



MASSES FOR THE WEEK

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Growing up as the youngest of five children, I know very well the joys and challenges of having brothers and sisters. Often times we were at odds with one another but, more often than not, we "had each others' backs". We would fight with the same ferocity FOR one another as we did AGAINST one another. When it came right down to it, we were rarely a "house divided".

Jesus, in today's gospel, speaks of that unity; it is a unity that comes from our being brothers and sisters. Jesus is told that "your mothers and your brothers and your sisters are outside asking for you" (Mk 3:32). This might cause us pause, because we grew up being told that Jesus was the only son of Joseph and Mary. One has to keep in mind that the concept of family was more "broad-based" than what we think of as family, and that His "brothers and sisters" were more likely His cousins and other relatives, along with His apostles and disciples. In that sense, we are included in that number, by virtue of our baptism.

This is why that when Jesus says, "whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother" (Mk 3:35) He is including us. And what does it mean to do the will of God? Well, for each one of us it is different because we are all called to use our gifts, talents, and abilities for the assistance of our brothers and sisters (in Christ) who come to us in their need, and to build up the Kingdom of God. This requires a sense of unity that comes from God, as well, and is both around and within us. It is around us, as we are a Universal Church and a Body of Christ. It is within us, as we are members of that Body, and each one of us has a part to play.

In the work of Collaboration, we are called to that same sense of unity, and we are all called to do the will of God in this work. This unity, coming simultaneously with the building up of each parish and its unique identity, has been challenging because of the strong sense of self evident in each parish. We achieve unity, however, when we see ourselves as members of the same Body of Christ, with the same mission – to win souls for Christ. We do this best when we look beyond ourselves and we see each person whom we encounter (no matter where their "roots" are) as a brother/sister in Christ, and one who works "Together In Christ" with all.

May we pray for knowledge of God's will for us, and have the courage to do that will. May we see each member of the Body of Christ as a valued and valuable member of that Body. May we look across the aisle and across the border (of each town) and see one another as a brother/sister in Christ. May we all seek the will of God and seek to fulfill it by using our gifts, talents, and abilities for the building up of the Body of Christ and do this work "Together In Christ".



MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

In today's gospel Jesus speaks of His "mother and... brothers and...sisters" (Mark 3:32). This often engenders questions/statements about Jesus' lineage and family tree, such as "I didn't think Jesus had siblings" and "Who are these brothers and sisters of Jesus who are spoken of in the gospel?" While it is largely held that Jesus had no siblings, we have to look at Jesus own answer to that to get to the bottom of things. Jesus response that "whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother" (Mark 3:35). In essence, Jesus is speaking metaphorically and speaking in spiritual (rather than biological) terms.

When we look at the life of St. Francis of Assisi, we see that he had no siblings. Yet, after his conversion and when he started his Order, he "inherited" brothers for life. These were not his biological kin, but they were no less brethren to him as would be a "blood brother". As St. Francis forms the Order, he looks to it being a family, rooted in faith and love. People like Brother Anthony, Brother Bernardo, and Sister Clare (later St. Clare) of Assisi. One could make a strong case that in founding the Franciscan Order and the Poor Clares, St. Francis was forming a family.

When I was younger, (the late) Cardinal Medeiros used to refer to the faithful as "my dear brothers and sisters in Christ". This is a recognition both of our connection to one another and our connection to Christ. St. Francis sought this when he founded the Franciscans. We seek that today. May we do the work of the Father and, thus, see ourselves as brothers and sisters in Christ.

In the Family Way

Look here: there is no one more family-oriented than me. I drive a minivan. I wear mom jeans. I wipe unidentified gunk off of kids' faces without a second thought.

'm all about family, but I'm not always a fan of what "family" has come to mean in the modern lexicon. Family values. Family-friendly. Family-oriented. It's usually a synonym for "non-offensive." Soft. Moderate. Nice.

It's all fine, I suppose. But is it genuine? Creating a family, bringing that family physically into the world, was the hardest and most painful thing I ever did. The care and keeping of that family — the teamwork with my spouse, the feeding and watering of the children, the teaching of the writing and the reading the and praying — it's very hard-core. It's not all stuffed animals and peekaboo. It's a mental, spiritual, and physical challenge that daily brings me to my knees.

I'm not even talking exclusively about parenting young children. I'm talking about being part of a family in any way — being a son, being a daughter, being a sister and cousin and uncle. Families are complicated and strange and messy. Sometimes boundaries need to be drawn, or they need to be crossed. Sometimes walls need to be put up or torn down. It's never easy. It's never simple.

But I've never known someone who didn't want to be part of a family in some way, whether that's a blood family or one created by circumstance. And there's a reason Christ creates a family ("Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother") and not a club.

A family is a crucible, yes — but what comes out is so much more beautiful than what went in. For all the effort and even pain that is sometimes involved in a family relationship, there is nothing more defining, more fulfilling.

We are part of Christ's family, and what we can expect from that is certainly not a life of simple, clear-cut, undemanding discipleship. We can expect confusion. We can expect discomfort. But we can expect to be perpetually drawn to the heart of one who loves us without hesitation, without condition.

In the end, we're family.

The lack of water is an often insurmountable obstacle to helping oneself. You can't grow food, you can't build housing, you can't stay healthy, you can't stay in school and you can't keep working. With unclean water sources often miles from villages, many of the able-bodied members of a community are forced to spend hours each day simply finding and transporting water. The typical container used for water collection in Africa, the jerry can, weighs over 40 pounds when it's completely full. When a water solution is put into place, sustainable agriculture is possible. Children get back to school instead of collecting dirty water all day, or being sick from waterborne illnesses. Parents find more time to care for their families, expand minimal farming to sustainable levels, and even run small businesses. thewaterproject.org
