

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Growing up in my neighborhood, there was THAT neighbor, which I suspect every neighborhood had. We had a neighbor who, perhaps because of his schedule or perhaps because of his own whims, decided that 6:00 a.m. on Saturday morning was the perfect time to run the power washer, leaf blower, snow blower, or lawn mower (depending on the season). One particular Saturday morning, it seemed like the snow blower was louder than usual. I was just about to go out and “give him a piece of my mind” when, in looking outside, I noticed that he was snow-blowing OUR driveway! I went out and asked him why, and his response both took me aback and cut me to the quick: he was doing it because he heard that my father (who always took it upon himself to start the shoveling) was sick and he thought he’d be neighborly and lend a hand. It gave me a different perspective about what a “neighbor” was, as well as what type of neighbor this gentleman was.

In today’s gospel, Jesus is asked which of the commandment was “first”. Now, mind you, in Jewish tradition, there are 613 commandments (and to think that we have trouble with ten, sometimes!), so to put one first was a tall order. If Jesus was to do this, He would be implying that this “first” commandment was the most important one. This was a trap, and Jesus knew it. Jesus knew that the Scribes, Pharisees, and Sadducees were often trying to trap Him, and He never fell into any of these traps. In this case, Jesus avoids the trap by “synthesizing” the commandments into two: Love of God, Love of Neighbor. In regard to my story above, I often think that Love of God is far easier than Love of Neighbor, but that isn’t always the case. While it can be challenging to love our neighbor, loving God takes effort as well. Often times, God will do something or allow something that leaves us perplexed, amazed, and often times angry. We can’t always see into the mind and heart of God, and many times the “permissive will of God” (when God allows something to happen) that confuses, frustrates and angers us. It is in those times that the grace of “trust” is needed, trust that God knows what He is doing and that, ultimately, He is in charge. Even when we have that trust, that doesn’t mean that it is easy; it is often a hard won trust, coming over a period of time – sometimes months, or even years.

May we come to trust that God, who is in charge, knows what is best. May we come to trust that God has our best interest at heart. May we come to trust that, in the end, all will be well. May we look to God for all things, especially His mercy, His grace, and His love.



May we ask that through their intercession, we may be drawn closer into a love of God and work with them to build up the Kingdom of God here on earth so that we may spend eternity in the Kingdom of God in Heaven! ## The Deacon's Column

### ***St. Joseph, the Saint Next Door***

Recently I was talking with a man who was inquiring about becoming a deacon. During the conversation it became clear that there were too many obstacles that prevented the man from entering diaconal formation and becoming a deacon. Toward the end of the conversation the man asked, "if I cannot serve the Church as a deacon than where can I serve?"

This is a question that many people ask me in my work in vocations and I am sure it is a question that many of us ask in our own lives. The example of St. Joseph gives us an example of how and where most of us are called to serve the Lord—in our homes, in our world, and in our Church. St. Joseph was not immaculately conceived in his mother's womb nor was he the second person of the Trinity. Yet, by a grace of the Holy Spirit he was called to welcome Mary and her Son into his home and care for them as husband and father. Joseph's path to holiness was lived out in the ordinary circumstances of his life.

In 2018 on the Solemnity honoring St. Joseph, the Saint Next Door, Pope Francis in his Apostolic Exhortation, *Gaudete et Exultate*, reflects on Christian Holiness in Today's World. In it he shifts the focus from the saints that form litanies to what he calls, "the saints next door." Speaking about our vocation as Christians, Pope Francis writes, "A Christian cannot think of his or her mission on earth without seeing it as a path of holiness, for "this is the will of God, your sanctification" (1 Thess 4:3). Each saint is a mission, planned by the Father to reflect and embody, at a specific moment in history, a certain aspect of the Gospel (#19)."

Like St. Joseph our path to holiness is lived out where God "plants" us on this earth. Pope Francis reminds us that our individual paths to holiness lie in how we live out our baptismal identity in our homes, community, and Church. St. Joseph was a husband, father, and carpenter. His way to holiness was paved by sharing a life and home with Mary and Jesus and by the way he went about his trade and treated his customers. Since I am a father, husband, and deacon, my path to holiness will be connected to how I love my wife, care for my children, and form future deacons.

