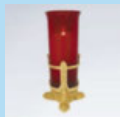

My Dear Friends in Christ,



As I write this, the signs of fall are all around us – the falling leaves, the falling temperatures, the darkening skies. All of these are measures that time is moving on, and we with it. As we move into the fall season, we experience a “death” of sorts. The dying leaves remind us that all life ends. Yet, with this death comes a “rebirth”; the leaves serve as nourishment for the grass, keeping it alive even as it lay dormant under the (coming) hard, cold ground and (most likely) snow. It is the same way with our lives of faith. When we are baptized, we are told, we are baptized into Christ Jesus – into His life, death and resurrection. It is this hope of resurrection that keeps us going.

Today's gospel (all the readings, really) deals with the topic of “eschatology” – the “end times”. As Jesus tells it, we must be aware that there will be times when it may seem that the end times are upon us. Think back to the beginning of this century, when the “millennialists” (those concerned with the perils this new century would bring, including (but not limited to) the end of the world) spoke that “Y2K” would be the end of us all. Yet here it is, two decades later, and we're still here! Perhaps they were part of that corps that Jesus was speaking of, those who speak in the name of God to pronounce the imminent nature of the end of the world. As well-intended as they may have been, they were caught up in the “spirit” of the signs that surround us which may be reminiscent of the Book of Revelation.

Things, seemingly, haven't gotten any better – there are still wars, catastrophes and natural disasters which surround us, seemingly on a daily basis. Yet we still go on with our lives, as we should. If we were to give in to every “prophetic” vision, every outcry of the “end being at hand”, then we would scarcely get anything done! So, how do we know what is the “true” vision? How can we discern false prophets from the authentic Word of God? I think the key is the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit gives us, among its many gifts, the gifts of Wisdom, Understanding and Right Judgment. If we pray for, and use, these gifts, then we would put ourselves in a good position to judge wisely and well the “signs of the times”. We can use these gifts as a way to discern what is truly the Word of God from the “prophet of the week”.

May we have the courage to pray to the Holy Spirit of God for the gifts which will help us discern truth from falsehood. May we know that God is at work in our hearts, our homes and our world. May we trust that God will never leave us abandoned, and will lead us to all truth. May we help others to discern so that none may be lost to the Enemy. May we know that at the “end time”, Jesus will call us home to Himself and give us all of the gifts of the Kingdom.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

Today's first reading and gospel passage both speak of the "Eschatology" (or writings about the "end times") ...basically, what will happen at the end of the world as we know it. When we look at the end of the world, there are generally two schools of thought: a) talk of it is to be avoided until absolutely necessary or b) it is to be spoken of, if not embraced. It is this latter view that St. Francis takes, as we read of his embracing of "Sister Death" ("Praised by You, my Lord, through our Sister Bodily Death, from whom no one living can escape") in his seminal work, "Canticle of the Creatures". Francis's understanding of death within the context of God's creation was a capstone discovery that completed a lifelong process of conversion and seeking God. And at the center of his ability to make peace with his own mortality was his fraternal worldview of creation. Today, this fraternal worldview serves as a lens through which we too can look at death and embrace its presence as a constitutive component of creation that is part of God's plan. In doing so, I believe we will find a source for Christian eschatological hope in an era that is often marked by pessimism, injustice, and violence.

From the beginning of his life until close to his death, Francis, like most people, appears to have dealt with the reality of death largely through avoidance and exploitation. This response was rooted in his fear of death. Sometime between 1209 and 1215, when Francis was in his early thirties, he writes, "And you think that you will possess this world's vanities for a long time, but you are deceived because a day and an hour will come of which you give no thought, which you do not know, and of which you are unaware when the body becomes weak, death approaches, and it dies a bitter death." This fearful tone is echoed in his *Later Exhortation* where he writes, "But let everyone know that whenever and however someone dies in mortal sin without making amends when he could have [done so] and did not, the devil snatches his soul from his body with such anguish and distress that no one can know [what it is like] except the one experiencing it." These are but two examples of Francis's early thoughts on death. Although the language is spiritualized and denotes a certain religiosity, the underlying attitude toward death is strictly negative. There are two themes that come across strongly in these early writings of Francis, namely, the inevitability of death and that death is both painful and to be feared. The first theme is of little note, as all who reflect on death come to this conclusion, but the second theme is highly problematic.

At the end of his life, however, as Francis drew near to the death that he feared for so long, the tone of his expression of death changed noticeably. Along his journey of life, prayer, and ministry, Francis remained convinced of death's inevitability, but he started to view its meaning and his relationship to death rather differently. Where once he saw death as painful, as something to be feared, he now dared to call death his "sister." This is all part of Francis' "conversion", one which (like for many of us) happens over time but happens powerfully and would allow Francis to pass into Eternal Life with a peace which only God can bring. May we know such peace, coming to a point of embracing "Sister Bodily Death" so that we may fully embrace Eternal Life.

I Believe in One God (Part III: Father)

Many years ago, I attended the baptism of a child born to a college friend at a local Protestant Church. I was struck by the fact that the minister did not baptize the child "in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Instead, the minister said, "I baptize you in the Name of the Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier." While it is true that we attribute creation to the Father, redemption to the Son, and sanctification to the Holy Spirit, these three things are the work of the whole Trinity. In the New Testament, God is publicly revealed as a Trinity of Divine Persons at Jesus' baptism. When Jesus is before John the Baptist, the heavens are torn open, the Holy Spirit descends upon Jesus, and the voice of the Father declares Jesus as his beloved Son. When the disciples ask Jesus to teach them to pray as he prays, Jesus shares his own prayer and invites them to follow his example. Jesus teaches them to pray the Our Father. In John's Gospel, Jesus repeatedly addresses God as Father when describing the unique relationship he has with the Father as his Son. Therefore, in the Catholic Church, the ordained minister always baptizes using the words, "I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

Yet, it is difficult for some to speak about God using only masculine terms: Father and Son. The Catechism of the Catholic Church addresses this difficulty in its teaching on God as Father:

By calling God "Father", the language of faith indicates two main things: that God is the first origin of everything and transcendent authority; and that he is at the same time goodness and loving care for all his children. God's parental tenderness can also be expressed by the image of motherhood, which emphasizes God's immanence, the intimacy between Creator and creature. The language of faith thus draws on the human experience of parents, who are in a way the first representatives of God for man. But this experience also tells us that human parents are fallible and can disfigure the face of fatherhood and motherhood. We ought therefore to recall that God transcends the human distinction between the sexes. He is neither man nor woman: he is God. He also transcends human fatherhood and motherhood, although he is their origin and standard: no one is father as God is Father. (CCC, #239)

The great Christian theologian, mystic, and monk, St. John of the Cross speaks beautifully about God as Father in his poem describing the Incarnation of the Son, he writes:

Then he called the archangel Gabriel and sent him to the virgin Mary, at whose consent the mystery was wrought, in whom the Trinity clothed the Word with flesh. And though Three work this, it is wrought in the One; and the Word lived incarnate in the womb of Mary. And he who had only a Father now had a Mother too, but she was not like others who conceive by man. From her own flesh he received his flesh, so he is called Son of God and of man. (Romances, #8)

When parents bring their children to the Church for baptism, they want their children to have a life they cannot give as earthly parents. Desiring eternal life for their children, parents bring their children to the Church, our spiritual mother, so that the Father in heaven may unite them to his only begotten son by the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. Therefore, do not be afraid to call upon God as Father, in the midst of your Mother the Church, and pray the words Jesus teaches us to pray, "Our Father . . ."
