

Dear Parish Leaders,

Actress Patricia Heaton recently told comedian Stephen Colbert, “And you know as a Catholic, there’s only one thing that can be the center of your life and that’s your faith.” Our faith belongs at the center of our lives.

Let us turn to God this day, asking that our faith may flourish like the mustard seed.

My Dear Friends in Christ,



A few years ago, I went to a day-long seminar entitled “Developing an ‘Attitude of Gratitude’”. The presenter challenged the listener to cultivate a viewpoint that everything is a “gift”, things for which we should be grateful. He pointed out that even the challenging events and moments of our lives are times when we should not necessarily *rejoice*, but see them as “teachable moments” (as we used to call them in seminary). They are (or can be) life-changing, and should be seen in that light. The speaker went on further to say that if we missed out on these “teachable moments”, then we miss out on opportunities of growth and enrichment.

In today’s gospel, Jesus encounters ten lepers. They all cry out to Him to have pity on them. They are not asking for a handout, but a miracle. In addressing Him as “master”, they recognize Jesus’ power over this leprosy which has separated them from the community not only physically, but spiritually as well, for disease (in Jesus’ time) had a spiritual component to it. Their outcry comes from a desire for restoration, for “wholeness”. Jesus directs them to the priest (as was the custom in Mosaic Law); as they do so, they are healed. This links Jesus to the Law, something which He had been accused of “skirting” by the Pharisees. In realizing that they were cured, only one (a “foreigner”, probably a Samaritan) comes back to pay Jesus homage. Why is this? Were the others ungrateful? Were they unaware of what this meant? Was the “foreigner” the only one to realize that Jesus’ power knew no bounds, as He healed this “outsider”? The gospel leaves this question for our imagining.

This is where we come in. In “placing ourselves in the story”, we might do well to ask the question, “for what am I grateful?” I think that one of things for which we can all be grateful is our very existence, which is the ultimate gift from God – the gift of life. Each year, we as a Church celebrates “Respect Life Sunday”. At this time, the Church asks us to take a reflective moment to see the value of life, from “conception to natural death”. It calls on us to challenge the “culture of death” which has continued to devalued life of the pre-born, the mentally and physically challenged and the elderly, as well as the marginalized and outcasts of society (such as the homeless or the immigrant seeking entrance (through proper channels) to our country). This attitude (which is most certainly *not* an “attitude of gratitude”) must end.

Another thing for which we should be grateful is our life of faith here in the Together In Christ Collaborative. In my time here, I have come to know both St. Ann’s and St. John’s as vibrant, caring communities. In times we have been called to help to our neighbor (such as the St. Vincent de Paul Food Drive), we have responded with generosity and love. We are called, each day, to reach out to one another in a spirit of charity, humility and love. Let us do just that, so as to foster a community where one can live out one’s baptismal call to serve all those who come to us.

The Archangel is known for his ability to assist those who are in need of illumination.

Nearly everyone has doubts about their faith at some point in their lives. Some have more severe doubts and if they are not addressed, will quickly lead to a complete loss of faith.

If you are at this point in your life and are living by a small thread of faith, consider praying to God through the intercession of St. Gabriel. Angels have been appointed by God to be messengers to us and an aid in our every need. In particular, St. Gabriel is often associated with topics of knowledge and clear those doubts away.

Here is a short prayer that should be prayed with a contrite heart, asking God to illuminate the darkness in your mind. The prayer is based on a private revelation approved by the Church that was received by Franciscan sister named Mother Mariana on January 20, 1620 in Ecuador.

Dear St. Gabriel, celestial ambassador of the Incarnation of the Divine Word, illuminate my intelligence so that I may know and understand the truths of our Catholic Faith. Erase all of my doubts that I might have in regards to God's mercy and justice. Amen

Hi there.

We are all members of the Body of Christ, Saint Paul wrote in his first letter to the Corinthians (I Cor. 12:12). Yes, but usually I don't consider myself to be a particularly important part of the Body. I'm kind of an explorer, trekking ahead to learn more about God's presence and healing love, sharing it with those who come along with me. Looking around, however, I see other much more "important" people on the ecclesial scene than myself.



How about you? Do you consider your vocation to be important—necessary, even, for the life and holiness of the Church today? Do you live as though you were certain *you* are the light of the world?

Today's newsletter is about two saints who lived everyday lives in vocations to which God called them. When St. Gianna—wife, mother, beloved pediatrician—was in the office or cooking dinner, she probably wasn't thinking, "I'm contributing to the holiness of the Church." I can't imagine St. Francis saying anything similar in those early years of trying to respond to the call of God (which eventually led to the immense number of women and men in the Franciscan Family today); all he started with was restoring a simple country church.

Yet both these people focused on one thing: responding to the voice of God leading them in their life. They allowed the goodness within them to be unburied, clarified, and to unfold into a life that was beautiful, powerfully attractive, and a gift to the Church and others.

What does St. Gianna have to do with St. Francis? They are united by the joy they took in God's creation, and united too in rising to the challenges set before them.

My friend, *you* are as necessary in the life and holiness of the Church as they are. If we don't believe this, we will not rise to the challenges that are specific to our day and age. You and I have been put here at this time by God because we have some work to do, some gift to give. St Gianna and St Francis teach us that it is the fidelity to our vocations that hones that gift and makes it possible to accomplish the work that is ours with serenity and grace.

May we all rise—not to the *occasion*—but in our own *personal* response to the voice of God who calls us individually and all together with Christ to be the light of the world today.

In the South, the use of "Yes, Sir," "Yes, Ma'am," and "Thank you," have been drilled into many a little person's brain. Unfortunately, as time goes by, those social conventions seem to be in danger, even in the very places that have held them sacred for so long. In fact, I have found that I sometimes will even get a strange look when I utter similar words to a stranger or passer-by. It seems manners are being traded for acceptance of ill-conceived tolerance, even tolerance of the ill-mannered.

We know this is nothing new when we look at the story of Jesus' healing of the ten lepers. After healing ten, only one comes back to show gratitude to the healer. Why did 90% of those healed not offer thanks?

We all find our lives filled with blessings. We may sometimes think we deserve the good things we receive. We may also believe because everyone receives the same gifts — things like life, air, and the planet — that God didn't single us out, and our obligation to offer thanks is diminished. However, gratitude is never obligated. The other 9 did not get their leprosy back due to ungrateful hearts. Gratitude is simply the gift we give to the one who was generous to us in the first place. A gift for a gift. Generosity gives birth to more generosity. Without as much gratitude in the world, there is less chance for an increase of love and generosity. So, who do you need to thank today?
