






#### NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

My Dear Friends in Christ,

As I was reflecting on today's gospel, I couldn't help but think of "A Christmas

Faith is the journey from believing in God to trusting God.

Carol", by Charles Dickens. Truly, I was, and I'll be happy to explain why (even though Christmas is months away). In "A Christmas Carol", Scrooge is visited by the Three Ghosts (Christmas Past, Christmas Present, and Christmas Future); in today's gospel, the "rich man" featured in the parable presented by Jesus begs Abraham to call forth someone who has risen from the dead to visit his brothers so that their fate does not "mirror" his. This is where the stories "part company", for a bit. Abraham realizes that their minds won't be changed even if someone who has risen from the dead visits them. This is primarily because they (the brothers) have Moses and the prophets to "steer them in the right direction" - they shouldn't need someone to rise from the dead to "get it". We know, from the benefit of two thousand years of salvation history, that God did send someone risen from the dead (Jesus, in His postresurrection encounters with the disciples) to help His followers "get it". Did they need this? Some did, some didn't. God realized, however, that something "big" had to happen for people to be convinced of Jesus' claim that He was the Son of God.

What does/did/will (depending on where we are on our journey of faith) it take for us to "get it"? Was reading the Old Testament, specifically the books of the prophets, enough for us? Was reading the New Testament, specifically the Gospels, enough for us? Were the resurrection (and post-resurrection) accounts enough for us? Are we still not convinced that God has a plan for us? Each one of us must answer these questions for ourselves, for our faith journeys are just that – ours; no one else can live them for us. We can (and should) be taught dogmas and doctrines, which provide an important "base" from which our beliefs take root and blossom into action. Eventually, however, if our faith is to be a true and lasting faith which bears fruit, we must come to believe on our own, putting our faith into action.

Lazarus was given a share in the Kingdom because God has a special place in His heart (the Church would call it a "preferential option") for the poor. We must have a similar place in our heart for the poor, including not only the physically poor, but the spiritually impoverished (who may actually be more prevalent in our community). The "rich man" would have had a similar place in God's Kingdom if he realized how gifted he was, and took the time to share those gifts. God has gifted us similarly. We would do well to take the time – before it is too late - to assess our own "giftedness", and share these gifts of "time, talent and treasure" with our immediate and biological family, our friends, our family in faith here in the Together In Christ Collaborative, our local communities, our nation and our world.

#### MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

On Oct. 4, Roman Catholics celebrate the feast of St. Francis of Total Assisi, the Italian deacon who brought renewal to the Church through his decision to follow Jesus' words as literally as possible. In a January 2010 general audience, Pope Benedict XVI recalled this "giant of holiness" as a "great saint and a joyful man," who taught the Church that "the secret of true happiness" is "to become saints, close to God." The future Saint Francis was born on an uncertain date in the early 1180s, one of the several children born to the wealthy merchant Pietro Bernardone and his wife Pica. He originally received the name Giovanni (or John), but became known as Francesco (or Francis) by his father's choice.

Unlike many medieval saints, St. Francis was neither studious nor pious in his youth. His father's wealth gave him access to a lively social life among the upper classes, where he was known for his flashy clothes and his readiness to burst into song. Later a patron of peacemakers, he aspired to great military feats in his youth and fought in a war with a rival Italian city-state. A period of imprisonment during that conflict turned his mind toward more serious thoughts, as did a recurring dream that suggested his true "army" was not of this world. He returned to Assisi due to illness in 1205, and there began to consider a life of voluntary poverty.

Three major incidents confirmed Francis in this path. In Assisi, he overcame his fear of disease to kiss the hand of a leper. Afterward, he made a pilgrimage to Rome, where he deposited his money at Saint Peter's tomb and exchanged clothes with a beggar. Soon after he returned home, Francis heard Christ tell him in a vision: "Go, Francis, and repair my house, which as you see is falling into ruin." Francis began to use his father's wealth to restore churches. This led to a public quarrel in which the clothmerchant's son removed his clothing and declared that he had no father except God. He regarded himself as the husband of "Lady Poverty," and resolved to serve Christ as "a herald of the Great King."

During the year 1208, the "herald" received the inspiration that would give rise to the Franciscan movement. At Mass one morning, he heard the Gospel reading in which Christ instructed the apostles to go forth without money, shoes, or extra clothing. This way of life soon became a papally-approved rule, which would attract huge number of followers within Francis' own lifetime. Through his imitation of Christ, Francis also shared in the Lord's sufferings. He miraculously received Christ's wounds, the stigmata, in his own flesh during September of 1224. His health collapsed over the next two years, a "living sacrifice" made during two decades of missionary preaching and penance. St. Francis of Assisi died on Oct. 3, 1226. Pope Gregory IX, his friend and devotee, canonized him in 1228. May we follow your Son by walking in the footsteps of Francis of Assisi and by imitating his joyful love.

If you have the time or talent to help in any way, please let us know. If you have any wishes for different activities or ministries, please let us know.



#### BENEATH THE SURFACE

Snow Days and Second Chances

Yesterday morning, my kids were playing outside in the snow, and I decided to take advantage of the quiet house to make a few important phone calls.

Fool. I forgot Murphy's Law of Parenting, which dictates that as soon as you dial a phone number, a bomb of irritation and neediness explodes within the heart of your loudest child. Sure enough, as soon as the person on the other end of the line picked up, my son was at the back door, whimpering loudly. Horror of horrors, he had snow in his boot.

I gestured to the phone. He whimpered more loudly. I mouthed and mimed threats. He threw his boot at me. I gave him The Look. He started to scream.

Well, needless to say, the phone call didn't go well, and my son's snow day was cut short. He begged for a second chance, but I explained to him that life doesn't always give you second chances. The phone call was over. Ruined. I couldn't get it back.

But that's when I remembered that moms have a superpower: creating second chances where none had existed before. So I told him that if he could be quiet while I made the rest of my calls, he could go back outside.

My son is young right now. I give him lots of second chances because second chances help him learn. Second chances are the training wheels of life.

I dread the day when the training wheels come off, and I can't save him from his bad decisions. I think every parent does.

The parable of the rich man and Lazarus highlights a reality that we often wish to ignore: at some point, we will run out of chances, and it's not because God tires of giving them to us. It's because a truly endless supply of chances would strip us of our free will. It would deny us the right of being taken at our word — and God respects us too much to do that.

My son saved his snow day. It's a good reminder: take the second (and third and fourth) chance. Don't wait for the next one.


