted on" by the faculty members of the seminary. This is usually a "slam dunk", but there are times when challenges come in this process. Such was the case for me after my 2nd Theology Year (which was technically my third year in the seminary). After writing a selfevaluation, and an interview with the faculty, the result was a "negative" vote (11 members, with five voting for my continuing, six voting against). To say I was surprised would be an understatement. I felt called to seminary, to priesthood, and this was a big blow against that. After speaking with my faculty advisor and my spiritual director, I decided to forge on. A few months later, in another vote, the result was actually worse...4-7...somehow I LOST a vote along the way. Well, now I wasn't upset... I was angry. But I channeled that anger into prayer and good work, mostly thanks to a letter of encouragement from my mother! In the end, the final vote was...11-0. I had done it! I could move on! The rest, as they say, is history. Two more years of seminary, an Ordination, and here I stand – almost 27 years later, a priest of God.

So, as I reflect on this vote, I look to the future with the Secular Franciscans. I don't know what that journey will look like, as it hasn't been officially "started" as of yet. But I do know that this is what...who...God is asking of me and inviting me to enter into at this point in my life. I pray that God will continue to reveal Himself to me through the writings and example of St. Francis. I pray that this journey with the Secular Franciscans will benefit me, the Secular Franciscan Order, and the People of God. May God bless me, Nancy and Kevin Smith, and all who have chosen this path of the Secular Franciscan Order.

THE DEACON'S COLUMN

The Formation of the Gospels

Over the past several weeks I have focused these reflections on the Liturgy

of the Word. We now come to the heart of the Liturgy of the Word, the proclamation of the Gospel. I wonder if many Catholic Christians consider how the Gospels were developed? Jesus Christ is the Good News of our Salvation. Through Jesus Christ, God continually offers us the forgiveness of sins and the grace to live his life. This is the Good News and Jesus is its incarnation and embodiment. And this is the message that the apostles shared with others after witnessing Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension; and after receiving the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. It is these aspects of Jesus' life and mission that form the first part of the development of the Gospel.

For the first thirty years after Jesus' death and resurrection, the apostles engaged in a preaching ministry to share with as many people they could the Good News of Jesus Christ. The apostles preached the Good News and invited others to repent and believe in the Gospel. The twelve apostles did not write anything down about Jesus Christ. Yet, their memory of Jesus Christ forms the heart of the Gospel. Though all four gospels are not written by an eyewitness of Jesus' death and resurrection, they do record the apostolic memory of those mysteries. This was to preserve their memory, preaching, and teaching. As the apostles grew old and died, it was important to record their witness of the gospel for future generations. This is the second stage of the Gospel's development—the writing of the gospels to share with others the apostle's preaching and memory of Jesus Christ.

If you have ever played the game "telephone" then you know why the third stage of the gospel's development is important. The game "telephone" begins with one person telling another a short tale and then that tale is told, by word of mouth, from one person to the next, and to another, and to another . . . At the end of the game, the last person to receive the oral message reveals what they have heard to all those who have played the game. The final story rarely resembles the first. In order to preserve the authenticity of the apostle's memory the gospels have been edited to ensure that what Matthew, Mark, Luke and John wished to convey was in fact communicated. This editing stage is the third and final stage of the gospel's development.

As I conclude this reflection, remember that the Holy Spirit is the divine author of sacred scripture. We believe that the Holy Spirit is guiding the proclamation of the Gospel, its composition, and its editing. And though the gospels are already written, you and I are called by the same Spirit to proclaim to others the Good News the Father in Heaven is doing for us in his Son Jesus Christ. The words I heard when I received the Book of Gospels, I share with you and invite you to make your own, "Receive the Gospel of Christ, whose herald you have become. Believe what you read, teach what you believe, and practice what you teach."
