**“Why Should I Go To Mass Every Day?”
“The Mass is the most perfect form of prayer!”
(Pope Paul VI)**

For each Mass we hear with devotion, Our Lord sends a saint to comfort us at death.(revelation of Christ to St. Gertrude the Great)

St Padre Pio, the stigmatic priest, said “Every holy Mass heard with devotion, produces in our souls marvelous effects, abundant spiritual and material graces which we, ourselves, do not know. It is easier for the earth to exist without the sun than without the holy Sacrifice of the Mass.”

St. John Vianney said that if we knew the value of the Mass, we would die of joy.

Your prayers are strongest at the Consecration in Holy Mass (raising of Host and Chalice).

Each time we look at the Most Blessed Sacrament our place in heaven is raised forever (revealed by Our Lord to St. Gertrude the Great.)

“The Holy Mass would be of greater profit if people had it offered in their lifetime, rather than having it celebrated for the relief of their souls after death.” (Pope Benedict XV)

Once St. Teresa of Avila was overwhelmed with God’s Goodness and asked Our Lord: “How can I thank you?” Our Lord replied, “ATTEND ONE MASS”.

My Dear Friends in Christ,

The “Our Father” is one of the most, if not THE most, central prayer in the Catholic-Christian faith. It is the only “formal” prayer taught to the Twelve by Jesus. Jesus gave them this prayer after being requested by the Apostles for a way to pray; they had known of/experienced John’s disciples praying and that John had given them “formulas” to pray. The prayer which Jesus gives them is a perfect blend of adoration, petition and thanksgiving – it has all of the elements of a great prayer. The “version” given in Luke’s gospel is somewhat truncated, but it gets the point across that the sentiment and power of the full prayer (which we offer in our liturgy).

The other benefit of having prayers like the “Our Father” is that they give us words to put to the feelings which we experience which we would have a hard time otherwise expressing. When words fail us, prayers such as the “Our Father” give us the opportunity to put forth our inmost desires and thoughts. The beautiful thing about using the “Our Father” in our liturgy is that we realize that, when we pray in community, that we are not alone in our need for God or our desire to receive those things from God which will help us to grow in faith, hope and love.

Jesus further elaborates on this prayer by extolling the virtue of being persistent in prayer. This is not to say that if we ask often enough, we will get what we want. I remember as a child asking (on long car trips), *ad nauseam*, “are we there yet?”; it was if had I asked often enough that the answer would change. The only thing that changed was my mother’s level of patience, decreasing with each petition! I think what Jesus is getting at in the gospel passage for today is that each time we ask for something and are told “no”, then we have the opportunity to “nuance” our request and think about what we truly *need* (and not just what we *want*). If we “ask...seek...knock” (Lk 11:9), then we will “receive...find...be opened” (Lk 11:10). These are persistent actions with concrete results; they are opportunities to grow in faith, hope and love.

May we have the courage and patience to be persistent in prayer. May we be focused in our prayers so that we may ask for those things which we need, not just what we want. May we always know in our heart that God hears our prayers, gives us what we need and helps us to grow in faith, hope and love.

How far would you drive for Mass?

I don't know if anyone has ever done a study of such a pedestrian topic, but it is a question that will become increasingly relevant.

Once upon a time, driving farther than your local parish was simply a matter of choice. For example, when I was a child, my parents took strong exception to our curmudgeonly pastor.

As kids, we had no idea why so many Sundays were an adventure: We would pack into our VW bus and go anywhere but our home parish: from Our Lady of Malibu to Corpus Christi to St. Monica's. It was a great opportunity to see the diversity of worship spaces, even in the one, holy and Catholic Church. Only years later did I find out the reason for our road trips.

As a parent myself, I fall in the camp of "stick to the parish in whose boundaries you reside."

I know many people decide otherwise, choosing to find a parish that satisfies their taste in music or homilies or even language. To which I respond: Who am I to judge? But if being Catholic means "here comes everybody" (to quote James Joyce), then all the messy diversity of "everybody" is to be found in my parish.

In the future, however, driving long distances for Mass may not be optional when the number of priests available is not enough to staff all the parishes and all the Masses to which people are accustomed.

