





# **MASSES FOR THE WEEK**



My Dear Friends in Christ,

When I was a newly ordained priest, I spent a lot of time with family and friends at events at which I would be asked to offer a blessing/prayer. One such occasion was the first family holiday spent together after ordination, Thanksgiving Dinner at my parents' home. After giving what I thought was a genuine, heart-felt blessing, my brother asked me where I had come upon said blessing (assuming, of course, that I had read it somewhere and taken it from that source). When I informed him that I had come up with it myself, he responded (as only an older brother can) with the further inquiry of "YOU?!" incredulous at my ability to pray in such a "freestyle" manner! So I can tell you with some authority that I know how Jesus felt!

When Jesus arrives to His "hometown crowd", you might think that the people would hang on every word and "eat up" everything He had to say. While they certainly showed amazement, it was more along the lines of incredulity rather than happiness. They felt that they knew Him – they knew His origins, His background, His family history. What they failed to see was Jesus as Messiah; they couldn't get beyond seeing Him as "the carpenter, the son of Mary" (Mk 6:3). This, while not a "fatal flaw", was something that kept Jesus from fulfilling His mission among His own people.

How often in our own lives to people feel that they "know" us? How often do family and friends have us "pegged", thinking that we are "this way" or "that way", that they know us? How often has that kept us from achieving goals, reaching for the next "rung" on the "ladder of success" or doing what we are called (by God) to do? If it happened to Jesus, it can happen to us. Like Jesus, we must move beyond what people think of us; like Jesus, we must believe that God has a plan for us, a mission that we must accomplish.

May we never let others dictate what it is, who it is, that we are call do or be. May we know and believe that God has a plan for us. May we always look to God to fulfill that plan, never letting the naysayers inhibit who we are meant to be. May this summer be a time of reflection, rest and renewal for us, so that when we need to do this work God is calling us to do, we may do it with a renewed energy. May we be confident that God is calling on us to do great things, to fulfill our baptismal call...whatever it may be.

#### MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY



In today's gospel, Jesus is challenged by those around Him, who (in this case) happen to be friends, neighbors, and family. It is somewhat comforting to know that Jesus, Himself, often found Himself "pigeon-holed" by those around Him. How often in our lives to we encounter

situations in which those around us "have us all figured out"; they know how we act, think, and feel, so they know how we are *going* to act, think and feel...or so they think!

St. Francis, no doubt, ran into this same situation. In his early years, his life was pretty much all "mapped out". Francis was going to follow his father in the "family business" of textile buying and selling. As part of the "merchant class", which was somewhat "upper-middle class" given the need for textiles in this (or any) age, Pietro de Bernadone was in this business so it was safe to assume that Francis would follow in this life. Francis had other ideas, however, and wished to become a soldier. This was a noble, albeit "lower-class", occupation, not to mention a dangerous one! With wars and insurrections cropping up almost daily, Francis set himself up for a career that could very well cost him his life – something his father (and mother) would not wish on any child. Being a merchant was not only profitable, but it was safe and free from risk. After his conversion, Francis would of course choose an entirely different life from textile merchant or soldier – that of religious life.

Religious life has, throughout the centuries, remained relatively unchanged. While it has its dangers, it has never been seen as dangerous as soldiering. It is not, however, without its risks. Religious life could (and can) be a challenging life, given the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. This is where diocesan priesthood and religious life can differ, as we (diocesan priests) do not take a vow of poverty. While it is understood that we are "not in it for the money", our needs are met and we do draw a salary (which is ours to keep, free and clear).

Even with the differences, however, the two lives (of diocesan priesthood and religious life) can leave us "pigeon-holed", as it did Jesus and Francis. In Jesus' case, His origins are known (which was thought not to be the case with the Messiah); in Francis' case, his path was set (by his father) and straying from that was not an easy thing. In my own vocational discernment, I have received both support and questioning ("are you *sure* this is what you want to do (for the REST OF YOUR LIFE)?"). In my life as a priest, I have been questioned as both what I do and why I do it. While I assure people that this is what God is calling me to do (as did St. Francis), even my closest friends and family sometimes called into question my life's choice.

May we all be like Jesus and St. Francis, and not allow anyone to "pigeon-hole" us into a life which others want us to lead. May we "tune out" those discordant voices which might pull us away from the path which God has for us. May we have the courage to not listen to "nattering nabobs of negativism" (as written by William Safire on behalf of Spiro Agnew), and follow the path which God intends for us!

Migration can increase the risk of human trafficking, including sex trafficking, in a number of ways:

**Border crossings:** Victims of sex trafficking are more likely to cross borders using routes that don't have official border control points, such as irregular routes across the sea or cross-country.

**Smuggling:** Smugglers may charge migrants money to drive them across borders, bypassing official entry requirements and border controls. If migrants don't have enough money, the smugglers may take their valuable possessions as payment.

**Forced migration:** Climate change is expected to force 216 million people to migrate within their own countries by 2050, making them more vulnerable to human trafficking and modern slavery.

**Other factors:** In the United States, the crisis at the southern border is directly linked to an increase in child trafficking. Other factors that aggravate child trafficking in the U.S. include predatory social media use, pornography, and broken families.

Please use the following prayer to ask God for his help in eradicating this problem from the world.

Loving Father,

We seek your divine protection for all who are exploited and enslaved.

For those forced into labor, trafficked into sexual slavery, and denied freedom.

We beseech you to release them from their chains.

Grant them protection, safety, and empowerment.

Restore their dignity and provide them a new beginning.

Show us how we might end exploitation by addressing its causes.

Help us reach out in support of victims and survivors of human trafficking.

Make us instruments of your spirit for their liberation.

For this we pray through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen


