What is first communion in the Catholic Church?

First Communion is a ceremony in some Christian traditions during which a person **first** receives the Eucharist. It is most common in the Latin **Church** tradition of the **Catholic Church**, as well as in many parts of the Lutheran **Church** and Anglican **Communion**.




What does it mean to have your first communion?

For Catholics, **Holy Communion** is the third of seven sacraments received. It occurs only after receiving Baptism, and once the person has reached the age of reason (usually, around the second grade). **First** confession (the **first** sacrament of penance) must precede the reception of the Eucharist.

First Communion is the first of many times in a person’s life when they will have the opportunity to receive the Eucharist — the body and blood of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

My Dear Friends in Christ,



As we move through our Easter Season, we have yet another post-Resurrection encounter between Jesus and the disciples. The gospels are full of these moments when Jesus reveals Himself to His “inner circle”. These are the ones who will carry on His message. These are the ones who will continue the work which Jesus established in His time on earth. They come to know Jesus in a new way in these post-Resurrection encounters, for Jesus reveals Himself slowly (partly through the disciples’ lack of recognition).

In this gospel passage, Jesus comes to them as a half-dozen are out fishing. It is a seemingly innocuous event, something which the disciples would be doing anyway. What makes it unique is the presence of the risen Christ. It is Christ who calls them to trust in Him once again, by casting their nets even after working all night and catching nothing. It is then that the disciples (first John, the beloved disciple, then Peter) recognize Jesus. This revelation continues on the seashore, as Jesus feeds them (once again) with bread and fish (perhaps an allusion to the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes?). The revelation is made complete with the conversation between Jesus and Simon Peter.

Perhaps this encounter (between Peter and Jesus) is the most telling. One can only guess what is going through Peter’s mind, but it must have been an uneasy moment for him. When Jesus asks Peter three times “do you love me?”, the unease (bordering on upset) continues for Peter. What Peter perhaps doesn’t realize is that by asking this three-fold question, Jesus is forgiving Peter for his three-fold denial of Jesus (taking place sometime between the Last Supper and Jesus’ Crucifixion). Each time Jesus asks Peter to profess his love for Him, He is preparing him to take hold of the ministry which Jesus has established. It is only when Peter has this sin (of denying Jesus) “washed away” that he can continue the ministry which Jesus has set forth.

Where is it that we need forgiveness? Where do we need to hear from Jesus “do you love me”? We tend to think of forgiveness and reconciliation as “Lenten practices”. Forgiveness, however, isn’t limited to a “season” – or even a time or place. Forgiveness happens when we go to God, pour our heart out, and are freed from those things which are not of God. May we have the courage to approach the Lord, confident of His forgiving love. May we experience the healing which Peter (and the other disciples) encounters in this moment. May we know the healing, forgiving love of God, and share that gift with all whom we meet!

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

May 5, 2019
3rd Sunday of Easter

I am struck by how Jesus addresses the disciples in the 21st chapter of John. They have been fishing all night, and when the dawn comes, Jesus asks, "Children, have you caught anything to eat?" They hadn't caught a thing, so he tells them what to do to finally fill their nets. These children thought they knew best, but they couldn't get the job done until they listened to Jesus. Like a child who needs a parent, these early followers of Jesus were learning that real maturity of faith requires trusting in and listening to the Teacher.

The stewardship way of life demands of us a certain maturity of discipleship. Just as a child is not yet ready to be a parent, an immature disciple may not yet be ready to sacrifice regardless of the cost or understand the true value of his generosity. So every day, we are challenged and called to respond, sometimes even with little cost to ourselves. But each step, no matter how small, brings with it growth. We are growing not only in maturity, but in the ability to trust in God and how to listen for the call as well.

How mature are you in your faith? How much trust do you have in Jesus Christ? How often do you pause to listen to the instructions of your Teacher? The night is now over, and the dawn is upon you. Reflect on the visible fruit of your stewardship, and then listen for the words of Jesus.

OLDER AMERICANS BENEFIT FROM "MY SOCIAL SECURITY"

Each May, groups and organizations around the nation join in celebrating Older Americans Month. Established in 1963, Older Americans Month provides an opportunity for our nation to recognize seniors for their many contributions and share important information to help them stay healthy and active.

This year's theme is "Safe Today. Healthy Tomorrow." Social Security has something to help keep you safe and healthy: a suite of online services. Rather than driving or taking public transportation to a local office, you can use our secure, free online services to handle much of your Social Security business. With the amount of time you save, you'll have more time to spend with the grandkids or have time for a brisk walk around the neighborhood or local park.

Before going for that walk, though, visit www.SocialSecurity.gov. Whether you already receive benefits or you're just starting to think about retirement, it's a great time to open a "my Social Security" account.

What's "my Social Security"? It's a secure online account that allows you immediate access to your personal Social Security information. During your working years, you can use "my Social Security" to view your Social Security Statement to check your earnings record and see estimates of the future retirement, disability and survivor benefits you and your family may receive. Check it out at www.SocialSecurity.gov/myaccount.

After you check your online Social Security Statement, be sure to visit our Retirement Estimator. Like a "my Social Security" account, you can use it as many times as you'd like. The Estimator lets you change variables, such as retirement date options and future earnings. You may discover that you'd rather wait another year or two before you retire to earn a higher benefit. To get instant, personalized estimates of your future benefits just go to www.SocialSecurity.gov/estimator.

Deciding when to retire is a personal choice and depends on a number of factors. To help, we suggest you read our online fact sheet, "When To Start Receiving Retirement Benefits," available at www.SocialSecurity.gov/pubs.

"Simon Peter said to them, 'I am going fishing.'" Peter is a favorite apostle for many people. I wonder if it is because of his flawed, relatable humanity. Today's Gospel takes place after Jesus appears to the disciples and breathes the Holy Spirit upon them. And yet, Peter finds himself returning to his old way of life, to comfortable habits he formed long before following Jesus. Is something still lingering in him? Is something still lingering in us? Lent is over, and we should be rejoicing! But do you feel like you're still holding onto something? Or perhaps you had an excellent Lent. You encountered Jesus in a new way and grew in faith. But as the weeks since Easter have slipped by, some of your new-found devotion has begun to waver. The closeness you felt in your Lenten commitments has given way to humdrum status quo or turn-of-the-season busyness.

"Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter has endured so much in his walk of discipleship! But something is still weighing on him. In today's Gospel, Jesus confirms Peter's devotion three times, a redemption of his earlier threefold denial. The call of the Lord must come again, as if heard anew for the first time. So often, this is the pattern of the Christian life. We discover God and experience a new desire for our faith, but in time, our enthusiasm begins to wane. Perhaps something happens that startles us, or we startle ourselves by a poor decision. Then we discover God anew! Our joy returns...for a while. Even the Apostles were no strangers to the cyclical nature of spiritual growth. Our disappointments or frustrations should not be cause for giving up. Like Peter, we too can recommit and start anew. This Sunday and every day of our lives, Jesus is waiting to say again, "Follow me."




