


NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Something that has been (and will, I think, continue to be) debated is the "nature" of Jesus. For centuries, theologians have ponder the question of "what did he know, and when did he know it?" when it comes to the divinity and/or humanity of Jesus. Some "camps" will say that Jesus always knew He was divine; some will place this knowledge at the point when He was found in the temple by Mary and Joseph; some will say that He had some knowledge early, and that He "grew" into full understanding when He started His public ministry.

Certainly, when Jesus encounters the Jewish crowds in today's gospel passage, He has full knowledge of who He is. In this continuation of the "Bread of Life discourse" (found in the sixth chapter of John's gospel, and the source of our gospel for the last few weeks), Jesus declares Himself as having come "down from heaven" (Jn 6:41). The Jewish audience (who has been following Him) are surprised (one might even say shocked) to hear this. They know Jesus to be the son of Joseph and Mary; they know His relatives (especially John the Baptist); they know His background – or at least they *think* they do. This encounter is much like when Jesus goes back to Nazareth, where the people "knew him when..." Much like that encounter, they feel they have Jesus all figured out.

There's only one problem with that logic: they're only seeing one "side" (the humanity) of Jesus. I say "side" because to speak of Jesus, one must walk a "theological tightrope". One cannot give too much weight to either the divinity or humanity of Jesus; they are equal in measure, equal in importance. Without divinity, there is no salvation; without humanity, there is no connection to you and me – both are necessary for us to have any chance at full redemption. While it is true that God could have saved us anytime, any way, anywhere, God chose Jesus (with the fullness of humanity and divinity) to be among us, similar to us in all things but sin. In this way, "one of our own" saved us. This is where it gets tricky for the Jewish audience: according to tradition, no one is supposed to know the origins of the Messiah – but they know Jesus' roots. This is not so important for us as Christians (we should be happy that God loves us so much that He gave us Jesus as savior and messiah!), but it is a major issue for the Jewish audience of the day (and continues to be a point of division between Christians and Jews).

Today's passage gives us hope, both for today and for the future. Today's hope comes in the fact that Jesus gives us Himself as "food for the journey", spiritual food that strengthens our souls. Future hope comes in the fact that Jesus came "down from heaven" (Jn 6:41), showing us the way to the Kingdom, and that with this "Bread of Life" we will live forever. May we come to know, appreciate and share this life, this life in Christ, with all whom we meet.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY



Along with today (11 August) being the 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time, it is also the Feast of St. Clare. Let's learn more about this great Franciscan woman of faith. Clare was born July 16, 1194 as Chiara Offreduccio the eldest daughter of Favorino Scifi, Count of Sasso-Rosso and his wife Ortolana. There

are many legends of how Clare and Francis met, but it is clear that Clare would have known about Francis and his movement of brothers seeking to follow Jesus and embrace Holy Poverty. Having refused to marry at 15, she was moved by the dynamic preaching of Francis. At 18, she escaped one night from her father's home, was met on the road by friars carrying torches, and in the poor little chapel called the Portiuncula received a rough woolen habit, exchanged her jeweled belt for a common rope with knots in it, and sacrificed the long tresses to Francis' scissors. He placed her in a Benedictine convent which her father and uncles immediately stormed in rage. She clung to the altar of the church, threw aside her veil to show her cropped hair and remained adamant. Sixteen days later her sister Agnes joined her. Others came. They lived a simple life of great poverty, austerity and complete seclusion from the world, according to a Rule which Francis gave them as a guide to their life. The women were initially called the "Poor Ladies," later the "Order of San Damiano", and by 1263, just ten years after Clare's death, the order became known as the "Order of Saint Clare" – commonly referred to today as the Poor Clares. The nuns went barefoot, slept on the ground, ate no meat and observed almost complete silence. Later Clare, like Francis, persuaded her sisters to moderate this rigor: "Our bodies are not made of brass." The greatest emphasis, of course, was on gospel poverty. They possessed no property, even in common, subsisting on daily contributions. When even the pope tried to persuade her to mitigate this practice, she showed her characteristic firmness: "I need to be absolved from my sins, but I do not wish to be absolved from the obligation of following

Contemporary accounts glow with admiration of her life in the convent of San Damiano in Assisi. She served the sick, waited on table, washed the feet of the begging nuns. She came from prayer, it was said, with her face so shining it dazzled those about her. She suffered serious illness for the last 27 years of her life. Her influence was such that popes, cardinals and bishops often came to consult her—she never left the walls of San Damiano. Francis always remained her great friend and inspiration. She was always obedient to his will and to the great ideal of gospel life which he was making real. Clare's theology of joyous poverty in imitation of Christ is evident in the Rule she wrote for her community and in her four letters to Agnes of Prague.

A well-known story concerns her prayer and trust. She had the Blessed Sacrament placed on the walls of the convent when it faced attack by invading Saracens. "Does it please you, O God, to deliver into the hands of these beasts the defenseless children I have nourished with your love? I beseech you, dear Lord, protect these whom I am now unable to protect." To her sisters she said, "Don't be afraid. Trust in Jesus." The Saracens fled. On August 15, 1255, Pope Alexander IV canonized Clare as Saint Clare of Assisi. Construction of the Basilica of Saint Clare was completed in 1260, and on October 3 of that year Clare's remains were transferred to the newly completed basilica where they were buried beneath the high altar. In further recognition of the saint, Pope Urban IV officially changed the name of the Order of Poor Ladies to the Order of Saint Clare. Some 600 years later in 1872, Saint Clare's remains were transferred to a newly constructed shrine in the crypt of the Basilica of Saint Clare where they can still be seen today. St. Clare is the patron saint of television – and many people are surprised by that. The reason is that in the later years of Clare's life, when she was unable to arise from the sick bed and attend Mass, she was able to "view" the Mass being celebrated in a vision displayed on the wall of her small room.
