Cardinal Announces 2020 Catholic Appeal

Annual Fund Supports Mission Critical Programs, Parishes, Schools & Ministries

Braintree, MA -- The 2020 Catholic Appeal will be announced in parishes of the Archdiocese of Boston the weekend of March 7/8, 2020. **Commitment weekend takes place the following weekend of March 14/15, 2020.** The Catholic Appeal is the annual fund that supports more than 51 central ministries that enrich parish life, Catholic schools and the lives of those who turn to the Church for assistance.

O'Malley said, "In this Lenten season of reflection and prayer, we look forward with great hope and anticipation to furthering Christ's mission to serve the least among us while passing on our faith to future generations. We are blessed with many thriving ministries in the Archdiocese of Boston that allow us to continue this important work and live our faith together."

My Dear Friends in Christ,



Have you ever been so caught up in your daily routine that you fail to see Jesus in it? Of course you have – we all have. I think this to be less of a condition of faith than a case of humility. What do I mean by that? Well, I believe that sometimes we forget the humanity of Jesus to such a point that we don't think that He ever would "lower" Himself to be with us. We want Jesus to be divine – and He is! We also want Him to understand those things we are going through in our daily lives – and He does.

Today's gospel is a perfect "case in point" of that phenomenon. When Jesus approach Jacob's well, He is thirsty; it is noon (it is most likely hot), and Jesus is tired from His journey. Who wouldn't be? What happens next is something which distinguishes this event from any ordinary encounter one might have at such a place. First off, there is the idea of a Jew asking for something from a Samaritan. Next, there is the cultural barrier of a man approaching a woman not his wife for any reason. Finally, there is the level of conversation in which Jesus engages the Samaritan woman. Any of these three things would make this event "stand out", but for all three to happen in the same encounter is truly amazing! Then again, Jesus is anything but conventional in His thinking, acting or living.

Jesus' desire for water is just the "jumping off point" for a further exploration into the Samaritan woman's life, the worship practices of Jews and Gentiles and the mission of Jesus. When Jesus reveals details about this woman, it is clear that He "knows" her (by "knowing", I speak here of her soul (note the conversation about her husbands)), even though they have never met. In speaking of "living water" (Jn. 4:10), Jesus is speaking about Himself being the "spring of water welling up to eternal life" (Jn. 4:14). In speaking of worshipping "neither on this mountain (Mt. Gerizim) nor in Jerusalem (where Jesus will complete His earthly mission)" (Jn. 4:21), Jesus expands the vision of His mission to include all places, all times, all peoples.

This is where we "come into the picture." Jesus sees into our souls (just as He did with the Samaritan woman), helping us to confront evil and sin which may be blocking us from fully experiencing God's goodness. Jesus gives us that "living water" (Jn. 4:10) when we approach Him in humility, He "quenches our thirst" for mercy and love (in our lives and in the world). When Jesus expands His mission, we are brought "into the fold", and Jesus becomes an integral part of our journey of faith.

Let us have the courage to invite Jesus into our lives, letting His "living water" (ibid.) satisfy our thirst for righteousness. Let us allow Jesus to heal us of that which is preventing us from loving fully God and neighbor. Let us use this Lenten journey as a time for deepening our relationship with the One who comes to bring life in abundance.

Amid growing apprehension of the COVID-19 (2019 Novel Coronavirus) outbreak, the Archdiocese of Boston has issued messages to parishes and schools, offering reassurance that the situation is being monitored and advice for how to prevent and prepare for the virus' potential spread.

Liturgical directives to prevent the spread of the virus are effective Feb. 29 and will remain in place "until determined otherwise" by Cardinal Seán P. O'Malley. These precautions are similar to those implemented during flu outbreaks.



BRAINTREE -- The Pastoral Center's Bethany Chapel was full to capacity as Cardinal Seán P. O'Malley led the celebration of Ash Wednesday Mass on Feb. 26.

Cardinal O'Malley delivered his homily before the distribution of ashes. Looking at the reading from Matthew's Gospel, in which Jesus talks about prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, the cardinal spoke about the importance of motives that prompt religious acts.

"The Pharisees were great at public prayer, fasting and almsgiving. But it was more a case of spiritual one-upmanship than an act of penance. Jesus is urging us to look at our motives and to avoid temptation to do religious acts in order to increase our prestige," Cardinal O'Malley said.

He said that the human tendency to keep up appearances can undercut the true purpose of religious acts, which is to grow closer to God.

"Acts of piety have to be done with the proper inner attitude or they don't adhere to their purpose, and our only real reward will be the passing notice of people rather than growing closer to our God," he said.

He spoke about how Lent can be "reduced" to a time of setting health-related goals, such as improved diet or increased exercise.

"These acts of discipline can be spiritually beneficial if they help us to overcome our self-indulgence and unhealthy behavior. But the success of our Lent cannot be measured by the number of pounds we lose or how many steps we take each day," Cardinal O'Malley said.

He suggested that fasting be coupled with almsgiving, using the resources that would go toward one's own comfort to instead help the poor. He also said that Lent is a good time to examine one's prayer life and seek reconciliation in relationships.

In closing, Cardinal O'Malley explained the symbolism of the ashes, which "betoken the fragility of life," and the sign of the cross, which indicates that "the dust has been redeemed by the loving sacrifice of Jesus Christ."

"Ash Wednesday is not meant to be a morbid reflection on death, but a serious reminder that life is always short and we must be good stewards of the time, talent and treasure that we have received," he said.
