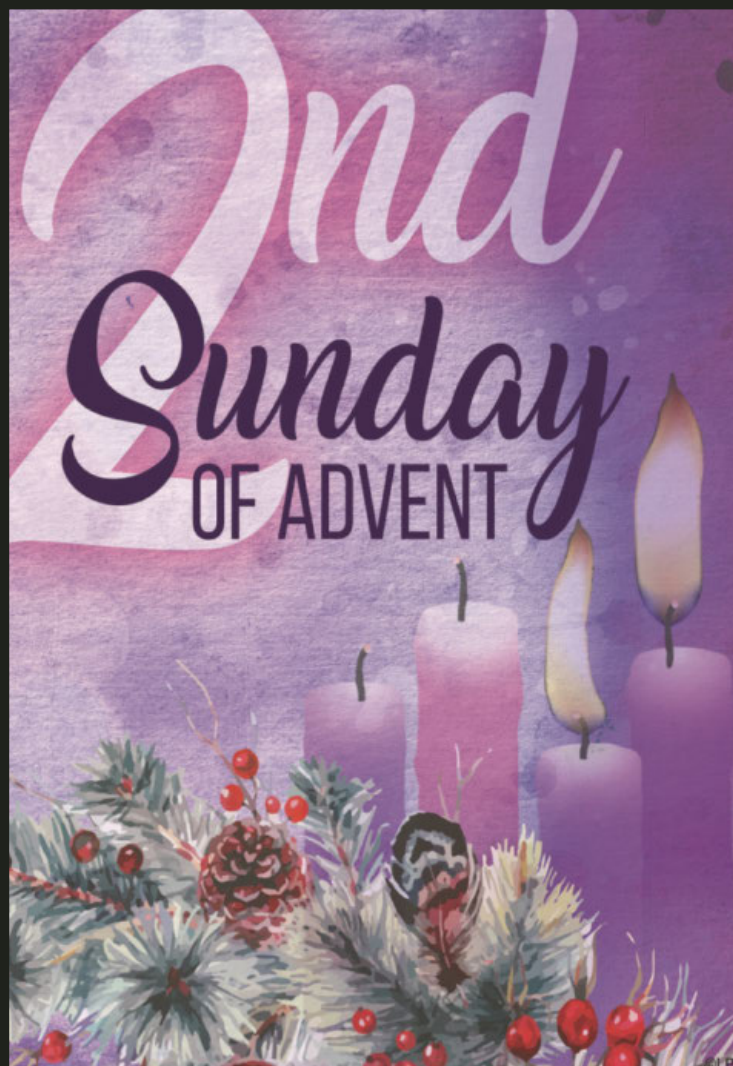

My Dear Friends in Christ,



John the Baptist presents to us an interesting figure. While prophetic in nature (by what he says), he is unlike any other prophet who has come before (by how he speaks, as well as how he looks!). John's appearance is something to behold, and it gets the attention of the crowd; like a good preacher, he has a "hook". His message, however, is what really stands out, what separates him from the rest of the "crowd" (the itinerant preachers who people have seen come and go).

John comes to us as a herald of God's Word, as well as God's Promise of the Messiah. There were some in the crowd who thought that John was "THE ONE", the Messiah. He is quick to dispel that thought, however, because while the baptism that John offers is one of water, there is one who will be coming to baptize in water AND the Holy Spirit. This one, of course, is Jesus Christ. This is how John separates himself from the rest of the pack. There might have been others who spoke of the coming of the Messiah, but John does so with an authority and power that has never been seen previously. This is because John has been singled out by God to deliver this message.

John brings a call for repentance to ready oneself for the coming of the Messiah. John's voice is "one crying out in the desert" (Is 40:3); his "cry" is to "make straight the path" (Jn 1:23). We are to clear out that "spiritual dead-wood", those things that are not of God, so that when Jesus comes again (at the end of time) He will find in us a welcome home. We should not wait, however, for that time, for we "know not the day or the hour" (Mt 25:13). We should begin here and now to prepare for that coming. This is what Advent is all about. Advent is, for us, an opportunity to get our-selves ready for the two-fold coming of Christ. We are to prepare for His coming not only at Christmastime, but at the end of ALL time. If we do this here and now, we need not worry about how we will be received by Jesus.

May we use this Advent Season, this time of preparation, wisely and well. May we ready our hearts, homes and lives for the coming of Christ. May we be found ready, so that when Christ comes we may hear those words of Scripture ring in our ears and hearts: "Well done, good and faithful servant...share in your Master's joy!" (Mt 25:23).

How Much Is Enough?

I've got some great news for some of you: Jesus Christ doesn't care what name you bear. He doesn't care where you were born, and he doesn't care what your family tree looks like. He doesn't care where you grew up or where you went to school.

I've also got some bad news for some of you: See above.

It's so easy to take our salvation for granted. The mercy of God makes it so. Look at John the Baptist — he was pouring water on everybody who wanted it. Everybody but one group: those who expected it. Those who thought it was a given because of who they were, because of what they were. Those who had no intention of doing the work of repentance.

Sometimes, because God is so faithful, we make the mistake of forgetting that He is also just.

I am baptized, we think. I made my First Communion, and I was Confirmed. That's enough.

I went to Catholic school. I know all the Ten Commandments and I can tell you anything you want to know about the Popes. That's enough.

I'm on parish council. I put money in the basket, and I volunteer. That's enough.

None of it is enough. It would never be enough. And before we look upon the Pharisees and Sadducees with too much judgment, we need to remember: the work of repentance is ongoing. It is a process that we must commit to within ourselves, continuously.

