

NOTES FROM THE PASTOR



My Dear Friends in Christ,

We live in a society where we have plenty of choices. Choices of employment, housing, food, or the like. Some of these are easy, simple and have little consequence and some have life-changing or life-altering consequences. In today's readings, choices are given. They are, ultimately, choices between serving God and serving one's own interest. We have the free will, a gift from God, to choose God's way or our way. We have the ability and opportunity to freely decide the path we wish to walk. Again, like some life choices, this is not an easy one, and the consequences could, literally, mean life or death.

In our first reading Joshua gathers the tribes of Israel, asking them to make a choice between the gods of the people in whose land they inhabit or the god of their ancestors. Joshua makes his choice clear in the last line of his impassioned plea: "as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord" (Jos 24:15). The people make this same choice, acknowledging all that God has done for them in securing their freedom. This seems like an easy choice (freedom over slavery) but some, given a choice, might opt for the "security" (albeit a false sense of the same) of slavery. The Israelites, in recognizing all that God has done choose, along with Joshua, to serve the Lord.

Our second reading, which always sparks discussion if not controversy, speaks of choice as well. It is the choice between serving one's own interests and putting oneself at the service of another. St. Paul reminds us at the beginning of the passage to "be subordinate to one another out of reverence to Christ" (Eph 5:21). I dare say that the following lines of the passage don't matter, as each party (husbands and wives, in this case) is beholden to another, and we are all (no matter our state in life) beholden to Christ. This passage, which always seems to get mired in the "politics of language" needs to be seen for what it is: a uniform call to service, one to the other and all to Christ; anything less than that does it, and our baptismal call, a disservice. We are all subject to this same call.

In our gospel, Jesus starts to lose followers. They "fall away" because of the difficulty of the message at hand (the "Bread of Life discourse" continued and finished in this passage). It is hard to accept this truth of the Real Presence. There is only so much of it that can be taught and understood. At some point, one must come to **believe** that this *is* Jesus, truly present in Eucharist, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity. It is not a "form", "symbol" or "image" of Christ – it is truly Him, alive and in our midst. This is, indeed, a hard thing to hear and accept; it is only through faith that one can come to believe that Jesus is truly and fully present in the Eucharist.





MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

In today's gospel, Jesus is confronted by the people with the accusation that His teachings are too hard: too hard to live, too hard to incorporate into daily living. When asked if they were going to leave, St. Peter says to Jesus ""Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God." (John 6:68-69). When one looks at the "Prayer of St. Francis", while one might find it beautiful it is, at its core, a challenging way to act, speak, and live. One might have asked St. Francis "how can we live this teaching, for it is hard?" But if one is to be a person of peace, the "Prayer of St. Francis" is one which serves as a "blueprint" of peace-filled living. So, I offer it to you on this day for your prayerful reflection.

<u>Prayer of St. Francís</u> of Assísí

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace: where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console. to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love. *For it is in giving that we receive,* it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING

QUICK FACTS



Human trafficking affects 50 million people worldwide!

Profits generated by human trafficking exceed \$150 billion a year. 72% of the women and girls being sex trafficked are of an average age of 11-13 years old.

Trafficked women and girls can be violated 15 to 24 times per day and are forced to meet a quota or face more severe beatings.

Traffickers prey on people of all ages, backgrounds, and nationalities, exploiting them for their own profit.

Short-term, 30-day shelters, and shelters with inadequate resources have a 7x higher recidivism rate.

The US ranks as one of the worst countries in the world for human trafficking, with an estimated 300,000+ incidents occurring annually.

<u>The O'Connell House</u> is a new safe home for women who have been trafficked and who may be pregnant and/or with a small child in the Archdiocese of Boston. This home is unique as it has a model of care called 'The Sister Care Model' whereby we have trained religious Sisters as caregivers providing a loving, nurturing presence 24/7. This model is emulated after a successful juvenile safe home, called Metanoia Manor, in Louisiana, which started the Sister Care Model and has excellent results after 7 years!

We recently opened, after completing all renovations and improvements, taking in our first resident on National Human Trafficking Day, January 12, 2024! We were blessed with Cardinal Sean O'Malley and Bishop Robert Hennessey who both came to The O'Connell House for a ribbon cutting and provided a House Blessing! (see picture above)

Our Mission

The mission of The O'Connell House is to provide comprehensive services for women who have been trafficked who may also be pregnant or with a young child. It is a place where dignity will be restored and healing can occur. We accomplish this by having Sister Caregivers 24/7.

Global Strategic Operatives, GSO, was initiated after a high-level meeting of leaders and stakeholders at the UN in 2018. It was decided to focus on training healthcare professionals across the globe on how to identify a victim who is being trafficked and to take appropriate action. The rationale for choosing to focus on healthcare is studies and data show that 88-92% of all survivors sought out medical care while being trafficked. If not trained, the victims fall through the cracks of the healthcare system and do not receive the help that is critically needed and remain in the 'life" until help is offered.

Pope Francis said that "Human Trafficking is an open wound to the Body of Christ" and "a crime against humanity."



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
