My Dear Friends in Christ,

In this day and age of "options" ("Press #1 for..., Press #2 for..."), we shy away



from the word "obligation". Yet at times, it can be a very powerful, even necessary, word to employ. When one has an obligation (as opposed to an "offer" or "suggestion"), one is more compelled to show up and do their part. In today's gospel, the idea of obligation comes up with regard to our relationship to God. There are certain things, done as part of a full relationship with God, which we are obliged to do.

In the analogy put forth in today's gospel, Jesus compares our relationship to a slave and a master's relationship. While we may bristle at that comparison (after all, we are more than slaves, aren't we?) we would do well to recognize that while God desires to be in relationship with us, God is the "creator" and we are the "created". As such, we are beholden to God for everything we are and have; without God, we are nothing and our efforts come to nothing — nothing lasting, at least. This may be a humbling thought, but how else are we to react when we put into perspective all that we have done, as opposed to all God has done. It pales in comparison, doesn't it? As great as we are, that greatness is a result of using the God-given talents and abilities which we have at our disposal.

I remember as a young boy my mother telling me how to react when I was given a gift. I was to receive that gift (whether it is a new, sought-after toy or a badly-knit, handmade sweater) with a smile and a heartfelt "thank you". I was then to say no more, no less; in that way, I wouldn't say something I would come to regret (by hurting the giver's feelings). In much the same way, we might do well to react to all God has given us – the challenges as well as the good things we have – by thanking Him and moving on. In that way, perhaps the difficulties we face can be minimized (perhaps even eliminated) by us realizing that even the challenges we encounter can help us to grow.

God desires a certain sense of "loyalty". It is not to be a "blind" loyalty (for God doesn't want "robots", otherwise how does one explain "free will", itself a gift from God)? No, God wants us to put the things we have/are into the "context" of faith. With faith, we can "move mountains" (perhaps not literally...perhaps so!); we can do amazing things. Let us have the courage to see God's gifts for what they are – moments when we acknowledge our dependence on God, thanking Him for all those things which help us to grow in faith, hope and love.



THE DEACON'S COLUMN

The Faith of the Apostles

Many years ago, I was teaching an Introduction to Catholicism course to first-year students in high school. One day, I received a call from a student's mother requesting time to meet with me about something I said during class. Externally, I said I would be happy to meet at a time of her choosing but internally I was racking my brain thinking about what I said to warrant a parent meeting. At the scheduled time I met the mother and after a few minutes, she got to the point, "My daughter came home upset because in your class you said that a Catholic who intentionally, willfully, and freely committed a serious sin should go to confession before receiving Holy Communion." I did not deny what I taught, and I gave the mother a bit more context into the lesson and its purpose to which she responded, that is "your faith and I'd appreciate it if you keep your opinion to yourself."

I was taken back by her response and after careful thought, "I replied, that what I teach is not my opinion. What I teach is not even "my" faith—The faith I teach is the faith of the Apostles handed onto me by my parents and pastors.

The profession of faith that we proclaim has its roots it the fourth and fifth centuries after the death and resurrection of Christ. The creed was developed to declare what the Church believed in contrast to the false teaching that the country is the fourth and fall contrains.

In an earlier reflection on the Creed's place in the Liturgy, I wrote,

ings that were common in the fourth and fifth centuries. These false teachings threatened to destroy the common "Amen" or "Yes, I believe" that is implied by the one offering of Christ's body and blood during the Eucharist. In the early Church there were some who did not believe that Jesus is God and that he is co-eternal with the Father in heaven. There were some who believed that Jesus was simply a human person like you and me but because he had a lot of faith, he was considered God's son. There were others that did not believe that the Holy Spirit was God and therefore should not be given the same honor, glory, and praise as the Father and the Son. The creed was drafted to declare against those who taught differently what the Church knew in her collective heart that God is a Trinity of three divine persons sharing one divine nature. The Father is not the Son or the Holy Spirit, the Son is not the Father or the Holy Spirit, and the Holy Spirit is not the Son or the Father. Yet, the Father is God; the Son is God, and the Holy Spirit is God. The mystery of the Holy Trinity is the central mystery of our Catholic faith, and it is what we profess as children of the Father, brothers, and sisters of the Lord, and as Temples of the Holy Spirit.