Some Catholics in rural areas are already experiencing this shortage, as are folks in the military. There are dioceses now that have almost the same number of priests as parishes. When one gets sick or dies, it isn't just an inconvenience; it means people may go without.

As our priestly population ages and populations shift, this will only get more dramatic. Dioceses like Pittsburgh are already facing this reality, going from 188 parishes to 57. Other dioceses are consolidating priests so that three may serve five parishes or four serve six.

We laity have been pretty spoiled, to tell the truth, believing that whatever our schedule or inclination, the church will be available to us. For too many years, we've treated parishes as the spiritual equivalent of service stations. We pull in at our convenience. We get the Mass time, the music, the liturgy, even the language we want, and then we sail off into the work week.

In many of our dioceses in the not too distant future, we may soon resemble much of the rest of the world. Masses may take place in shifting locations and larger venues. It may not be a 10-minute drive and a one-hour Mass. It may mean a time commitment we readily accept for travel soccer or 18 holes of golf.

How far would you drive to receive the Eucharist, go to confession, baptize your child? Would you go 30 miles away? Would you go to the next county? Would you do the readings with your family on those weeks when no Mass may be available?

I've heard stories already of parishioners shouting at parish staff because they can't get the funeral date they want or the wedding time they want. A priest simply isn't available. How many people will simply wander away, not a "none," but a "not worth the bother?"

Some dioceses are already calculating the sliding scale: Closing parishes to save money means X number of Catholics will simply stop going, which means a further drop in revenue.

The calculation we laity may have to make is how far we will drive for the Eucharist.

Everyday Stewardship

My father would always say to me when I was growing up, "Whatever is mine is yours." He was always very generous toward me and, if I am being truthful, probably spoiled me. We were not a rich family by any measure, but I never really wanted for anything. If I asked, I would receive.

In Luke 11, Jesus tells us our heavenly Father is similar to my father, but God is profoundly more generous. However, I am not sure many of us really believe that. When growing up we ask our earthly parents for all sorts of things, some requests being large but many being small. I know my own three children might ask me for anything at anytime. If God is more generous with me than I am with my own three children, how come I find myself mostly asking God for things when all my other options have run out or my back is against the wall? We make deals with God in our moment of despair or fear, but when things were great we asked for little or sometimes nothing at all.

We need God and his generosity 365 days a year. Better than that, God wants us to ask for things and learn to rely on him. There is no strength in walking in this world alone. God wants to be the source of all our strength. That is one reason why at every hour of the day, somewhere in the world, Mass is being celebrated and his children are receiving him in the holy Eucharist. If God can become man, die, and rise again, and then humble himself in the elements of bread and wine to be close to you, do you not think he will respond to your everyday simple requests? May God's generosity flow to you in great abundance for his love knows no limits.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE


July 28, 2019 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Are you guilty of spiritual stockpiling? Spiritual stockpiling isn't an endless rotation of rosaries and novenas. It's accumulating emotional "goods" to meet your needs. Perhaps it's a collection of material objects you treasure. Maybe it's a preoccupation with money. It could also be relationships, making sure there's always enough friends and connections to never really feel alone. It's our tendency to let things add up so that we won't quite need God to fulfill our inner life. Yet in this Sunday's Gospel, we have that inescapable petition from the Our Father. "Give us each day our daily bread."

This life isn't an immediate arrival. And as much as we might try to shore up possessions and pleasures, we know the journey is unpredictable. Give us this day our daily bread implies enough for the next set of steps, but not enough to stockpile. So here's the big question: Do we trust God to give us what we need? After all, "What father among you would hand his son a snake when he asks for a fish?... how much more will the Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him?" At the Last Supper, Jesus said he would never leave us orphaned. God will not abandon us. And surely He wouldn't ask us to pray for what He does not intend to give.

Of course, sometimes our prayers for daily help can seem to go unanswered. Today's Gospel has advice for that, too. "I tell you... he will give up to him whatever he needs because of his persistence." Our spiritual stockpiling increases our self-reliance and decreases our openness to God's possibilities. Be persistent in your pursuit of God! Trust that He will keep His promises to provide for us, today and always.
