

My Dear Friends in Christ,

We stand now on the threshold of Christmas, wrapping up our Advent journey in this Fourth Week. We pre-



pare for Christmas with today's readings which speak of God working in human history. Today's gospel especially readies us by giving us Matthew's account of how Jesus' birth came about. In this account, Joseph is the central figure and his encounter with the angel highlights the gift with which he is entrusted, namely the raising of Jesus in the world. Joseph is unwilling at first, and who could blame him? This is not your usual birth account. There is something special at work here, namely the power of the Holy Spirit.

Throughout the Advent Season, we have been given challenges to repent, to reform our lives and to make our hearts and homes a receptive and welcome site for the coming of Christ. Joseph is prepared to do this by the encounter with the angel of the Lord (perhaps Gabriel, but that's not noted in the gospel passage). His unwillingness gives way to trust, a trust that comes through the power of the Holy Spirit. What a gift God gives us in this trust, for this is not a gift for Joseph alone. Through our baptism, we are called to trust in the Holy Spirit by including it in our decisions and important "life moments". When we call upon the Holy Spirit, we are calling upon God to take an active part in our lives. This is an important moment, both for us and for the world. It is important for us, as we are giving ourselves over to the will of God (much like Mary and Joseph did); it is important for the world, for it presents to them a new way of thinking, of living.

As we ready ourselves for Christmas in this final week of Advent, let us remember that who we will encounter has the power to change our lives. Let us remember that this Christmas is not just a day, but a Season. It is a time when we encounter Emmanuel – a name which means "God is with us". Let us remember that God is with us not only at Advent, not only at Christmas, but each and every day of our lives. Let us live each day as a gift, knowing that the power of the Holy Spirit is at our disposal, helping us, guiding us and moving us ever closer in relationship with the God who calls us to life, sustains our life and fulfills our life. May we use these remaining days to prepare our hearts, minds and lives for the coming of the Incarnation – Jesus, the Son of God.

Teen Mass Thank You

The Story Behind 'Silent Night'

The lyrics to *Silent Night* were written by Josef Mohr, a man whose name was unloved in his home town of Salzburg. Mohr was one of three illegitimate sons to Anna Schoiberin, while his father, Franz, was a mercenary soldier who eventually abandoned the family. To make matters worse, Josef's godfather was the town executioner.



Perhaps due to his mother's poverty, the curate of the local Catholic cathedral

took Josef in as a foster child. Josef had a proclivity toward music, which was encouraged by the church, and he eventually decided himself to pursue the priesthood. He was ordained August 21, 1815, and was sent to Oberndorf, just north of Salzburg. He there met Franz Xaver Gruber, a local schoolteacher who would become organist at Old Saint Nicholas Church the following year.

Gruber came from equally humble origins, and himself took comfort in his music. The friendship of the two is what led to the creation of *Silent Night*.

Silent Night—or Stille Nacht in the original German—was created because Mohr needed a carol for worship. On Christmas Eve of 1818, Mohr visited Gruber with a poem he had written a few years earlier. Gruber quickly arranged the song to be played on a guitar with a choir because the church organ was broken. That evening at Midnight Mass, Gruber strapped on his guitar and led the congregation at St. Nicholas in the first rendition of Silent Night.

The original arrangement was a bit faster than the slow, reflective version of the song we know today. But the song was an immediate hit, later being sung by traveling tours and performed before King Frederick William IV of Prussia. Later in the 1800s, the hymn was translated into English and made its way to America by way of a book called *Sunday School Hymnal*, though with only three of the original six verses.

Today, *Silent Night* is perhaps the most famous Christmas carol in history. It has been translated into most languages, and the Bing Crosby version is the third-bestselling single in history. A rebuilt Silent Night Chapel in Oberndorf is now a cultural landmark (a replica can be found in Frankenmuth, Michigan). The song itself was even declared to be an intangible cultural heritage by UNESCO in 2011.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

For many, if not most, of us, a big piece of our Christmas preparation includes the erecting of a crèche, or a manger scene, which depicts the birth

of Christ in all its gloried simplicity. But did you know that we have St. Francis of Assisi to thank for this tradition? The story of St. Francis and the Christmas Crib at Greccio focuses on what was really important to Francis —the poverty of Jesus and his mother, and the discomfort felt by the little baby. Thomas of Celano also places an emphasis on the three virtues of simplicity, poverty, and humility, and leads us to understand that the poverty of Francis is in imitation of the poverty of Jesus. For Francis, the external poverty of Christ's birth at Bethlehem is representative of the radical poverty of the Incarnation.

The narrative stresses the importance of "memory", which also means "ensuring that we do not forget." Celano repeats the word memory at the beginning and at the end of the story and writes of how Francis wished "to enact the memory of that babe who was born in Bethlehem." This is an essential duty of our faith— a faith that, according to the Bible, can be summed up as "remembering the deeds of the Lord." For all Christians, the "memorial" of the Lord par excellence is the Eucharist that we celebrate daily. The parallel between the Incarnation and the Eucharist is often expressed in Francis' thought and writings. At Greccio, the nativity scene does not rely solely on crib figures to evoke the mystery of the Incarnation, instead the Eucharist is celebrated as the supreme memorial.


Making memory in this way, however, is not merely an intellectual operation. In the account of Greccio all of the senses are involved. The sight of the scene, with countless images of light; hearing songs and Francis' own fine voice; the touch of the baby who awakes and is held in his arms; the sweet taste that has Francis licking his lips! All this speaks of a healthy relationship with the senses, which are part of our relationship with God and part of proclaiming the Gospel. There is an interplay between the bodily and spiritual senses in the Christian tradition, and this can serve as a warning against excessive intellectualism. Franciscan spirituality sees the senses as an avenue to God. Francis invites us to make room for creativity, which opens us up to the new. We're invited to give space to feelings, to joy, to songs, to festive celebration. He also calls us to enjoy the beauty of poverty, which in the story of Greccio is characterized by a dignity and beauty that become a source of joy.

May our use of the crèche be an ever present reminder of the incarnational experience of Christmas. That within it, God takes flesh, becomes one of us in all things (save for sin), and shares in the human nature of us all. As we gaze upon the Holy Family, as well as all the others, gathered at the manger, may we come to invite Christ into our homes and hearts. May this invitation last through the Christmas Season and beyond, to all times and seasons, until we share in the fullness of life of God's Kingdom in Heaven.

St. Joseph the Steward

St. Joseph is one of the greatest examples of stewardship we have in the Gospels. Here is a man who understands care and reverence for the property of God, a man chosen to be steward over the very life and breath of God's Son and Spouse.

Joseph was mindful. He recognized what belonged to God. When he understood that Mary was to be the mother of God, he was not jealous or bitter. He did not presume to claim ownership over her.

Joseph was prayerful. He accepted the opportunity to be in relationship with God, even if it was in a radical and unexpected way. How many of us would trust a crazy dream we have where an angel tells us our fiancée is carrying the Son of God? Well, those of us who are already profoundly connected to God through prayer. Joseph was open to receiving God, and so he was open to the truth in a way many of us would not have been.

Joseph was gracious. Even before he had full understanding of the situation, he was unwilling to expose Mary to shame. He did not give himself over to feelings of betrayal.

Joseph was committed. He persevered. The Lord had no shortage of strange and even dangerous-sounding tasks for Joseph, but he submitted to each one.

Joseph was accountable. When he awoke from his dream, "he did as the angel of the Lord had commanded him, and took his wife into his home."

Joseph was a man entrusted with many gifts, and he gave of them wisely. Let us pray that we have the grace to follow in his example.



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
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