God is the missing element to this equation. He is the one who raises children to Abraham from the stones. If we rely only on our own abilities, our own merits, our own offerings, it will never be enough.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

As a Secular Franciscan, one strives to live the ideals of St. Francis in their everyday life, bringing into practice the idea that one should...and can...see

Christ in everyone. This is especially true when one encounters someone who lives on the “fringe” of society, someone who might be thought of “less than” by society because of some social, cultural, or physical stigma. St. Francis’ life radically changed when he encountered the leper on the road. He had encountered many lepers on the road, no doubt, and most would probably think this encounter to be no different. Francis would see the leper, avoid the leper at all costs, and move on. This encounter would be different. At this moment, something stirred within Francis and he saw nothing less than the presence of Christ in this leper. He dismounted, approached the leper, and kissed him – something unheard of to anyone, certainly Francis! It was at this moment that Francis’ life changed, a conversion took place, and his life would never be the same. To see Christ in the leper, that is to see Christ in the marginalized, disenfranchised, outcast, is something which the members of our St. Vincent de Paul Society strive to do each time they open the doors to the bi-monthly Food Pantry that is found in the basement of St. John’s Church.

One of the members of our Society, in particular, who saw this Christ-like visage in anyone who walked through the doors of the Food Pantry was Vince Adornato. Vince wasn’t just the “Past President” of St. Vincent de Paul, he was a stalwart member who worked tirelessly in bringing Christ’s love to life in a most Franciscan way. Vince was a true Franciscan without ever donning the brown habit of a Franciscan or the Tau Cross of a Secular Franciscan. Vince lived the ideals of the Franciscan life each time he stepped foot in the doors of the Church, whether it was as a Lector, Eucharistic Minister, or member of St. Vincent de Paul. On November 8, the Lord called Vince to his Eternal Reward. His passing is a loss to all of us here in the Collaborative and to me in particular. I spent many an evening enjoying his cooking, his humor, and his friendship. I have no doubt Vince received a warm welcome from everyone who preceded him in death, especially his beloved wife Pam. I also believe the Lord gave him a place of honor at the Eternal Banquet Table, because of the many times he fed the hungry who crossed the threshold of the Pantry. As he entered through the Gates of the Heavenly Kingdom, he no doubt heard those words we all hope to hear upon our arrival to the Kingdom, “Well done, my good and faithful servant...Come, share your Master’s joy” (Matthew 25:21). Vince will always be loved, never forgotten, and missed until we see him again. God Speed, my friend.

I Believe in God: *Almighty* Father

If God is all powerful, why doesn’t he prevent or save people from all kinds of sufferings?” Given that the world is marked by all sorts of sufferings (moral and physical) and natural disasters that bring destruction and death, one might wonder if there are limits to God’s power. After all, if God loved us, and if he is all powerful, why would he allow his children to suffer? And yet, our faith tells us that *omnipotence* (fancy word for almighty or all powerful) is an attribute of God. In fact, it is the only attribute of God professed in the Creed.

In the Old Testament, there are a couple of titles of God that reveal his almighty power. A popular title for God, in Hebrew, is *El Shaddai* which is often translated as “God Almighty”. In other places, he is called, *Lord of Hosts*, which, along with *El Shaddai*, is often translated as *pantokrator*. This Greek word literally means “ruler of all” but is usually translated as almighty or all powerful.

In the Old Testament, the activity of God appears to affirm that he is almighty and all powerful. He creates the universe out of nothing. The universe is brought into being by command. God brings life to clay figurines simply by breathing his spirit into them. God demonstrates his power over creation through the ten plagues and through the miracle of the sea. In the desert, God gives the newly freed slaves water from the rock to drink and manna from heaven to eat. These stories, and more, depict a God who has power of all things “visible and invisible”.

Interestingly enough, the title, *Almighty*, is not used for God in the Gospels. Nevertheless, we see the mighty works of God at work in them. By the power of the Holy Spirit, Mary conceives a Son in her womb even though she never had relations with a man. Through his divine Son, God cures lepers. He makes the deaf hear, the mute speak, and the lame walk. He calms storms and even walks on water. If this was not enough to demonstrate his power, Jesus brings a little girl back to life and raises the brother of Martha and Mary from the dead. When addressing Mary at the Annunciation, the Archangel Gabriel highlights God’s power with these words, “Elizabeth, your relative, has also conceived a son in her old age, and this is the sixth month for her who was called barren; for nothing will be impossible for God” (Lk 1:37). The most dynamic display of God’s power takes place three days after the Son of God dies on the cross—Jesus is resurrected.

If all this is true, how does one reconcile an almighty God with evil and suffering? The Catechism of the Catholic Church raises this question in its teaching on the almightiness of God and responds to it with these words,

Faith in God the Father Almighty can be put to the test by the experience of evil and suffering. God can sometimes seem to be absent and incapable of stopping evil. But in the most mysterious way God the Father has revealed his almighty power in the voluntary humiliation and Resurrection of his Son, by which he conquered evil. . . It is in Christ’s Resurrection and exaltation that the Father has shown forth “the immeasurable greatness of his power in us who believe” (#272).

Though God is almighty, he will never force his will upon us. Instead, using his almighty power he is incarnate in Mary’s womb and shares our life. By his almighty power, he takes on the consequences of our sin and suffers the death we all deserve because of that sin. God’s almighty power is at work in each person through the forgiveness of sins. God’s power does more than forgive sins, his grace fills us with his own life making us sons and daughters of the Father, brothers and sisters of the Lord Jesus, and temples of the Holy Spirit. By the power of the Holy Spirit, God becomes a human being so that all people might become like God.
