My Dear Friends in Christ,

*You will be hated by all
because of my name*



As I write this, the signs of fall are all around us – the falling leaves, the falling temperatures, the darkening skies. All of these are measures that time is moving on, and we with it. As we move into the fall season, we experience a “death” of sorts. The dying leaves remind us that all life ends. Yet, with this death comes a “rebirth”; the leaves serve as nourishment for the grass, keeping it alive even as it lay dormant under the (coming) hard, cold ground and (most likely) snow. It is the same way with our lives of faith. When we are baptized, we are told, we are baptized into Christ Jesus – into His life, death and resurrection. It is this hope of resurrection that keeps us going.

Today’s gospel (all the readings, really) deals with the topic of “eschatology” – the “end times”. As Jesus tells it, we must be aware that there will be times when it may seem that the end times are upon us. Think back to the beginning of this century, when the “millennialists” (those concerned with the perils this new century would bring, including (but not limited to) the end of the world) spoke that “Y2K” would be the end of us all. Yet here it is, a decade later, and we’re still here! Perhaps they were part of that corps that Jesus was speaking of, those who speak in the name of God to pronounce the imminent nature of the end of the world. As well-intended as they may have been, they were caught up in the “spirit” of the signs that surround us which may be reminiscent of the Book of Revelation.

Things, seemingly, haven’t gotten any better – there are still wars, catastrophes and natural disasters which surround us, seemingly on a daily basis. Yet we still go on with our lives, as we should. If we were to give in to every “prophetic” vision, every outcry of the “end being at hand”, then we would scarcely get anything done! So, how do we know what is the “true” vision? How can we discern false prophets from the authentic Word of God? I think the key is the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit gives us, among its many gifts, the gifts of Wisdom, Understanding and Right Judgment. If we pray for, and use, these gifts, then we would put ourselves in a good position to judge wisely and well the “signs of the times”. We can use these gifts as a way to discern what is truly the Word of God from the “prophet of the week”.

May we have the courage to pray to the Holy Spirit of God for the gifts which will help us discern truth from falsehood. May we know that God is at work in our hearts, our homes and our world. May we trust that God will never leave us abandoned, and will lead us to all truth. May we help others to discern so that none may be lost to the Enemy. May we know that at the “end time”, Jesus will call us home to Himself and give us all of the gifts of the Kingdom.

The Life of Our Parishes

In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells us that “where two or three are gathered together in my name, I am there in their midst” (MT 18:20). In that same way, when we gather to minister to God's people, Jesus is there with us.

Today we will be concentrating on more of the ministries that assist at the Masses.

GREETERS — Meet visitors and parishioners at the doors of the Church and make all people feel Welcome. It takes 5 minutes or less but sets the tone for our parish and that Mass. Greeting people as they enter the facility is more than a handshake and a smile. It is an opportunity to express God's love through Christ and help sets the tone of the upcoming worship service. A great ministry for anyone who attends a particular Mass regularly and can be there a few minutes early.

USHERS — Assist with the collections during the Masses and make sure that the bulletins are available at both doors. They also assist with windows and fans on occasion. During the Christmas and Easter Seasons, they assist people in finding seats when it is extremely crowded. They are a friendly face connecting with the parishioners and play a critical part in the non-liturgical requirements of the parish. They are responsible for making sure that all funds collected during the Mass get to the Counters or in the safe.

COUNTERS — work in teams of two or more on a Sunday morning counting the money from the various collections. Training is provided for the process that needs to be followed. Presently St John's has six teams of Counters so they work on a six-week rotation and St. Ann's has four teams who count on Monday mornings on a four-week rotation.



We Are Called to Be Saints

Catholics often are drawn to saints due to their profession, hobbies, or ethnic background. One's patron saint serves as an example of how to live a life of holiness and service to God. We hold up the saints of the Church in high regard. However, we can sometimes make the mistake of seeing them as the subject of stories in print and not real living people. We can assume that their level of devotion and holiness is unattainable. In fact, we are all called to be saints.

Our world needs more living saints living out their stewardship in a radical manner. Stories are valuable, but when others get to see disciples of Jesus Christ answering their call in person, consider the impact. There is a reason why lay witnessing is so important in cultivating a stewardship culture in a parish community. The people we can see and hear are alive right in front of us. Some will say that to truly be humble means to act anonymously, but we are not speaking here of actions that call out, "Look at me!" We are talking about acting in a way that people see not you and me, but Jesus instead.

We are to be models and examples to one another. We are to build up one another and make the Body of Christ strong. Don't sit back wishing you had the strength to be a saint. You have already been given the gifts needed to be the saint you are called to be. Maybe people will read about you later, but the Church needs you now!
