

MASSES FOR THE WEEK

Shepherd Prophet

My Dear Friends in Christ,

When I was younger, I used to go to weeklong camp during the summer. It was your traditional camp experience, with swimming and boating, arts and crafts, campfires, and the like. One of the more unusual activities in which we were engaged was a "trust walk", when we would be blindfolded and led on a path by a guide (who was NOT blindfolded (can't have the "blind leading the blind"!) who you trusted would bring you safely through the experience.

Trust is a key element of faith, something which Jesus exhibits in our gospel reading. As He sends the disciples forth into the world of ministry, Jesus calls them to trust that God would provide for all their needs. They are to bring nothing "extra", "nothing for the journey but a walking stick— no food, no sack, no money in their belts" (Mark 6:8); they are to trust in the goodness of people along the way. This is a great act of faith – faith in the goodness of people, faith in the goodness of God. Our first reading also features the gift of faith in the person of Amos, the prophet. By his accounting, he is no prophet; he is a shepherd and a horticulturist (a dresser of sycamores). By being asked to take on a prophetic role in God's plan, Amos is asked to trust God in the plan He has for Amos and the people.

We are called on this day to ask ourselves if we are like the disciples of Jesus, who trust in God's plan and His ability to care for them "on the road", or like Amos, who (as a dresser of sycamores) wonders what God might be thinking in calling him to this prophetic role. We come to see that it is perfectly acceptable to have questions about God's plan for us and to wonder where we are being led, Ultimately, however, we are called to trust that God has our back, our best interest at heart. May we come to believe that God will not let us stumble, not let us fall, and that when we do (by virtue of our distrust) He will pick us up, dust us off, and redirect us on the right path, the path that leads to salvation and eternal life.

Tickets will be sold the weekends of July 20/21 and July 27/28 and at the door.


We have a special guest arriving in July who needs a room to rent for two weeks.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

As most folks know, members of the Franciscan Order (like most religious orders) take a vow of poverty. This sacred promise is both constraining and freeing. It is a challenge because the maker of this promise must rely on the goodness of the Order, the goodness of the people who contribute to the well-being of those in the Order, and (ultimately) the goodness of God. In this regard, they aren't much different from the disciples of Jesus as we read in this week's gospel. As they are sent forth to expand the scope of Jesus' mission, they are called to rely on the people to whom they minister for their needs. They are not to bring "extras", but only those things that will help them survive and continue the mission of Jesus.

St. Francis, in his writings regarding the Franciscan Order, instructed his followers to be like the early disciples. They were to not only live this view of poverty, but to embrace it as they would one they love. St. Francis would go so far as to refer to this love as "Lady Poverty". In anthropomorphizing this trait, St. Francis looks upon poverty as something to not only be striven for, but embraced and encouraged. Indeed, poverty was so important to Francis that in his last writing, the *Testament*, composed shortly before his death in 1226, he declared unambiguously that absolute personal and corporate poverty was the essential lifestyle for the members of his order.

Most in our society not only eschew this vision but run completely from it. Poverty is something to be avoided at all costs (pun intended) and is seen as a negative viewpoint. Any positive aspect of poverty is overshadowed by the negative connotation that it is best left to those who have nothing, need nothing, or want nothing. Poverty, by its nature, is seen not as a virtue but a vice, one which leads to anxiety, depression, and sadness. St. Francis, however, saw poverty as a vehicle which can lead one to a deeper relationship to Christ. It was Christ who came not be served but to serve, and as such lived a life of poverty of sorts, relying on the goodness of others. This vision was carried forth by His disciples, as they were to rely on others for their needs.

May we come to embrace "Lady Poverty" as St. Francis did, coming to see this way of living as something freeing, not constraining, which leads one to a deeper relationship to Christ.

Help us worship, serve, and honor you with all our hearts".

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
