

My Dear Friends in Christ,



Growing up in my neighborhood, there was THAT neighbor, which I suspect every neighborhood had. We had a neighbor who, perhaps because of his schedule or perhaps because of his own whims, decided that 6:00 a.m. on Saturday morning was the perfect time to run the power washer, leaf blower, snow blower, or lawn mower (depending on the season). One particular Saturday morning, it seemed like the snow blower was louder than usual. I was just about to go out and “give him a piece of my mind” when, in looking outside, I noticed that he was snowblowing OUR driveway! I went out and asked him why, and his response both took me aback and cut me to the quick: he was doing it because he heard that my father (who always took it upon himself to start the shoveling) was sick and he thought he’d be neighborly and lend a hand. It gave me a different perspective about what a “neighbor” was, as well as what type of neighbor this gentleman was.

In today’s gospel, Jesus is asked which of the commandments was “first”. Now, mind you, in Jewish tradition, there are 613 commandments (and to think that we have trouble with ten, sometimes!), so to put one first was a tall order. If Jesus was to do this, He would be implying that this “first” commandment was the most important one. This was a trap, and Jesus knew it. Jesus knew that the Scribes, Pharisees, and Sadducees were often trying to trap Him, and He never fell into any of these traps. In this case, Jesus avoids the trap by “synthesizing” the commandments into two: Love of God, Love of Neighbor. In regard to my story above, I often think that Love of God is far easier than Love of Neighbor, but that isn’t always the case. While it can be challenging to love our neighbor, loving God takes effort as well. Often times, God will do something or allow something that leaves us perplexed, amazed, and often times angry. We can’t always see into the mind and heart of God, and many times the “permissive will of God” (when God allows something to happen) that confuses, frustrates and angers us. It is in those times that the grace of “trust” is needed, trust that God knows what He is doing and that, ultimately, He is in charge. Even when we have that trust, that doesn’t mean that it is easy; it is often a hard won trust, coming over a period of time – sometimes months, or even years.

May we come to trust that God, who is in charge, knows what is best. May we come to trust that God has our best interest at heart. May we come to trust that, in the end, all will be well. May we look to God for all things, especially His mercy, His grace, and His love.

Why are priests transferred from one parish to another? How is this decided?

A

Priests joke about how transfers are decided. Answers range from “a huge dartboard in the chancery” to pick and win a parish. But managing personnel, especially now when numbers shift and the average age increases, is no easy task. Priests are moved for any number of reasons. The priest himself might want a change; or he may be looking for a different type or place of ministry. Special needs in one place might require particular talents and abilities. Perhaps the priest has acquired enough experience that he can manage a larger assignment. Family concerns, illness, or personal issues might require a change as well. Interestingly enough, these are many ways that a diocese may approach the process. Some have open placement where a priest interviews for a position, or in the case of a pastor, looks the parish over and then makes his interest known to the bishop. Other places use a committee to make recommendations on transfers. Others might post openings and allow the priest themselves to reach an agreement. Like any other institutions or businesses, moving personnel around is done to best suit the church and the priest.

Good afternoon,

You may have heard news reports that the United States Justice Department has begun an investigation in Pennsylvania involving the abuse crisis and associated speculation that their activity may expand to the church in other states. We have not heard from anyone in the Justice Department regarding their interest in the Archdiocese of Boston. We cannot predict whether or not we will hear from them in the future.

Given the public attention to this we wanted to share some facts with you regarding our work with law enforcement agencies in the past.

The Archdiocese of Boston has undergone a more thorough investigation and review of its files and historical treatment of sexual abuse of minors by clergy than any other diocese in the United States.

For the past sixteen years we have worked in partnership with all levels of law enforcement; local, state and federal to maintain the highest levels of child protection. Outcomes of working in partnership include Agreements with both the Massachusetts Attorney General's Office (2003) and the US Attorney's Office for the District of Massachusetts with regard to priests in federal and military service (2005). We continue to stand by both Agreements.

We report all allegations of sexual abuse of minors by clergy as a first step in every case. We implemented annual audits of the effectiveness of our policies and publish those results. We began disclosing the identity of publicly accused priests of the Archdiocese of Boston in 2011. It is important to note that there have been no new allegations of abuse occurring since 2006.

Also, as we recently announced, we have hired former U.S. Attorney Donald K. Stern and others at his law firm to lead the review of our seminaries to meet the public's expected levels of transparency and accountability - and certainly with respect for the commitment by all those associated with our seminaries to the highest standards of integrity, respect and safety for our seminarians, faculty and staff.

As you all are aware, our recognition of the trauma of the heinous crimes committed by clergy makes the leaders of this Archdiocese committed to the survivors in many ways - none of which can ever erase the crimes of the past but seek to sincerely assist in their healing. The Office of Pastoral Support and Outreach (OPSO) was established and funded in 2002 and each year approximately 300 survivors and, in some cases their family members, are served by the staff of OPSO including connecting and supporting their therapeutic relationships and other services ([OPSO link](#)).

Our commitment to survivors and all Catholics includes protection and prevention measures to keep all children safe. Since 2000, all clergy, employees and volunteers of the Archdiocese of Boston - central administration, parishes and related agencies must submit to annual CORI checks (approximately 50,000 checks annually) and more than 100,000 adults have been trained in the Protecting God's Children Program.

The summary of this information is presented here to provide you with some of the facts that evidence the sincerity of our commitment to transparency, prevention and healing. There is always more work to do and we will continue with heartfelt anguish over the failures of the Church and with recognition that our anguish pales in comparison to the pain of the trauma of crimes experienced by survivors.

We hope this information is helpful to you in your ministry and in being able to answer any questions or concerns you may encounter.



We seem to have solved the issues creating the flooded cellar at the Rectory. We are in the process of moving forward with the repairs necessary to correct that problem.
