

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Every Christmas growing up, we had a traditional way to celebrate and mark the day (not unlike most/all families). On Christmas eve, we would decorate the tree, which would be followed by midnight Mass and then (upon arriving home) the opening of *one* present; it could be any gift, but all other presents had to wait until the morning to be opened. This was important to us, as it marked security and continuity for us as a family. Our faith is no different; rituals and traditions are important, for they help us bond and be formed as a people. These events or customs help us to worship in a way befitting the sacrifice God offers us in Christ Jesus. They cannot, however, get in the way of the meaning behind that worship.

This is the dilemma posed to Jesus. Some of His disciples do not follow the custom of washing one's hands before eating; this would make sense, as some of these followers were Gentiles coming over to the "New Way", as it was being called. It had its roots in Judaism (and adapted many of its traditions) to be sure, but it wasn't Judaism. Jesus answers the Pharisees by quoting the prophet Isaiah, who basically warned against "lip service". It is not enough, Jesus contends, to say that you follow God; your actions, your manner and your very life must reflect this truth. In the case of the ritual hand-washing, one could scrub "until the cows came home", but it would not cleanse the soul. This is something which takes an internal "cleansing". In our own tradition, this would include an "examination of conscience" and, ultimately, sacramental confession. In this way, one makes oneself ready to not only receive Jesus (in Word and Sacrament) but also live Jesus (in Spirit and Truth).

This is not to say that ritual is useless or unimportant. On the contrary, if we live as Jesus calls us to live then the rituals and symbols which we use and enter into can only serve to enhance that relationship. The rituals we undertake are meant to lead to a "greater good", and a deeper truth. On the surface they may seem unimportant, but if done right they can strengthen not only our relationship with God but our resolve to share this truth.

May all that we do, in word and deed, lead to a better understanding of who God is for us. May we know that Jesus, who is the one who calls us into relationship, is at the heart of every ritual, every liturgical action, and every sacred moment. May we have the courage to share this presence, this real and abiding presence, with all whom we meet.

### **MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY**

In today's gospel, Jesus challenges the authorities of the day in how they followed the "letter" of the law but lost sight of the "spirit" of the law. The law of which Jesus was speaking was

the Mosaic Law (given by God through Moses to the people), expanded to the Hebraic Law practiced by the Jewish people. In this law, which encompassed all aspects of religious AND civil life, people were bound to follow it to the letter. What was lost, however, was the sense of how to incorporate it into their everyday lives – in other words, how to truly live it. Jesus' take on the law, was that God gave this law so that people could grow closer to God, deeper in relationship with Him. His issue with the way the authorities (the Pharisees and Sadducees) managed the law was that they expected people to follow the law "blindly" without knowing, let alone asking, WHY they were following the law.

When St. Francis of Assisi was forming the Franciscan Order (as well as the Secular Franciscan Order), he knew that there had to be a sense of order, anticipating that this entity might grow into a world-wide phenomenon. As it grew, St. Francis was aware that without a Rule (like the Benedictines, who predate the Franciscans by about 700 years) had) there could very well be a misinterpretation – or, worse yet, abuse – of what the spirit of Franciscan life would be about. Thus, in 1221, Francis wrote the original Rule of the Franciscan Order, at which time the Rule of the Third Order of St. Francis (later to be known as the Secular Franciscan Order) was created. These rules were modified and restructured over the centuries, but the "spirit" of the Rule was with St. Francis himself. It was that desire of St. Francis that all Franciscans, regardless of the status or place within the Franciscan Orders, that all who follow this Rule were called to live in both the "letter" and the "spirit" of the Rule.

Today, the Secular Franciscan Order (originally call the Third Order of St. Francis) follows a rule modified a few times over the centuries and which currently follows a Rule approved by Pope Paul VI, himself a Secular Franciscan. This Rule is comprised of 26 individual "rules" spread over three chapters. If one is to look at the Rule, one would see St. Francis' fingerprints all over the document. While it has been modified several times, the "spirit" of St. Francis is present throughout. May we, whether Secular Franciscans or not, live in the spirit of St. Francis and his Rule (as well as the Commandments), and live not only by the "letter" of the law (as it brings order) but by the "spirit" of the law (which brings us into right relationship with God.