To help us understand more fully the Creed we profess, I will be writing a short series of reflections on certain aspects of the Creed. My intention in the next series of articles is to not only show the historical and theological background that moved the Church to define what it believes but to place the tenets of the creed in our own time and place. My hope is that reflecting on the Creed in an intentional way we may come to believe more fully what we profess.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY



In the coming days, the Church (in general) and the Franciscan community (in particular) celebrates two major "milestones": the "Transitus" (or "Passing") of St. Francis (Oct. 3rd) and the Feast of St. Francis (Oct. 4th). Most saints' feast days are celebrated once, with the feast marking either their

birth or their death. These two feasts celebrate, in a way, both the life and the death of St. Francis. In the past, these days passed by me without much notice. I knew "of" the Feast of St. Francis, but really knew nothing of the Transitus of Francis. This all changed when I went to Assisi and "discovered" (for myself) St. Francis, came home and embarked on a course of formation towards becoming a Secular Franciscan, and began a new "chapter" in my life of faith, priesthood, and life in general.

Each year on the evening of October 3rd the Franciscan family throughout the world pauses to celebrate the solemnity of our Holy Father Francis's Transitus, passing over from this life to the next. In his famous Canticle of the Creatures, the saint from Assisi wrote "Praised be You, my Lord, through our Sister Bodily Death, from whom no one living can escape." That line, written near Francis's own embrace of Sister Bodily Death, reflects the importance and natural character of death in the life of all creation. Francis was not afraid of what would come at the end of his earthly life, choosing instead to recognize in that experience, not an end, but a transition from one way of living to another. Br. Thomas of Celano recorded an account of that transition, that transitus:

"St. Francis spent the last few days before his death in praising the Lord and teaching his companions whom he loved so much to praise Christ with him. He himself, in as far as he was able, broke out with the Psalm: I cry to the Lord with my voice; to the Lord I make loud supplication. He likewise invited all creatures to praise God and, with the words he had composed earlier, he exhorted them to love God. Even death itself, considered by all to be so terrible and hateful, was exhorted to give praise, while he himself, going joyfully to meet it, invited it to make its abode with him. 'Welcome,' he said, 'my sister death.' "(Celano, Second Life.)

These beautiful and powerful words by Thomas of Celano (and St. Francis) reminds us of how grace-filled and powerful the passing from "earthly life" to "eternal life" can (and should) be! The same is true when we celebrate the Feast of St. Francis. This is more than just a celebration of an "animalloving tree hugger", as I heard St. Francis described by a narrow-minded individual who seemingly knew nothing of the man's conversion, ministry, and life of faithful Church work. They knew nothing of the man whose "180 degree turn" was marked by a renunciation of all worldly goods, a proclamation of a new life, and a journey that would change him, the Church, and the world. They knew nothing of the man who began a religious order which would usher in a recognition and celebration of ALL creation (not just human beings) as "gifts from God". They knew nothing of the man whose persevering faith would influence priests, cardinals, popes, and even sultans! They knew nothing of the man whose death would still be recognized and celebrated almost 800 years later! In these "Franciscan Days", may we as a people of faith celebrate the life and death of St. Francis of Assisi by entering into the world with a renewed sense of stewardship. May we look at ALL creation as a gift from God, and may we care for this creation with a loving, nurturing heart. May the Good God, who calls us into relationship by this stewardship, watch over us. May we, through the intercession of St. Francis of Assisi, take our role as stewards seriously as to be able to hand to the next generation a world of goodness, grace, and life. Happy Transitus! Happy Feast!


Choir Is Back!