If you find yourselves asking the question that the inquiring man asked me, "where can I serve?" look around and see the place and people in your lives and love them as God loves you.

# **Facebook talk to Parents of Re Ed**

Greetings Together in Christ Collaborative of St Ann's and St John's Religious Ed Parents,

I am Nancy Goggin, your new Director of ministries. Many of you have questions regarding this year's religious Ed program. In an attempt to answer your questions, I have decided to make this video. First, I would like to say that I understand your frustration in not having information. I would like to explain what the holdup has been.

Coming off of the past year and a half of Covid-19, there has been many elements that have needed to come together for us to be able to provide a healthy environment in which to have an in-person program. Therefore, we have made a decision to purchase the highest quality air filtration system available in the marketplace. The units we are purchasing are Purashield units. These units were designed by scientist and engineers that have worked for NASA. These same scientists and engineers designed the air filtration system for the Hubble spacecraft. It is their air filtration system that prevented the Hubble from corroding in the atmosphere, allowing it to do its mission. These are the some of the best scientist and engineers in the country. The Purashield air filtration units filter out 99.99% of pollutants and viruses, including Covid-19. These units scrub all the air in the room twice and hour.

Upon making the decision to purchase these units, we realized that for the units to work at their highest level of proficiency, they need to be placed in clean rooms. This led us to realize that we needed to renovate the facility that we would choose to do Religious Education in. Due to both time and financial restraints, we decided to focus all our resources into bringing one building up to Covid -19 safety standards. Therefore, we decided to renovate our largest building, giving us space for all the collaborative programs and events that we want to run. Our largest building is St Ann's Parish center. That is why all Religious Ed classes will be at the Collaborative Parish Center at St Ann's.

Unfortunately, there are many repairs that need to be done at the Collaborative Parish Center before it is ready to welcome our Collaborate family. We are embarking upon an "Extreme Makeover" renovation project. The contractors were supposed to start working on the project last week. However, the contractor we were going to use had staffing issues and needed to pull out of the job. This set us back in time as we needed to find another contractor. Over this past week we have been in negotiations with another company and expect them to be able to start the work this week. Therefore, we need to slightly adjust our Religious Ed schedule.

We were scheduled to fully open our in-person Religious Ed program this coming Sunday, October, 24<sup>th</sup>, at the Collaborative Parish Center. Instead, we will have a "soft opening" of the program. This "soft opening" will consist of Mass attendance and information that families will take home with them from Mass for at-home family catechesis.

Grades 1-8 families are invited to attend either the 8:30 or 10:30 Mass, each week. I will be at both Masses and will distribute the at-home catechesis handouts after the Mass. I will also have registration forms available at the Masses for those who have not yet registered.

The "soft opening" for grades 9 and 10 will be Sunday evening, November 14<sup>th</sup>. We request that students and parents come to St Ann's Church for an Opening Prayer Service and a Confirmation information meeting, from 7:00-8:30 pm. At this meeting, the Confirmation program will be fully explained, including a schedule of class dates and Confirmation preparation events.

We expect that the renovations will be complete by the end of November. Once they are completed, we will have a huge Collaborative Parish Center Grand Opening Event. This will be a fun-filled event for people off all ages and will be open to the community at large. You will receive more information on this event as we get closer to the completion of the renovation. Once the renovation is complete, we will resume in-person classes and will update the schedule of classes.

We are truly excited to be embarking upon this "Extreme Collaborative Parish Center Makeover" on your behalf. However, it was a difficult financial decision to make, but it was actually the only decision we could make. It is imperative, in this time of Covid-19, that we have a healthy environment to gather in. Fr. Paul believes that our number one priority is the health and safety of our collaborative family.

Unfortunately, in doing this renovation we are taking on a huge debt. Usually a parish will do a fundraising effort to raise money to do renovations and not start the renovations until they have the money. Unfortunately, we did not have the luxury of time to raise the money before starting the renovations because it was is an issue of health and safety. Therefore, we have needed to start the renovations in an act of faith, trusting that our collaborative family will appreciate our concern for their health and safety and will join in our fundraising efforts to pay for the renovations. We will be posting a renovation fundraising page on our websites. We will also be having other fundraising opportunities that you can participate in as well. We look forward to all the fun collaborative events that we will have at the Collaborative Parish Center and thank you in advance for your generosity in our fundraising activities.


