My Dear Friends in Christ,

St. Francis de Sales was once quoted as saying that "God does not give us a cross that is an ounce too heavy or an inch too long". This thought gives rise to the notion that God does, indeed, allow for crosses in our life. What St. Francis is alluding to, however, is that they are not unbearable. We realize that when we look at the life of Christ. Christ was able to bear His cross because He knew that it must be done, not only in His life, but in ours as well.

In today's gospel, Jesus looks to His disciples to gauge how His earthly mission is going. When Jesus asks the question about who people say that He is, Jesus is not taking a "popularity poll". Jesus doesn't really care if people *like* Him or His message, just that they're *getting it*. Jesus wants to know this so as to be able to "fine tune" His message. Jesus then turns to His disciples and asks the same question, but in a much more personal way. When Jesus inquires of the Twelve, "who do *you* say that I am?" (Mk 8:29, italics added), He wants to know if they *get* it, if they understand what He is all about. Jesus needs to know this because He will soon be entrusting His message and mission to them.

This is where we come in. Jesus, in asking the question of His mission to the Twelve, is talking to us in this gospel passage. Jesus is placing the question on our hearts this day so that we can think about where we stand in light of Jesus' mission and message. Do we know who Jesus is? Do we *get* it? This is a vitally important thing, this knowledge of who Jesus is and about what Jesus is trying to teach us.

This is also where the idea of the cross comes in for us. Each one of us has a "cross" to bear, often many of them over the course of a lifetime. They come in all shapes and sizes, unique to the person. We may have corporate experiences, but even then the cross we bear in them in ours and ours alone. We may help one another (much like Simon of Cyrene helped Jesus carry His Cross), but the burden of carrying one's cross lays squarely on one's own shoulders. We do have help, though. We have the guidance of the Holy Spirit, as well as the model of Christ Himself.

May we know that the crosses we bear assist us in drawing ever closer in union to Christ. May we trust that these crosses are never "an ounce too heavy or an inch too long". May we know that our God will be with us on this journey – through our life and into the Kingdom.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

Twenty-three years ago our nation suffered a devastating terrorist attack, the likes of which had not been seen in our land. As I was speaking recently to someone of the events of 9/11, I

spoke in terms of "my generation's 'Pearl Harbor', times three". This was due to the fact that a foreign entity had breached our national security, caused significant loss of life, and shaken us to our core; it was also a "rallying point" for our nation, much like Pearl Harbor had been in 1941, because we really had never experienced something of this magnitude (especially considering that it happened in three locations (New York, Pennsylvania, and Washington (DC))). In reflecting on the events of 9/11 in light of my Franciscan journey, I couldn't help but think of the "Prayer of St. Francis":

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace. Where there is hatred let me sow love; Where there is injury, pardon; Where there is doubt, faith; Where there is despair, hope; Where there is darkness, light; Where there is sadness, joy.

O Dívíne Master, grant that I may not so much seek To be consoled as to console; To be understood as to understand: To be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; It is in pardoning that we are pardoned; And it is in dying that we are born to eternal lífe.

Now, while the Prayer of St. Francis was more likely than not not written by Francis, it has been so widely associated with him that it is usually included in the "canon" of St. Francis. When we look at the word choices use and the counterbalance of the negative (i.e., hatred, injury, doubt, despair, darkness, sadness) and the positive (i.e., love, pardon, faith, hope, light, joy), it certainly reads like the "spirit" of Francis and his work in the world to bring "Gospel to life and life to Gospel".

The Christ-like (and positive) attributes found in the poem are an antidote/response to the (negative) actions of 9/11. Franciscans are called, as a body, to mirror their lives after Francis, who mirrored his life after Christ. We are not called to follow through. This means we need to be more mindful of what be "doormats" in response to violence, but we are to answer violence with a Christ-like love. As we commemorate this 20th anniversary of 9/11, let us strive to be "instruments" of love, pardon, faith, hope, light, joy...and Peace.

Everyday Stewardship

I must confess. I have not always prayed for someone if I told him or her I would. I have fallen victim to making the phrase, "You are in my prayers," a sentence void of real emotion or intent. It is like asking the question, "How are you?" Do I always want to know how you are at the time? Then follows the most common responses of "fine" or "good." I could have had the worst day, but I still utter a response that does not reflect my true state. Many of us say things to be nice without really thinking about it. At least, I hope I am not the only one. The truth is that words are meaningless without action. We sometimes make ourselves and others feel better by saying we will do things only to provide no action at all. Offering best wishes to those in real need without any action is worth little. Even if we think we are sincere, true faith without works is dead.

Good stewardship requires us to say what we mean and mean what we say. Stewardship is a way of living. It does ask for sentiments of love. It asks for profound actions of love. We need to offer our gifts, talents, time, and prayers to one another and then we are saving, more committed to following through, and more accountable for our actions if we fail. If we practice this way of living, not only will we be able to say we are doing the right thing, but our integrity will be intact and we will bear witness to the transforming power of Jesus Christ.
