



NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

My Dear Friends in Christ,

I think that many of us wonder what heaven will be like. Some have a "traditional" view, one with which we've grown up –



complete with angels strumming on harps while perched on puffy clouds. Some have come to believe heaven as not so much a "place" as it is a "state of being"/"way of living". No matter what our view, those who have a view of heaven see it as a completely different thing as compared to the reality of our life on earth.

John, the ascribed writer of the Book of Revelation, would share that view. In seeing it as something new, John recognizes not only the end of our earthly days as bringing about a radically different way of living, but also as the fulfillment of everything which God has promised His people. This "new order" of things is a reimagining of how we are to live our lives in relationship with God. God will take away all of the "stumbling blocks" that keep us from seeing God and living life to the fullest with God – tears, mourning, pain. God will replace these challenges with a fulfillment of this "new order".

There is a challenge to this way of thinking, however, namely what we do between now and then? How do we live our lives knowing that while here on earth there will be these difficulties, these challenges? It's not like we can avoid pain, tears or death. They are part of our "makeup", of who we are as human beings. We must, therefore, strive for a vision like John's. We must see beyond the limitations of this world and keep our eyes on the Kingdom. Again, this can be challenging but it is how we must live our lives. If we contain our "vision", our thinking and living to this world then we will be caught unexpectedly when the time comes for us to enter into the Kingdom, either at the end earthly days or at the end of time.

God is with us now, leading us in His way of living. God will be with us at the end of the age to call us home to Himself. God will usher us (we pray) into the Kingdom, where we will spend all eternity in everlasting peace, joy and life. May we use our time here on earth wisely, spending time growing in relationship with God. May we prepare ourselves here and now to be ready for that day when we are called home. May we enter into the Kingdom when God calls us home to spend everlasting life with Him.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

As I write this column, I reflect on my profession of three years ago to the Secular Franciscan Order.

While Profession signifies a formal step in the process of becoming a Secular Franciscan, it is (much like my Ordination) just the first step of a lifelong journey of discovery of who St. Francis is for me and my fellow Franciscans. There are "ongoing formation", monthly meetings at which we discover who Francis is for us, as well as who we are in light of our relationship with God and the Secular Franciscan Order. While we can, after Profession, lay claim to the title "Secular Franciscan", I feel as if this is formalizing something which God has been doing with, for, and in me my whole life. My calling to the Secular Franciscan Order is not unlike my calling to Priesthood. It is something which God has been doing long before I ever started this journey.

I've always believed that God has a plan for each one of us. Sometimes those plans take many twists and turns, and are far more circuitous than we can ever imagine (or perhaps ever (think we) want). Again, reflecting on this journey in light of my priest-hood, I believe that God chose me to be a priest long before I even knew what priesthood entailed. In that same way, I believe that God chose me to be a Secular Franciscan long before I ever heard of St. Francis, or knew where Assisi was on a map (of Italy). In light of God's calling me to this life as a Secular Franciscan, I would invite all of you to pray over your own vocation, even if you feel that your life is already "mapped out".

I heard recently that a calling to the Secular Franciscan Order as a diocesan priest is a "vocation within a vocation". Perhaps, in whatever vocation you are living, if you feel like you have found your life's calling God is still calling you to a "vocation within a vocation", and is calling you to pursue something further, something additional, something deeper, along with the vocation you are currently living. I'm not suggesting that everyone is called to the Secular Franciscan Order (although some of you very well might be!), but I am suggesting that (perhaps) God IS calling you to deepen your relationship with Him by looking into some sort of way of life such as the Secular Franciscans. A "third order", a ministry in the Church, or a renewal of the life you are already living might be just what God is calling for within you. You might just be surprised as to what you find!

Resembling Jesus

I once wrote an article about several women residents of a local nursing home. In researching the piece, I discovered that they had grown up in the same neighborhood as my grandmother, and that one of the women was, in fact, my grandmother's dearest childhood friend.

When I visited this woman to take her photograph, she took a long look at my face, and I could see in her eyes that she was reaching back in her memory across the years.

She said: "You resemble her."

I wept on the way home.

My grandmother died when I was nine, and for the last several years of her life she suffered from Alzheimer's disease. I have always deeply grieved the time we lost, the relationship we could have had. I have hazy fragments of memory from before her illness that lead me to believe we loved each other very much.

Being told I look like my grandmother by someone who knew her well — being identified as belonging to her in some way — was one of the more beautiful things to happen to me.

When we love someone, we want to be associated with them. We want to be recognized as theirs somehow. And if we love Christ, we should want to be known as belonging to him. We should want those who see us to know we are his.

The only way we can resemble Jesus is through love. It is his most recognizable quality, his most famous trait. This is how all will know that you are my disciples.

As Catholics, we are always talking about finding ways to live our faith boldly, unapologetically, publicly. Good — we should! But if we want people to know we are Catholic, we should love them. Bravely. Recklessly. Sacrificially.

Good and Evil

If God is good, why is there evil in the world?

The problem of evil is perplexing. If God is all-powerful and all-good, why doesn't He stop bad things from happening? He must either not be all-powerful, or perhaps He's not very good after all. Human beings have faced the possibility of evil since the very beginning of our existence. In granting us free will, God gives us the ability to make free choices. God does not force us into moral perfection. We are not forced to love Him or to love our neighbor. We must make the decision ourselves. This means, of course, that we have the ability to choose against love.

One small decision of selfishness, jealously, or pride may not seem so bad. But every decision — good or bad — is like a stone dropped into a still pond. The ripples extend much farther than the original stone. When decisions against love begin to compound, they affect families, neighborhoods, and nations. This is all the more reason for Christians to be faithful to our baptismal call to love one another as Christ has loved us!









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
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
