My Dear Friends in Christ,

While I haven't done it in a while, I used to run marathons regularly. In doing this, you come to realize that many things (life, work, family and, yes, Advent) are a "marathon, not a sprint". We begin our Advent journey this weekend in the usual ways. The Church waits in joyful anticipation for a time – namely, Christmas – which the world is already (seemingly) celebrating. You never see an "Advent Sale" or an "Advent Tree" (although many churches have a "Jesse Tree"). No, for the world it's "Christmas, Christmas, Christmas". This is certainly in line with a society of immediate gratification and one that doesn't know the meaning of the word "wait"!

This Advent Season begins with the prophet Jeremiah speaking of a time of fulfillment, when the "just shoot" (Jer 33:15) who will bring justice to the world. This "just shoot" (ibid) is, of course, Jesus and He will bring God's justice to the world when He comes again in glory. St. Paul helps us to be ready by being "blameless in holiness" (1 Thes 3:13) so as to be able to join God in His Kingdom. Jesus then "seals the deal" by calling us to be watchful, to be "vigilant" (Lk 21:36) so that we can stand before God's judgment and be ready for the life to come.

Advent may seem like the "same old, same old". After all, it comes at relatively the same time of year, has many of the same "themes" ("watch", "wait", "be vigilant") and ends up with the same "goal" (namely, to be ready to welcome Jesus as the Christ Child and the King of Glory). We would do well to not fall into the same routines. I would invite us to try something different, to move out of our "comfort zone". If you haven't followed an Advent calendar, try it this year by following the daily readings and prayers. If you haven't made/kept an Advent wreath for your home, now's the time. I would further encourage you to WAIT. It's easy enough to get "caught up" in the hullabaloo of the preparations for Christmas. These are important and need to be tended to, but not at the expense of our peace of mind or our sanity. So many of us "go overboard" with Christmas and its preparations that they fail to see the opportunity that Advent gives us to "pace ourselves" in these four weeks.

May we take this time of the Advent Season to prepare ourselves, spiritually, for the coming of Christ. Whether it is Christ's coming as the Christ Child or as the King of Glory, may Christ find us ready to welcome Him into our hearts, our homes, and our world. May we give Christ His due, giving Jesus the well-deserved welcome that we would a King. Jesus is our King, enrobed not in a royal garment, but in ordinary swaddling clothes. May we go to the manger in a few weeks, having spent this time preparing for that moment in salvation history when "God so loved the world that He gave us His Only Begotten Son" (Jn 3:16). Advent is a marathon, not a sprint – enjoy it...savor it...live it!

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

Advent is upon us (hard to believe, I know!), and with it the anticipation of Christmas. The First Sunday of Advent, we are reminded not to live in a place of settling but to live in a place of being awake and aware. If we are living in anticipation of something more, we don't need to know the time nor the hour, because we are living in the place of hope. We are reminded to live in hope, not in complacency.

Today to help us focus on the stable at Bethlehem we might set up a Nativity Scene with Mary, Joseph, and the shepherds with their sheep. My personal recommendation would be to hold off placing the Infant Jesus in the manger, as He has not yet arrived, but I will leave it up to each of you to decide. It was St. Francis who in December 1223 created the first ever nativity scene not in a church but in a cave in Greccio, Italy. "I want to do something that will recall the memory of that Child who was born in Bethlehem, to see with bodily eyes the inconveniences of his infancy, how he lay in the manger, and how the ox and ass stood by." (St Bonaventure).

Furthermore, in the words of Franciscan biographer Thomas of Celano, "There Simplicity was honoured, Poverty exalted, Humility commended; and of Greccio there was made as it were a new Bethlehem. The night was lit up as the day, and was delightful to men and beasts ... [Francis] stood before the manger, full of sighs, overcome with tenderness and filled with wondrous joy. The solemnities of Mass were celebrated over the manger, and the priest enjoyed a new consolation."

