




#### **MASSES FOR THE WEEK**



My Dear Friends in Christ,

Growing up, my family never began a meal without "saying grace". When the food was ready and on the table, and everyone was seated, we would offer a prayer of thanksgiving to God "for the bounty we are about to receive" (using the "old school" grace!). It is a small gesture, but one which can bear great fruit. Evidence came of this when I was out to dinner recently and engaged in this practice. A fellow diner at a nearby table commented that it "did his heart good" to see that some people aren't afraid to express their faith publicly. As I say, it's a small gesture, but sometimes the smallest acts can bear the greatest benefits.

Isn't that the way it is with God? Jesus uses two parables today, the "parable of the sower" and the "parable of the mustard seed". While the latter image is the one we tend to remember, we shouldn't lose sight of the first story. In the parable of the sower, the one who scatters the seed doesn't see immediate results. This can cause frustration, confusion and anger. One can lose heart, and think that God isn't working in our lives. Patience is the key; if we persevere, we will see results. In the story of the mustard seed, the adage that "good things come in small packages" might come to mind. It is often from small, humble beginnings that great growth can occur. One only need look at the Savior to see that thought come to bear; it was from the small town of Nazareth (a town so small, it probably didn't warrant a mention on the map) that the great King comes forth into the world. One cannot underestimate potential growth, no matter how humble the beginning.

In "cultivating" our faith, we must exhibit both patience and perseverance. If we allow God to work in our lives and if we "stay the course", then amazing things can happen and God's glory can come shining forth into the world. If we look to God to place in our hearts a spirit of patient endurance, then we can hold out until the end and receive the reward of the just, the Kingdom of God. May we pray for these gifts so that God may work in our lives. May we come to know that God is at work in our lives so that our lives may "bear great fruit".

We have a special guest arriving in July who needs a room to rent for two weeks.


Fr. Peter Francis's niece who is a Neurologist is coming to the states to Work in Cincinnati.

#### MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY



A few weeks ago, I (along with Nancy and Kevin Smith) celebrated my 2<sup>nd</sup> Anniversary of Profession to the Secular Franciscan Order. Anniversaries are often times of reflection as to how the journey has come along, and this anniversary is no different.

In many ways, my life hasn't changed due to my Profession, and in many ways it has changed greatly. What hasn't changed is my commitment to the Church and how my dedication to it remains strong. What hasn't changed is my relationship with God and how my dedication to God remains strong, as well. What HAS changed is how I have lived out those commitments since becoming a Secular Franciscan. Before my Profession, any conversation I had about Church and my involvement in the same revolved around my priesthood and my work in the parish and in the Archdiocese. Since my profession, my work has been colored and motivated by the question "How would St. Francis approach this?" This Franciscan "lens" through which I now look at the Church, my priesthood, and the world has permanently altered my thoughts, words, prayers, and actions.

What has also changed is how others approach me. Before, when walking around (either at work or in the world) most would notice the Roman collar which I wear (as a sign of my priesthood) and ask me where I was stationed and how long I've been a priest. Now, along with the collar, they notice the "Tau Cross" (the Franciscan cross which I wear most/all times) and ask me about it. The statements/questions range from "What type of cross is that?" to "Are you a Franciscan priest?" to "Does that cross mean anything (special)?". This cross, which is the "habit" of the Secular Franciscan (as opposed to the brown "habits" (or robes) most Franciscans wear), is a constant reminder to me and the world that my life is different than it was two years ago (when I made my profession).

I can certainly say, without a doubt, that my life as a Secular Franciscan has most definitely changed for the better. My relationship with God has taken on a whole new dimension that has made my life richer and more centered on "relationship" rather than just "rules". St. Francis' influence on my priesthood and my life has caused both to be richer, fuller, and deeper in spiritual ways. I pray that St. Francis continues to draw me closer to Christ and that through his intercession I grow deeper in my relationship to Him and His gospel message of love.

#### In the Family Way

Look here: there is no one more family-oriented than me. I drive a minivan. I wear mom jeans. I wipe unidentified gunk off of kids' faces without a second thought. I'm all about family, but I'm not always a fan of what "family" has come to mean in the modern lexicon. Family values. Family-friendly. Family-oriented. It's usually a synonym for "non-offensive." Soft. Moderate. Nice.

It's all fine, I suppose. But is it genuine? Creating a family, bringing that family physically into the world, was the hardest and most painful thing I ever did. The care and keeping of that family — the teamwork with my spouse, the feeding and watering of the children, the teaching of the writing and the reading the and praying — it's very hardcore. It's not all stuffed animals and peekaboo. It's a mental, spiritual, and physical challenge that daily brings me to my knees.

I'm not even talking exclusively about parenting young children. I'm talking about being part of a family in any way — being a son, being a daughter, being a sister and cousin and uncle. Families are complicated and strange and messy. Sometimes boundaries need to be drawn, or they need to be crossed. Sometimes walls need to be put up or torn down. It's never easy. It's never simple.

But I've never known someone who didn't want to be part of a family in some way, whether that's a blood family or one created by circumstance. And there's a reason Christ creates a family ("Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother") and not a club.

A family is a crucible, yes — but what comes out is so much more beautiful than what went in. For all the effort and even pain that is sometimes involved in a family relationship, there is nothing more defining, more fulfilling.

We are part of Christ's family, and what we can expect from that is certainly not a life of simple, clear-cut, undemanding discipleship. We can expect confusion. We can expect discomfort. But we can expect to be perpetually drawn to the heart of one who loves us without hesitation, without condition.

In the end, we're family.

This picture depicts the end goal of the water project that Fr. John is here to accomplish. His parishioners have to walk to swamps and water holes to fill very large containers with water which then has to be carried back to the parish to be sanitized before the people can drink the water. He wants to build a water system that would carry the water to a sanitizing station in the parish where the people could pump the water conveniently. This would save the parishioners many hours that they could use more productively working or studying.