It was through this event at Greccio that Francis evoked the simplicity with which Christ came into the world. It was also in this event that he called his followers to have that same simplicity of mind, heart, and life. May this Advent Season be a time of "active anticipation". May we recognize the Season the Church gives us to prepare for the coming of Christ as the Infant King as a time when we can ready a home for Jesus in our own hearts, as well as in our Nativity Scenes. May we do our best to avoid the "Christmas Rush" – not only the rush to buy presents, but also the rush to "get through" Christmas. May we recognize the Advent Season as not a "sprint" but a "marathon". May we be in it for the "long haul", to Christmas...and to the Kingdom.

THE DEACON'S COLUMN

"Called to Beatitude but wounded by Sin"

I wonder if you were asked in a poll to name the hardest words to say to another human being what your response would be. My guess is that for some the hardest words to say are, "I love you." How many children (young and adult) long to hear those words from their parents? For others I suspect the hardest words to voice are, "I am sorry." Saying that we are sorry demands that we take an honest look at our words and actions and see how they effect the people around us. It is hard to admit when we are wrong and harder still to admit it to ourselves and to others.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states our fundamental need for grace in this way, "Called to beatitude but wounded by sin, man stands in need of salvation from God. Divine help comes to him in Christ through the law that guides him and the grace that sustains him." (#1949) The Eucharistic Liturgy is how Christians come to experience the singular act that reconciles us to God—the crucifixion. Jesus meets every sinner on the cross. After living a full human life and experiencing the ugliness of our sin he does what only he can do—take them to himself so that when he dies, we are freed from sin. It is fitting that the Liturgy begins with God's people recognizing their sin and making a public act of penitence in which we say, personally as Christians and publicly as the Church—we are sorry for our sins and stand in need of grace that comes to us in Jesus Christ.

There are three forms of the penitential rite—there is the *Confiteor* where the assembly admits publicly that they are sinners, takes responsibility for their actions, and for help to avoid falling back into sin. The second form is rarely used in liturgy. The substance of the second form takes place in a dialogue between the presider and the assembly. The third form is the one we primarily use at Sunday Mass. It begins in the usual way and then the priest, a deacon, or the cantor will make three invocations each followed by the Kyrie, eleison (Lord, have mercy). All three forms conclude with a prayer of general absolution by the priest saying, "May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to everlasting life." Once this rite is performed, the Christian community is now prepared to celebrate the sacred liturgy.

Just as it is hard to say the words, "I am sorry." It is perhaps even harder for us to say to another, "I forgive you." Around the Eucharistic table our Father in Heaven is not stingy with his words nor does he delay in his response to our act of penitence. God forgives us generously every time we turn to him with true contrition. But to receive this forgiveness we must be equally generous in offering it to others who have the courage to say to us that they are sorry for hurting us. Brothers and sisters, next time you come to Mass, take the time to name your sin and give them to Christ on the cross. As you receive his reconciliation, do not be afraid to share that new life by offering forgiveness and mercy to those who ask.

We had an incredible opening Prayer Service for the Confirmation Candidates of grades 9 & 10 and their parents. It was an extraordinary faith-filled evening. Thank you to all who attended and all the teacher that assisted.

We are looking forward to the opening of grades 1 –8 on December 5th . Classes for grades 1-6 will meet at Saint John's upper church.

Grade 1 & 2 will meet alternating weeks from 9:25—10:20 Parents are welcome to attend mass with their children either at 8:30 at Saint Ann's or attend the 10:30 Mass at Saint John's or any other mass that works for your family.

Grades 3 & 4 and 5 & 6 will have class at the same time on alternating weeks after the 10:30 mass in Saint john's Church from 11:30—12:30. Ex. One week grades 3 & 4, the next week grades 5 & 6.

Grades 7 & 8 will meet alternating weeks at Saint Ann' from 5-6pm . (one week grade 7, the next week grade 8)

We encourage 7th & 8th graders and their families to attend the 6:15 mass at Saint Ann's, however, they may attend any mass that works for their family.

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
